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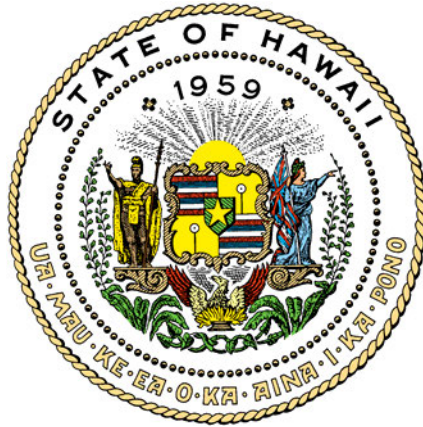

II. Background and Summary

1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

Founded in 1938, Wilcox Medical Center is a not-for-profit medical center dedicated to providing the Kaua'i community with accessible quality health care. The largest medical center on Kaua'i, it is a state-of-the-art acute care facility with a full suite of services offering 30

specialties and programs, including cardiology, radiology, emergency, family practice, gastroenterology, health management, internal medicine, neurology, OB-GYN, oncology, orthopedics, pediatrics and urology.

Wilcox Medical Center is the only trauma facility on Kaua‘i, responding to 25,000 emergency visits, including 450 trauma activations per year. Its 17-bed emergency department serves as the island’s Primary Stroke Center. The Gross & Stengaard Trauma Center at Wilcox was recently renovated to better respond to emergent needs, upgrade technology, and improve efficiencies of care. These improvements will elevate the quality of trauma care on Kaua‘i and reduce the need to transport patients to O‘ahu.

Wilcox Medical Center is part of Hawai‘i Pacific Health, one of the state’s largest health care providers with over 70 locations statewide. The mission of Wilcox Health Foundation is to create a healthier Hawai‘i.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

The goal of this project is to upgrade the Nuclear Medicine Camera at Wilcox Medical Center. This will benefit the Kaua‘i community with transformative technology that radically improves treatment for critically ill patients. Nuclear medicine is a specialized area of radiology that uses microscopic amounts of radioactive materials to examine organ function and structure. It can be used in virtually all facets of medicine, from diagnosis at early stage of disease to monitoring effectiveness of treatment.

The objectives related to this request are to: 1) improve care by increasing the study speed, thereby reducing hospital inpatient stays; 2) enhance the diagnostic capabilities available to physicians as they identify problems and develop treatment plans, and 3) reduce the occurrence of patients traveling to O‘ahu for assessment of critical illness or disease.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

For patients battling cancer, heart disease, brain disorders, and other pathologies, nuclear medicine and molecular imaging enable personalized treatment. The technology allows for physicians to develop treatment plans based on specific biochemical markers and characteristics of the patient’s disease. In many cases, the technology provides information that would otherwise require invasive surgery or biopsy, if the information is attainable at all. Further, nuclear medicine can identify early signs of disease and abnormalities, thereby allowing treatment to be proactive rather than reactive, and saving countless lives.

Nearly 700 nuclear medicine studies are conducted at Wilcox annually. The current cameras were originally installed in 1990 and 2005. Imaging technology has evolved dramatically, especially in recent years. This project is an opportunity to bring state-of-the-art equipment and methodologies to help residents and families in the Kaua‘i community.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

The Nuclear Medicine Department serves a diverse population that is representative of Kaua'i demographics. Nineteen percent of Kaua'i residents are over the age of 65; 16% are foreign born; 5% having some form of disability (under 65 years of age); and 4.8% do not have health insurance (under 65 years of age). The Kaua'i population increased by 7.5% from 2010 to 2018, according to the U.S. Census, indicating an increase in demand for emergency and other healthcare services.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

Wilcox Medical Center is located at 3-3420 Kuhio Highway in Lihue. It is the only Level III Trauma Center serving the Kaua'i community, providing life-saving emergency and trauma services for the island.

In addition to securing the new camera, this project involves renovations to the scan room, hot lab, and control room, which support the Nuclear Medicine Department. The planned renovations will modify the layout and modify electrical and mechanical features. The project timeline is provided below.

The project will be managed by David Yamaguchi, HPH Project Manager. He will oversee the design, planning, permitting, construction, and inspection processes. Mr. Yamaguchi will monitor and evaluate the progress of the project and provide progress reports and necessary feedback to the project stakeholders and executive leadership. The Capital Allocations Committee and Finance Committee will review and approve the project budget. A team of design and construction professionals, under the management of Mr. Yamaguchi, will be responsible for review of construction proposals, material and equipment specifications, vendor selections, periodic progress inspections, and final inspection upon completion.

