A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CLIMATE CHANGE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that climate change and
- 2 sea level rise pose significant, dangerous, and imminent threats
- 3 to the State's social and economic well-being, public safety,
- 4 nature and environment, cultural resources, property,
- 5 infrastructure, and government functions and will likely have a
- 6 disproportionate impact on low-income and otherwise vulnerable
- 7 communities. A 2017 report by the National Oceanic and
- 8 Atmospheric Administration projected that 3.2 feet of global
- 9 mean sea level rise will occur by 2100 in an intermediate
- 10 scenario and could occur as early as the 2060s in an extreme
- 11 scenario.
- 12 The climate change adaptation priority guidelines of the
- 13 Hawaii State Planning Act, codified under chapter 226, Hawaii
- 14 Revised Statutes, direct the State to prepare for the impacts of
- 15 climate change. Additionally, section 226-109(8), Hawaii
- 16 Revised Statutes, fosters cross-jurisdictional collaboration
- 17 between county, state, and federal agencies and partnerships
- 18 between government and private entities and other 2023-3010 SB1417 CD1 SMA.docx

- 1 nongovernmental entities, including nonprofit entities, to
- 2 address climate change. Also, section 225M-9, Hawaii Revised
- 3 Statutes, requires the office of planning and sustainable
- 4 development to work with state agencies to identify existing and
- 5 planned facilities, including critical infrastructure, that are
- 6 vulnerable to sea level rise, flooding impacts, and natural
- 7 hazards, utilizing projections and map data from the most recent
- 8 update of the Hawaii sea level rise vulnerability and adaptation
- 9 report, the state hazard mitigation plan, and other pertinent
- 10 data and scientific reports to aid in this planning.
- 11 The legislature recognizes that the Hawaii community
- 12 development authority plans, coordinates, and implements new
- 13 infrastructure and development projects in the Kaka'ako and
- 14 Kalaeloa community development districts on Oahu. Additionally,
- 15 the Kaka'ako community development district will be threatened by
- 16 the effects of climate change, including sea level rise, king
- 17 tides, and heavy rainfall, and the lack of drainage
- 18 infrastructure in the Kalaeloa community development district
- 19 makes it vulnerable to heavy rainfall and other effects of
- 20 climate change. As such, the legislature further finds that it
- 21 is in the State's long-term interest and would serve the highest

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- 1 needs and aspirations of Hawaii's people to ensure that
- 2 development in the Kaka'ako and Kalaeloa community development
- 3 districts accounts and plans for the impacts of climate change.
- 4 Furthermore, it is in the long-term interest of the State
- 5 to also consider climate resiliency in the development of these
- 6 communities, which considers strategies to reduce the
- 7 vulnerability from climate-related shocks, such as hurricanes
- 8 and drought, and improves the ability to recover from these
- 9 disasters.
- 10 The purpose of this Act is to require the Hawaii community
- 11 development authority to consider the impacts of climate change,
- 12 sea level rise, and climate-resilient development in the design
- 13 and siting of buildings in the Kaka'ako and Kalaeloa community
- 14 development districts.
- 15 SECTION 2. Section 206E-33, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 16 amended to read as follows:
- 17 "\$206E-33 Kakaako community development district;
- 18 development guidance policies. The following shall be the
- 19 development guidance policies generally governing the
- 20 authority's action in the Kakaako community development
- 21 district:

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1	(1)	Development shall result in a community which permits
2		an appropriate land mixture of residential,
3		commercial, industrial, and other uses. In view of
4		the innovative nature of the mixed use approach, urban
5		design policies should be established to provide
6		guidelines for the public and private sectors in the
7		proper development of this district; while the
8		authority's development responsibilities apply only to
9		the area within the district, the authority may engage
10		in any studies or coordinative activities permitted in
11		this chapter which affect areas lying outside the
12		district, where the authority in its discretion
13		decides that those activities are necessary to
14		implement the intent of this chapter. The studies or
15		coordinative activities shall be limited to facility
16		systems, resident and industrial relocation, and other
17		activities with the counties and appropriate state
18		agencies. The authority may engage in construction
19		activities outside of the district; provided that such
20		construction relates to infrastructure development or
21		residential or business relocation activities;

