Highlights of Bills & Resolutions that have Been Signed into Law by Governor Ige

HB2024 HD1	Mauna Kea Governance	
SD2 CD1	Establishes the Mauna Kea Stewardship and Oversight Authority as the sole authority for the management of Mauna Kea lands. Requires the Authority to manage land uses; human activities, other uses, and access; stewardship; edu- cation; research; disposition; and overall operations on its respective lands. Declares astronomy as a state policy. Provides certain restrictions on leases and a moratorium on new leases. Requires the timely decommissioning of certain telescopes. Allows the Authority to require an application and fee for all recreational users of Mauna Kea. Establishes the Mauna Kea management special fund. Transfers rights, duties, and positions from the University of Hawaii to the Authority. Appropriates funds and more.	
SB2279 SD2 HD2 CD1	Controlling Catalytic Converter Theft Regulates the purchase of catalytic converters by used motor vehicle parts dealers and palladium, platinum, and rhodium by scrap dealers and recyclers. Subjects persons who violate related provisions to a class C felony. Establishes the felony offense of theft of catalytic converter. Requires each county police department to maintain certain reported information and initiate education programs to prevent catalytic converter thefts.

HD2 CD1	Extends the renewal period from two years to four years for licensees who are seventy-two years of age or older but younger than eighty years of age. Takes effect 1/1/2023. (CD1)	
SB2185 SD3	Fireworks	
HD1 CD1	Requires the auditor of fireworks and articles pyrotechnic records for each county fire department to submit to the Legislature an annual report detailing inventory, recordkeeping, and sales of fireworks to license or permit holders. Effective 1/1/2023. (CD1)	
SB2600 SD2	Underground Storage Tanks	
HD2 CD1	Beginning 7/1/2022, prohibits issuance of permits for future large capacity underground storage tank systems mauka of the underground injection control line. Beginning 7/1/2022, prohibits operation of, and renewal of permits for, large capacity underground storage tank systems located mauka of the underground injection control line, except for maintenance necessary to safely support defueling, environmental requirements, operations directly related to defueling or actions required in emergency situations. - **HB2000** appropriates funds to school facilities; the largest funding budget appropriated.
- **SB2182** establishes a school garden coordinator.
- **SB2862** appropriates funds to DOE to install air conditioning units.
- **HB1561** establishes a workforce readiness program.
- **SB2818** establishes the position of Summer Learning Coordinator, enabling a fully coordinated summer learning program.

<u>Federal Overturn of Roe v. Wade Does not</u> <u>Affect Hawaii's Abortion Laws</u>

The overturn of Roe v. Wade has put abortion laws in the hands of the States. Here's what you need to know about Hawaii's current abortion laws. Abortion is legal in Hawaii until "viability," the stage of pregnancy when a fetus has developed enough that it is able to survive outside the uterus with medical help. It usually happens around 24 to 26 weeks of pregnancy.

If you have passed the viability stage:

You can still get an abortion in Hawaii under these circumstances: to save the pregnant person's life or to preserve the pregnant person's general health (can include mental health).

- \Rightarrow No counseling or waiting period required in Hawaii
- \Rightarrow No parental involvement even if you are a minor.

New Child Passenger Safety Law

- Child passenger safety regulations before SB152 was signed into law did not specify what car seats requirements.
- Now, children under **two years** old must be properly restrained in a **rear-facing car seat with harness.**
- Children under four years, must be properly restrained in a rear-facing or forward-facing car seat with harness.
- Violators will be required by the court to attend a child passenger safety class approved by the Hawaii State Judiciary.

- Share non emergency incidents to HPD and the City of Honolulu to get them taken care of ASAP!
- Allows user to track status of service request via email & the app

*Do not dial 311 for this service its through the application only *

- Services include: Sewer & environment, Streets & transportation, trash & recycling, city hall & motor vehicle, public safety, city facilities, and animals.
- How it works:
- 1. **Submit:** request a service, report an issue, and help improve your community
- 2. Schedule: After submitted, your request will be reviewed by the appropriate department and work is assigned or scheduled
- *3.* **Work**: They're on it. Estimated time to complete varies by request
- 4. Update: They'll send you updates as work is completed.
