

II. Background and Summary

Background

In 1976, Keaukaha Pana'ewa Farmers Association (KPFA) was established serve the Keaukaha Pana'ewa Homestead community on agricultural lands in Pana'ewa, South Hilo, Hawai'i Island. KPFA's mission is focused on building a resilient farming community with an emphasis on food security and sustaining the health and well-being of community members.

In 2012, the KPFA incorporated Applicant Keaukaha Pana'ewa Community Alliance (KPCA) to serve as KPFA's 501(c)(3) non-profit community partner and fiscal sponsor for private, state, and federal grants. For the proposed project, KPCA will serve as the fiscal sponsor and lead partner with KPFA.

KPFA, in partnership with KPCA, manages the Pana'ewa Resiliency and Agricultural Innovation Hub site (Pana'ewa Hub). The Pana'ewa Hub operates a weekly Farmers Market. Through grants and partnerships, KPFA provides resources, agricultural workshops, community programs and engagement activities to community members. All programming is provided under tents.

From 2020 to 2022, we have served 5,233 community members at the Pana'ewa Hub. During that period, our volunteers contributed 2,095 volunteer hours for our programs and services.

During COVID, the Pana'ewa Hub provided a central location for food, resources, and PPE for community members. In 2020, KPFA distributed over 2,870 meals to our most needy community members and kūpuna. KPFA continues to distribute free COVID test kits to our community.

Some of our community partners include the UH Manoa, East-West Center, NOAA, UH Hilo College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources, and Vibrant Hawai'i.

Proposed Project: Pana'ewa Hub Facility Design Plans

In partnership with KPCA, KPFA developed a Pana'ewa Hub Master Plan that includes building the Pana'ewa Hub facility as our own 'space and place'. Pana'ewa Hub facility will include a commercial kitchen and facilities for keiki to kūpuna programming; agricultural training; and an agricultural

demonstration area to support 'ohana enrichment, community economic sustainability, and food security.

The 4,500+ square foot Pana'ewa Hub facility, in its design and capacity, will be activated to support the community, coordinate communication and resources, and ensure that the community's physical and social needs can be met in preparation of, during, and post-recovery of a natural disaster or pandemic related event. The primary resources will include water, food security, off-grid energy production, access to clean drinking water, emergency communication technologies, storage for emergency equipment, and training for disaster preparedness and response

The proposed project is Phase 4 of the Master Plan: completion of the Pana'ewa Hub facility architectural and engineering design and plans; permit set; and final construction documents. The facility design includes parking and surrounding land area.

Phase 1 and 2 of the Pana'ewa Hub facility planning has been completed and Phase 3 will be completed by June 2023. Phase 1-3 details are as follows:

Phase 1- Design Charette: In 2020, KPFA secured G70 to lead KPFA community visioning workshops to create a Design Charette for the Pana'ewa Hub. The Design Charette was completed in November 2020.

Phase 2 - Conceptual Master Plan: In 2021, KPFA secured G70 to lead KPFA community workshops to develop a Conceptual Master Plan (Master Plan) incorporating the Design Charette and include KPFA community driven strategic priorities. The Master Plan was completed in October 2021. The 299-page Master Plan document includes a biological assessment, traffic assessment, archeological report, and a preliminary utilities and infrastructure assessment.

Phase 3 - Environmental Assessment (343 HRS) / Historic Preservation Review (6E HRS): In 2022, KPFA secured G70 to continue the Master Plan work for the site Environmental Assessment (343 HRS) and Historic Preservation Review (6E HRS). The project timeline estimates completion of the Historic Preservation Review with the SHPD Review Period/Letter of Concurrence in April 2023. The timeline for completion of Issuance of the FEA/FONSI and conclusion of the Environmental Assessment Review is June 2023.

The goals and objectives related to the request;

The goal of the proposed project is to complete Phase 4 of our Master Plan: completion of the Pana'ewa Hub facility architectural and engineering design and plans; permit set; and final construction documents.

The project objectives are to complete of the following deliverables:

- 1. Geotechnical Study Deliverable: geotechnical report.
- 2. Topo Survey Deliverables: topography survey and AUTOCAD mapping.
- 3. Schematic Design Deliverables: architectural, preliminary engineering documents, outline specifications.
- 4. Design Development Deliverables: architectural, engineering design documents (including drawings, diagrams, schedules and engineering calculations).
- Design Development / Permit Set / Final Construction Document
 Deliverables: Complete architectural, engineering design documents
 (including drawings, diagrams, schedules and engineering calculations).

