SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES TO CONDUCT A NEEDS ASSESSMENT FOR THE FEASIBILITY AND EFFECTIVENESS OF A DIVISION OF OCEAN AND COASTAL MANAGEMENT WITHIN THE DEPARTMENT OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES.

WHEREAS, the entire State of Hawaii falls within Hawai'i's 1 2 coastal zone boundary; and 3 WHEREAS, due to its physical location, configuration, and 4 climate, Hawai'i is rich in a number of valuable coastal 5 ecosystems, such as wetlands and reef flats, embayments and 6 7 sheltered coves, sand beaches, and coral reefs that serve important natural functions, such as providing habitat and 8 breeding grounds for wildlife and living marine resources, 9 natural buffers to the action of storm waters, and a natural 10 laboratory for scientific and biological research. 11 In addition, 12 they provide the basis for recreational and commercial fishing 13 businesses; and 14

15 WHEREAS, demand for coastal recreational opportunities for 16 beach use and water sports continues to rise because of 17 population growth, increased affluence, greater leisure time, 18 and increased tourism; and

20 WHEREAS, increasing and competing demands upon the lands and waters of the coastal zone occasioned by population growth 21 and economic development, including requirements for industry, 22 commerce, residential development, transportation and 23 navigation, waste disposal, and harvesting of marine resources 24 25 have resulted in the loss of living marine resources, reduced groundwater and aquifer recharge areas, increased 26 vulnerabilities to coastal development, reduced living marine 27 resources, wildlife, nutrient-rich areas, permanent and averse 28 changes to ecological systems, decreased open space for public 29 use, increased shoreline erosion, and compromised infrastructure 30 due to erosion and coastal flooding; and 31

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2 WHEREAS, climate change will result in substantial sea 3 level rise with serious adverse effects in the coastal zone. 4 Seventy percent of beaches in Hawai'i are experiencing coastal 5 erosion and many miles of beach have been severely narrowed or 6 lost over the past century; and 7

8 WHEREAS, Hawai'i has a substantial and significant interest 9 in the protection, management, and development of ocean and 10 coastal resources; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Land and Natural Resources, 12 Office of Conservation and Coastal Lands, is responsible for the 13 management of coastal resources including beaches, dunes, and 14 rocky shorelines seaward of county jurisdictions or within the 15 State Conservation District. The Coastal Lands Program is 16 responsible for coordinating coastal management, maintaining the 17 delicate balance between conservation of coastal resources and 18 responsible development of coastal areas, mitigating risks from 19 natural and human-induced hazards for coastal communities, and 20 implementing innovative shoreline management techniques; and 21 22

WHEREAS, in 1972, the Legislature authorized the Department 23 of Planning and Economic Development to prepare a plan for the 24 management of the State's coastal zones to comply with the 25 requirements of the Federal Coastal Zone Management Act, which 26 provided that the state Land Use Commission has the authority to 27 administer land and water use regulations in coastal zones, 28 29 control development to ensure compliance with the State's management program in coastal zones, and resolve conflicts among 30 competing uses in coastal zones; and 31

WHEREAS, in 1977, the Legislature established the Coastal 33 Zone Management Program within the Office of Planning and 34 Sustainable Development of the Department of Business, Economic 35 Development, and Tourism. The Office of Planning and 36 Sustainable Development's purpose is to provide central 37 direction and cohesion in the allocation of resources and 38 effectuation of state activities and programs, and effectively 39 address current or emerging issues and opportunities. 40 The purpose of the Coastal Zone Management Program is to provide for 41



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the effective management, beneficial use, protection, and 1 development of the coastal zone; and 2 3 WHEREAS, through the Office of Planning and Sustainable 4 5 Development's Coastal Zone Management Program and enactment of chapter 205A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the Legislature 6 7 established a network program, whereby the program works with a network of state agencies and local governments to administer 8 and enforce all laws, regulations, and policies that protect the 9 coastal zone; and 10 11 12 WHEREAS, Hawai'i's environment is both undermanaged and overregulated and new regulatory mechanisms should not be added 13 onto, but rather combined into, the existing systems; now, 14 15 therefore, 16 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-first 17 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2022, the 18 House of Representatives concurring, that the Department of Land 19 20 and Natural Resources is requested to conduct a needs assessment for the feasibility and effectiveness of a Division of Ocean and 21 Coastal Management; and 22 23 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Division of Ocean and 24 Coastal Management would be the designated state coastal 25 management agency and be responsible for the implementation and 26 administration of Hawai'i's coastal zone management program, 27 including the direct regulation of coastal resources within the 28 29 critical areas of the State including coastal waters, tidelines, beaches, and beach dune systems and the consideration of 30 ecological, cultural, aesthetic, recreational, scenic, open 31 space values, public access, coastal hazards, sea level rise, 32 and needs for economic development; and 33 34 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Division of Ocean and 35 Coastal Management should effectively manage networks of healthy 36 coral reefs while improving the health of reef ecosystems at 37 priority sites, identify and fill in management gaps that inform 38 existing efforts to prevent further damage to fragile nearshore 39 ecosystems, and supplement existing efforts to address the 40 effects of sea level rise; and 41 42

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Land and Natural Resources is requested to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2023; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this
Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Director of
Business, Economic Development, and Tourism and Chairperson of
the Board of Land and Natural Resources.
