2013 SESSION OVERVIEW

State Senate Invests in Hawaii's Future

The Hawaii State Senate adjourned on its final day of the 2013 Legislative Session on May 1, passing many bills in support of its priorities set forth at the beginning of the session. With a spirit of cooperativeness, civility, and compromise exercised by the Senate Committee on Ways and Means and the House Committee on Finance, the Hawaii State Budget, House Bill (HB) 200, was passed more than one week before the final day of the 2013 session. The budget's early passage allowed the Senate to carefully assess the needs of Hawaii residents and the direction of Hawaii's government through bills pending in conference committees.

This Session, the Legislature fulfilled its commitment to start prefunding unfunded liabilities pertaining to other post employment benefits. The Legislature made appropriations through House Bill (HB) 200, the State Budget, with \$100M for fiscal year (FY)14 and \$117.4M for FY15. Currently, the unfunded liabilities for the employer-union health benefits trust fund are \$13.6 billion. Paying down these liabilities will have a positive impact on the state's bond rating and ensure that Hawaii's future is not handicapped by increasingly burdensome debt. Additionally, HB 546 will make Hawaii the first state in the nation to statutorily require payment of the annual required contribution for future public worker health benefits.

2013 SESSION OVERVIEW

Senator Hee's Measures Passed By The Legislature

SB 2 – Relating to Simulated Firearms

Amends the offenses of terroristic threatening in the first de and robbery in the first degree to include the use of simulate firearms.

SB 3 – Relating to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs

Provides for the election of board members to the Office of waiian Affairs a system of nonpartisan primary and general tions to begin with the 2014 elections.

SB 4 – Relating to Motor Vehicles

Requires all front and back seat passengers to wear their sea belt or child passenger restraint while the car is operated up any public highway.

SB 5 – Relating to Public Lands

Provides several means of compensation in addition to rent ductions when the State withdraws, condemns, or takes pub land leased for intensive agricultural or pastoral uses and re the land unusable for the original purposes of the lease.

SB 6 – Relating to Animal Cruelty

Commonly known as the "snare bill" establishes a misdeme animal cruelty offense for the use of steel-jawed leg-hold tr Pet animals who have been frequent victims of snare traps v be protected from cruel treatment and unnecessary prolonge suffering.

SB 9 – Relating to Animals

Now, Hawaii joins thirty other states with this bill by ensur that those convicted of cruelty to animals in the first degree restricted from owning or possessing any pet animal or equ animal for a minimum of five years from the date of convic

SB 328 – Relating to Animals

This bill amends the residential landlord-tenant code to profor security deposits that include an additional amount to pa damages caused by any pet animal. By providing landlords an option of a "pet deposit," this bill will hopefully lead to pet friendly rentals in Hawaii.

SB 332 – Relating to Wages

Starting January 1, 2014, this bill requires employers to pro employees with specific wage and employer information in ployees' pay records.

SB 870 – Relating to Use of Force by Persons with Special sponsibility for care, discipline, or safety of others.

Now Act 31 – Establishes a rebuttable presumption for spect types of physical force used against minors that are presume unjustifiable for purposes of responding to charges of use of force by a parent, guardian, or any other person responsible the care and supervision of a minor.
