# Wind Farm Project - Maui residents speak up

Auwahi Wind Energy, LLC, , a subsidiary of Sempra Energy, is proposing a wind farm to be constructed on land belonging to Ulupalakua Ranch. The Draft Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the proposed Auwahi Wind Farm project was published online, on March

One of the proposed truck routes for the construc-

tion phase is Wailea Alanui Drive/Makena Alanui Road.

If this route is used, trees will need to be trimmed and

certain traffic lights and signage will have to be tempo-

rarily removed and relocated. I am not in favor of the

Recently, I met with representatives of Sempra Energy and I expressed to them some of the concerns from South Maui residents.

Wailea Ala Nui Drive/Makena Alanui Road route. This route will increase noise and inconvenience to residents.

I favor an alternative route that begins north of Wailea Ike Drive and proceeds south. This route is about 1/2

> mile east (mauka) of Wailea Alanui Drive/Makena Alanui Road. This option builds a designated access road for trucks to use for construction of the wind farm; it bypasses Wailea Alanui Drive/Makena Alanui Road.

I shared with Sempra Energy the concerns of South Maui residents about noise and possible damage to roads caused by the weight of the

vehicles. Kihei residents do not want sink holes, or damage to culverts that could impede traffic in and out of Kihei. If you have any further concerns or comments about this project, contact my office to share your ideas and thoughts.

# **2011 Legislature Session Ending Soon**

The 2011 legislative

session ends on May
5. The State of Hawai'i
is facing a deficit of

means lawmakers are
facing difficult decisions regarding cutting expenses and
raising revenues in
order to balance the
state budget.

**Pension Tax** - HB 1092 HD1 SD1 is a bill that will tax pensions. I

voted against this bill because it hurts our seniors. The current amended bill begins to tax "a taxpayer's pension income in excess of \$100,000." Although this may

not affect a high percentage of retirees presently, this will open the door to tax more seniors with pensions. This is problematic for the seniors in our state since most retirees do not have the option to go back to work, to make up lost income.

Production Studio Credits – HB 1551 HD2 provides a tax credit for qualified media infrastructure projects. I voted in favor of this bill that will provide a 20% tax credit for production studios related to film and TV

production on the neighbor islands. This bill is written to provide no cost to taxpayers. In order to receive the tax credits, a production company will need to build infrastructure within five years, or lose the credit. This legislation will help to create jobs and help our economy.

Stop Raiding the Highway Fund - I proposed amendments on the House floor to three bills (HB1101, HB1102, and HB1097) that would insure that money raised from increasing the vehicle weight, car registration, and rental car charges would go into the highway fund and be used to maintain our roads.


What ensued was a spirited discussion on the House floor; a number of members argued against requiring highway fund monies to be used for the highway fund!

Some majority members argued in favor of raiding designated funds to be transferred to the general fund. In the end my amendment to not raid the highway fund was defeated. Therefore, I voted against raising taxes by

increasing vehicle weight, car registration and other fees.

**Tsunami Relief for Maui & Big Island -** There is some good news for Maui and Big Island residents regarding flood relief. HR 157 / HCR 187 is a resolution that requests support for emer-

gency prevention efforts for the Counties of Maui and Hawai'i related to the March 2011 tsunami. I cosponsored this resolution along with other neighbor island representatives; it is moving forward.



On April 2<sup>nd</sup>, I had the honor and privilege to attend the 2011 Hawai'i Science, Technology, Engineering, and

Mathematics (STEM) conference held at the Wailea Marriott. The conference participants included 18 Hawai'i middle and high schools, along with Kihei Charter High School.

During the public exhibit portion, each school had an opportunity to present various projects ranging from solar ovens to environmental

from solar ovens to environmental protection, CAD, robotics, and digital media. I was so impressed with the knowledge and dedication each student had with their particular project. Seeing

students so committed to technology and learning is heartwarming.

As a community we need to continue to support our children that are interested in science and technology. Hawai'i's keiki can be on the cutting edge of new technology. Our children will help shape the future.
