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With public school starting on August 1st, the State and the Hawaii State Teachers Association (HSTA) are still undergoing contentious labor negotiations. After being unable to agree to terms, the Board of Education and the State have implemented a "last, best, and final offer" effective July 1, 2011. This would enable the public school system to operate as normal, but under the contract terms set forth by the State—terms that the HSTA are challenging. The two sides have brought their stalemate to the Hawaii Labor Relations Board and both sides are now awaiting a decision.

I will be closely following this situation and I invite you all to attend this month's Aiea / Pearl City Community Town Hall Meeting on Education with special guest Don Horner, Chairman of the Board of Education. Additional details for the event are on the back of this newsletter.

We had a great showing at last month's Aiea / Pearl City Town Meeting that covered Aiea community issues. The topics that were covered included Aloha Stadium renovations, City vs. State jurisdiction of Kaimakani Street, construction of the new Aiea Library, and the planned development at the former Kam Drive-In location.

Aloha Friends and Neighbors,

In mid-July, the State received some good news with the State tax collections for the year ending June 30th, 2011. The report has showed that tax revenues exceeded expectations, amounting to nearly \$30 million in additional revenue.

Remember that the Legislature granted Governor Abercrombie the authority to tap into the Hurricane Relief Fund to help cover the deficit if needed. The current status of the State's finances means additional raiding of the Hurricane Relief Fund is unlikely at this time—but the possibility still remains if the State's finances change for the worse.

> The redistricting of political boundaries is currently underway as well. Last month, the Reapportionment Commission voted to include nonresident students, military personnel and their dependents, and incarcerated felons. The next step will be to redraw the lines so that each district has about the same amount of residents.

> On the Reapportionment website (<u>elections3.hawaii.gov/citizenhelp</u>), you can try your hand at drawing your own political boundaries with the program the Commission is using. The same demographic information that commissioners are taking under consideration for their own plans are provided on the site as well. The directions are clear and the program was designed for public use.

Eagle Scout Project Helps Kalihi Union Church

Reese Akamine has attained the rank of Eagle Scout, the highest distinction awarded in Scouting. An Eagle Scout exhibits superior leadership qualities and selfless behavior to others.

To qualify for Eagle Scout, Reese committed over 400 labor-hours towards the bet-

terment of Kalihi Union Church. The service project involved installing a water sprinkler system in the front grassy section of the property at Kalihi Union Church in Honolulu. The "L-shaped" area encompasses an estimated 8,000 square feet which was in dire need of a water irrigation system. Prior to this project, the church groundskeeper along with a small handful of retirees watered the area manually—an extremely time consuming task. The project required extensive planning, coordination, and the resolution of unforeseen challenges. Such obstacles that Reese had to overcome to achieve his Service Project included the removal of a large tree root and the repair of the existing water supply lines.

For his hard work and dedication to the community, Reese was awarded a Certificate by the Legislature at his Eagle Court of Honor on July 16th.

Capital Improvements for Our Intermediate Schools

Two schools in our district, Aiea Intermediate School and Dole Middle School will be receiving \$2 million in capital improvements funding renovate their facilities to provide better serve our students.

- Aiea Intermediate School will receive \$1,740,000 for the renovation and expansion of their cafeteria. This project involves construction, works of art, and equipment to expand and renovate the cafeteria stage area and add dressing rooms on either side of the stage. The improvements will support the school's program needs by accommodating various programs and performances designed for larger stages, and that require costume changes.
- **Dole Middle School** will receive \$250,000 for restroom renovations. This project would provide additional ADA compliant boys and girls restrooms to accommodate disabled students. The restrooms would be located on the ground floor of Building E, which is at the back of campus.