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

Community Space/Gathering Place

The public purpose of the Pana'ewa Hub is to provide a central 'place and space' community facility for the Keaukaha Pana'ewa community and stakeholders to participate in programs and services geared to the community and located adjacent to our agricultural demonstration areas.

KPFA operates the Pana'ewa Hub at the current three-acre site located in South Hilo. KPFA via KPCA has secured grants and established partnerships to provide agricultural and community workshops, as well as provide resources to community members and their 'ohana.

Farmers Market / Agricultural Education / Community Resources KPFA operates a small farmers market at the project site and provide community engagement and workshops for the community. Our workshops include hydroponics sessions, CPR training, a Pana'ewa Kupuna series, awa propagation, integrating forest trees and crops, grafting, and growing canoe plants to increase food security. The 3-acre site uniquely supports agricultural training. In March, we will begin development of our Polyforestry and Climate Dashboard Project in partnership with NOAA.

Conditions to Remedy with Grant

Programs and services have been provided under tents. Due to inclement weather, volunteers have to come to the site and take down and then put back up large tents for programs and services. The large and expensive tarps have to be replaced often. Although 1-acre of the Pana'ewa Hub site is fully fenced and enclosed, it is a challenge to ensure that the tents are not vandalized and stolen. Program participants use an ADA accessible portable restroom. However, the restroom is still difficult to access and use for most of our kupuna. A permanent facility would address these issues and enhance our ability to expand programs

and services to community members, as well as provide a permanent structure built to withstand hurricane winds.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

Our primary target population includes approximately 2,500 Keaukaha and Pana'ewa homestead community members. Based on our historical demographic data for program participants, we anticipate that 70% of our target population will be Native Hawaiian.

Our secondary target population are South Hilo community stakeholders that are in interested in and participate in our programs and services. Our agricultural workshops are popular with the South Hilo community.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

The Pana'ewa Hub is located at 363 Railroad Avenue in Pana'ewa, South Hilo, Hawai'i Island. The Pana'ewa Hub's located within Hilo's primary commercial sector (Home Depot, Prince Kuhio Mall, Target, Safeway, Walmart). The Pana'ewa Hub's geographic coverage spans from Waiakea, Keaukaha to Pana'ewa. The majority of our current program participants are from the Keaukaha and Pana'ewa communities.

- c. **Schematic Design**: Preliminary design documents based on the concept design. <u>Deliverables: architectural, preliminary engineering documents,</u> outline specifications.
- d. **Design Development**: Upon KPFA approval of the preliminary design, design development documents will be created. These documents may be developed in partnership with the design-assist contractor. <u>Deliverables:</u>

- architectural, engineering design documents (including drawings, diagrams, schedules and engineering calculations).

Since 2020, KPFA has worked with G70 to complete Phase 1 and Phase 2 of the Master Plan process. G70 is currently completing Phase 3 of the Master Plan process.

KPFA President Maile Lu'uwai has served as the Project Director for each Master Plan Project Phase and has diligently monitored and evaluated the progress of each phase. Ms. Lu'uwai has provided regular progress updates to the KPCA and KPFA Board of Directors.

For the proposed project, Ms. Lu'uwai will continue in her capacity as Project Director to monitor, evaluate and manage the Project contract. Ms. Lu'uwai will also continue to provide regular progress updates to the KPCA and KPFA Board of Directors on Project progress.

KPCA's Treasurer U'ilani Naipo will be responsible for fiscal administration for the proposed project as she has done for all project phases. 4. Our resources to support the project's success are: a qualified grants administration and fiscal team; dedicated Board leadership; collaborative community partnerships; and an established and successful working relationship with project consultant partner G70.

From 2020 to 2022, we managed \$496,000 in federal and state grants and \$32,000 in private grants. During this period, we engaged and served 5,233 community participants with resources, agricultural workshops, and community programs. During this period, we also distributed 2,870 meals to the members of our community in need and generated 2,095 volunteer hours.

From 2020 to 2022, we committed \$210,000 in grant funds to complete Phase 1 through 3 of the Pana'ewa Hub facility Project. In November 2020, the Phase 1-Design Charette was completed. In October 2021, the Phase 2-Conceptual Master Plan was completed. In accordance with its current progress, Phase 3, the Environmental Assessment and Historic Preservation Review, will be completed by June 2023.