Wilcox Medical Center received an employee retention tax credit in the amount of \$180,472.40 for the 2020 calendar year. There are no applicable tax credits for any capital project.

Wilcox Medical Center receives funding from the State of Hawai'i Department of Health for its Trauma System Development Program Grant. The purpose of this grant is to develop, maintain services, and participate in the Hawai'i Comprehensive Trauma System. See attached list of government grants for the prior three years.

V. Experience and Capability

HIEMA Generator Installation \$13 million

The aging emergency system of two 500kW diesel generators, originally installed in 1988, was replaced with three one-megawatt generators. This new power source increases facility capacity in the event of an emergency. This project was completed in December 2021.

ED Renovation \$5.1 million

The Emergency Department was renovated to include private rooms, trauma resuscitation suites and specialty exam rooms for pediatric, OB-GYN and infection control cases. The project also added a dedicated behavioral health room with state-of-the-art telehealth technology. This project was completed in May 2022

Computed Tomography (CT) Scanner \$4 million

The new CT scanner enhances the Wilcox imaging department with an advanced low dose radiation scanner that compliments the current 320 slice CT scanner installed in 2013. This project is ongoing, with permits obtained in January 2023 and installation planned for June 2023.

2. Facilities

Wilcox Medical Center is a 72-bed facility located at 3-3420 Kuhio Highway, Lihue, Kauai. Originally constructed in 1938, the facility has expanded over the years to meet the growing needs of this island community. The property and buildings are owned by Wilcox Medical Center, which is part of Hawai'i Pacific Health.

The Nuclear Medicine Department is physically separate from the main Imaging Department, located on the ground floor of the Wilcox Medical Center. The department is comprised of four rooms, two camera scan rooms, one hot lab, and a central control room, totaling 921 square feet. The planned renovations will reconfigure this space to accommodate the new equipment, add architectural elements, and upgrade electrical and mechanical features. The hot lab will be renovated to comply with current U.S. Pharmacopeia 825 guidelines for radiopharmaceuticals.

VI. Personnel: Project Organization and Staffing

1. Proposed Staffing, Staff Qualifications, Supervision and Training

This project will be overseen by David Yamaguchi, Project Manager for Hawai'i Pacific Health. Mr. Yamaguchi has over 30 years of experience in the building industry and has diverse experience in a wide range of projects including commercial/retail, military facilities, residential housing, utilities upgrades, and roadway/heavy construction. His background as a Construction Manager, Owner's Representative, and General Contractor gives him an excellent overall perspective of project management and delivery.

In his current position, Mr. Yamaguchi has managed over 80 projects representing over \$100M and currently manages \$27M in projects between Pali Momi Medical Center, Wilcox Medical Center and Kaua'i Medical Clinic. Mr. Yamaguchi reports directly to Warren Chaiko, who has been with Hawai'i Pacific Health for fifteen years. Mr. Chaiko is a Senior Vice President with system-wide responsibility for the company's design, construction, leasing, real estate and facility master planning activities.

Jen Chahanovich is the President and CEO of Wilcox Medical Center and CEO of Kauai Medical Clinic. Jen joined Hawaii Pacific Health in 2002 as head of the respiratory therapy and rehabilitation services departments at Pali Momi Medical Center and Kapiolani Medical Center for Women & Children. She holds a bachelor's degree from Weber State University in Utah, a master's from Western International University in Arizona, and a fellowship from American

Association of Respiratory Care. She assumed the leadership position at Wilcox Medical Center in 2015 after serving as CEO at Pali Momi Medical Center.

Donna McCall is the Imaging Manager at Wilcox Medical Center. She oversees services for about 100 patients daily in various imaging modalities, including Nuclear Medicine, CT Scan, MRI, Ultrasound, Diagnostic X-ray, Mammography, and DEXA Scan. She has worked in imaging for more than 40 years, including more than 20 years in managerial positions. Donna has an associate degree in Applied Science and a license in Radiology Technology.

2. Organization Chart

One hundred percent of restricted contributions to Wilcox Health Foundation are directed to their intended program or need.

Wilcox Health Foundation has one full-time and five shared employees, along with six volunteer foundation board members. Wilcox Medical Center has 540 staff members and 48 active volunteers.



