RE: S.B. 2158; RELATING TO THE USE OF SIRENS BY EMERGENCY VEHICLES.

Chair Rhoads, Vice-Chair Keohokalole and members of the Senate Committee on Judiciary, speaking as a private citizen, I **strongly support** the passage of S.B. 2158.

My family and I have lived in the same location for nearly 30 years, in the vicinity of two hospitals and a fire station, and the issue of late-night sirens (from emergency response vehicles) has been an ongoing problem that has gone through ups and downs—periods when it was better or worse—but still continues to this day, as recently as **last night**. Rather than simply using sirens as a warning when approaching intersections, sirens are sometimes kept on continuously as the emergency vehicle travels through the neighborhood—sometimes blasting their horns as well. While the problem has subsided somewhat in the past year or two, there have been other years when we would be awoken four (4) times in the same week, between 12:00 a.m. and 5:00 a.m. Sometimes there are two occurrences in the same night.

While I understand the need to protect the safety of pedestrians and other vehicles, our neighborhood is EXTREMELY quiet during the late-night and early-morning hours, emergency lights are very easy to see at those times, and there are practically no other vehicles or pedestrians on our roads after 9 or 10 pm. In 2013, my partner & I actually went door-to-door in our neighborhood, collecting signatures from other people who were also very concerned about this issue. Within 2 1/2 hours, we collected 96 signatures (see attached), nearly all from different households. Using this list, we tried to communicate our concerns to the ambulance and fire truck drivers—via the neighborhood board and others—with some success...but the problem seems to improve for a while, then resurface again, time and again.

Unfortunately, I have not had time to create a new petition, nor go out and collect signatures again, but I imagine that many of the people who were bothered by this before continue to be bothered by it now, just as my family and I are. We would like to note that we are extremely grateful to those late-night ambulance and fire truck drivers in our area who have switched to "chirping" their sirens, only when approaching intersections. However, this practice is inconsistent, and we still hear late-night sirens blaring continuously throughout the neighborhood, again, as recently as last night. Last night's occurrence also included horns.

As a final note, I am not entirely sure that the amendments proposed in S.B. 2158 would directly address our ongoing problem, but I do believe that something should be done on a legislative level to address this...so perhaps it is worth a try, or perhaps more could be written into the bill, if a solution can be found in time. Aloha for your attention to this matter.

We, the people signed below, greatly appreciate the important service and dedication of our City and County ambulance & fire truck drivers. However, please understand that we try very hard to be good neighbors to our neighborhood hospitals and fire house, so we would humbly ask them to do the same for us. When ambulances and/or fire trucks run through our streets late at night or early in the morning, with their sirens blasting the entire way, or sometimes even honking their horns along the way, it is very very loud for all of us who live here. It can—and does—wake us up at all hours of the night, rattle our otherwise quiet homes and neighborhood, and affect our daily lives...sometimes even our ability to concentrate or do our own jobs.

Between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m., and especially during the hours when it is dark enough for vehicles & pedestrians to see an emergency vehicle's flashing lights, please do not keep sirens on continuously as you travel through our residential streets. There is very little traffic on our streets during these hours, and most of us are in our homes and/or sound asleep. We do understand if sirens must be "chirped" at busy intersections or other important safety points, but please remember to place some value our family's peace & quiet...and sleep.

Thank you very much for your help and understanding. We will continue to be supportive and live side-by-side with everyone as a community, and hope you will do the same.
