## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES TO STUDY THE FEASIBILITY OF INCREASING PAYMENT TO HAWAII'S COMMUNITY CARE FOSTER FAMILY HOMES AND EXPANDED ADULT RESIDENTIAL CARE HOMES FOR MEDICAID RECIPIENTS.

1 WHEREAS, the State has a limited number of beds in nursing homes for patients requiring the level of care provided by 2 nursing homes; and 3 4 WHEREAS, the Community Care Foster Family Home (CCFFH) 5 program and Expanded Adult Residential Care Home (E-ARCH) 6 program provide additional options for patients requiring 7 nursing home level care throughout the State; and 8 9 WHEREAS, caregivers in CCFFHs and E-ARCHs effectively 10 provide the proper care needed for nursing home level patients, 11 including assistance with activities of daily living, 12 specialized care such as the use of feeding tubes and catheters; 13 and the provision of basic wound care, maintenance exercise 14 programs, cognitive stimulation, dietary management, and other 15 custodial care as needed; and 16 17 WHEREAS, the availability of beds in CCFFHs and E-ARCHs can 18 reduce the length of hospital stays; provide emotional, 19 financial, and physical relief to families caring for an ill 20 senior or other family member in their own home; and reduce the 21 22 risk of homelessness, morbidity, and mortality in patients 23 requiring nursing home level care; and 24 25 WHEREAS, the ARCH program was introduced in Hawaii in or around the 1950s to provide assisted living type care; it was 26 27 expanded in 1994 to provide nursing home level care as the E-ARCH program under the Department of Health, serving 28 approximately fourteen hundred patients with the potential for 29 30 an even greater capacity; and 31



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WHEREAS, the pilot CCFFH program was started in 1979 by The 1 Queen's Medical Center; it started receiving Medicaid funding 2 under a federal Medicaid waiver in 1984, initially under the 3 direction of the Department of Human Services, and currently 4 under the Department of Health, which serves approximately three 5 thousand patients with the potential for an even greater 6 7 capacity; and 8 9 WHEREAS, the 1984 CCFFH federal Medicaid waiver was 10 approved based on its success as a high-quality alternative to nursing home placement for Medicaid patients that cost two-11 12 thirds or less than placement in a nursing home; and 13 WHEREAS, the level of CCFFH reimbursement has not kept pace 14 15 with that two-thirds target ratio; and in 2020, the reimbursement rate to CCFFH providers was approximately one-16 17 sixth of that for nursing home placements; and 18 WHEREAS, caregivers who accept Medicaid patients into their 19 CCFFH receive \$47.06 per day plus the patient's Social Security 20 Assistance (SSA) for a maximum of \$2,500 per month for room, 21 board, and patient care, while a nursing home receives \$280.00 22 per day, plus SSA for the same patient for a maximum of \$10,100 23 per month (with HMSA insurance, Kaiser health plan, and UHA 24 insurance at slightly higher rates); and 25 26 WHEREAS, studies by the American Association of Retired 27 Persons show that Hawaii needs to improve efforts to provide 28 29 lower cost long-term care services available in the community under Hawaii's MedQuest Medicaid program rather than the more 30 31 expensive care in nursing homes; and 32 33 WHEREAS, CCFFH and E-ARCH operators are often dually employed in nursing homes, hospitals, assisted living 34 facilities, and other health care facilities around the State in 35 order to supplement their income and maintain their own health 36 benefits, which creates greater risk for the spread of 37 infectious disease; and 38 39 WHEREAS, many CCFFH caregivers decline to accept Medicaid 40 patients and instead save empty beds for private-pay patients in 41

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order to optimize their income, thus reducing the number of beds 1 available for Medicaid patients; now, therefore, 2 3 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-first 4 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2022, the 5 House of Representatives concurring, that the Department of 6 Human Services is requested to review the existing payment model 7 for Medicaid reimbursement for patients who require nursing home 8 level of care in the community, study the feasibility of 9 increasing the reimbursement rate to CCFFH and E-ARCH care 10 providers, and determine the overall effect of increasing the 11 rate for CCFFH and E-ARCH care providers; and 12 13 14 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Human 15 Services is requested to submit a report of its findings and 16 recommendations to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2023; and 17 18 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 19 20 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Director of Human Services, Adult Foster Homecare Association of Hawaii, and 21 22 Alliance of Residential Care Home Administrators. 23 24 (A) 25 OFFERED E