The ongoing operations of the Nuclear Medicine Department will be funded by revenue through patient payments and insurance billings. As a not-for-profit organization, donations to the Wilcox Health Foundation are invested in purchasing advanced technology, recruiting physicians, supporting clinicians and developing programs.

Wilcox Health Foundation anticipates that the benefits of improved quality of care, improved efficiencies, and improved patient safety will validate this investment. The improvements will enable this facility to keep pace with the latest technology and protocols in emergency care. Thus, Wilcox Medical Center will be competitive in attracting high-level physicians and nurses and meeting the needs of this community.

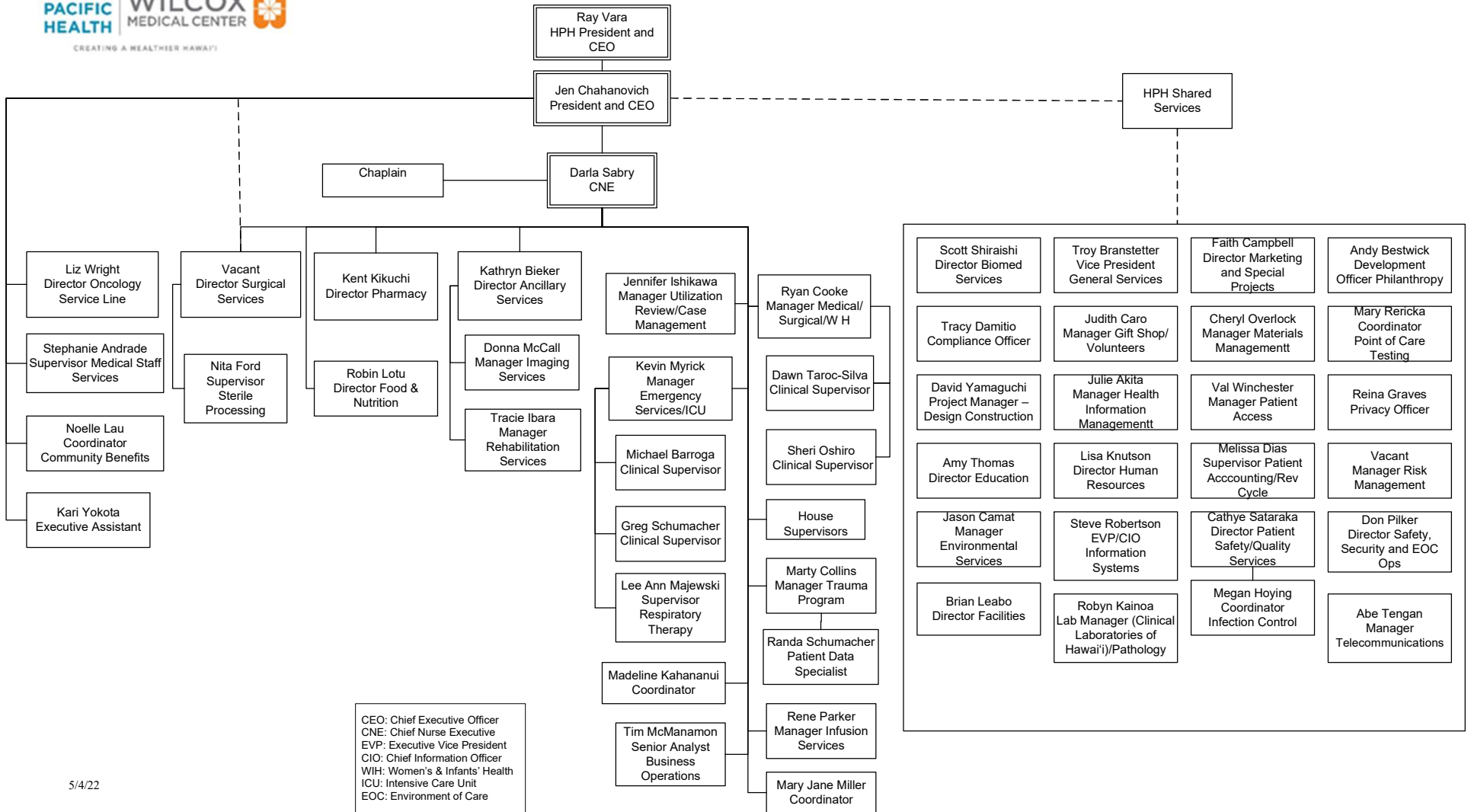