1		provided further, notwithstanding section 206E-7, that
2		such construction shall comply with the general plan,
3		development plan, ordinances, and rules of the county
4		in which the district is located;
5	(2)	Existing and future industrial uses shall be permitted
6		and encouraged in appropriate locations within the
7		district. No plan or implementation strategy shall
8		prevent continued activity or redevelopment of
9		industrial and commercial uses which meet reasonable
10		performance standards;
11	(3)	Activities shall be located so as to provide primary
12		reliance on public transportation and pedestrian
13		facilities for internal circulation within the
14		district or designated subareas;
15	(4)	Major view planes, view corridors, and other
16		environmental elements such as natural light and
17		prevailing winds, shall be preserved through necessary
18		regulation and design review; provided that no portion
19		of any building or structure in the Kakaako Mauka area

shall exceed four hundred eighteen feet in height;

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1	(5)	Redevelopment of the district shall be compatible with
2		plans and special districts established for the Hawaii
3		Capital District, and other areas surrounding the
4		Kakaako district;
5	(6)	Historic sites and culturally significant facilities,
6		settings, or locations shall be preserved;
7	(7)	Land use activities within the district, where
8		compatible, shall to the greatest possible extent be
9	•	mixed horizontally, that is, within blocks or other
10		land areas, and vertically, as integral units of
11		multi-purpose structures;
12	(8)	Residential development may require a mixture of
13		densities, building types, and configurations in
14		accordance with appropriate urban design guidelines;
15		integration both vertically and horizontally of
16		residents of varying incomes, ages, and family groups;
17		and an increased supply of housing for residents of
18		low- or moderate-income may be required as a condition
19		of redevelopment in residential use. Residential
20		development shall provide necessary community
21		facilities, such as open space, parks, community

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1		meeting places, child care centers, and other
2		services, within and adjacent to residential
3		development; [and]
4	(9)	Public facilities within the district shall be
5		planned, located, and developed so as to support the
6		redevelopment policies for the district established by
7		this chapter and plans and rules adopted pursuant to
8		it[-]; and
9	(10)	Development shall consider the impacts of climate
10		change, sea level rise, and climate-resilient
11		development in the design and siting of buildings."
12	SECT	ION 3. Section 206E-194, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
13	amended to	o read as follows:
14	"[+];	§206E-194[+] Kalaeloa community development district;
15	developmen	nt guidance policies. The following development
16	guidance p	policies shall generally govern the authority's actions
17	in the Ka	laeloa community development district:
18	(1)	Development shall be in accordance with the community
19		reuse plan, except as it conflicts with the Hawaii
20		State Constitution and the Hawaii Revised Statutes, as
21		they relate to the department of Hawaiian home lands;

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1	(2).	With the approval of the governor and concurrence of
2		the Navy, and in accordance with state law governing
3		lands owned by the department of Hawaiian home lands,
4		the authority, upon the concurrence of a majority of
5		its voting members, may modify and make changes to the
6		reuse plan to respond to changing conditions; provided
7		that prior to amending the reuse plan the authority
8		shall conduct a public hearing to inform the public of
9		the proposed changes and receive public input;
10	(3)	Development shall seek to promote economic development
11		and employment opportunities by fostering diverse land
12		uses and encouraging private sector investments that
13		utilize the opportunities presented by the receipt of
14		property from the base closure consistent with the
15		needs of the public;
16	(4)	The authority may engage in planning, design, and
17		construction activities within and outside of the
18		district; provided that activities outside of the
19		district shall relate to infrastructure development,
20		area-wide drainage improvements, roadways realignments
21		and improvements, business and industrial relocation,

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1		and other activities the authority deems necessary to
2		carry out redevelopment of the district and implement
3		this chapter. Studies or coordinating activities may
4		be undertaken by the authority in conjunction with the
5		county and appropriate state agencies and may address
6		facility systems, industrial relocation, and other
7		activities;
8	(5)	Planning, replanning, rehabilitation, development,
9		redevelopment, and other preparation for reuse of
10		Barbers Point Naval Air Station under this chapter are
11		public uses and purposes for which public money may be
12		spent and private property acquired;
13	(6)	Hawaiian archaeological, historic, and cultural sites
14		shall be preserved and protected. Endangered species
15		of flora and fauna and significant military facilities
16		shall be preserved to the extent feasible;
17	(7)	Land use and redevelopment activities within the
18		district shall be coordinated with and to the extent
19		possible complement existing county and state
20		policies, plans, and programs affecting the district;
21		[and]

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1	(8)	Public facilities within the district shall be
2		planned, located, and developed to support the
3		redevelopment policies established by this chapter for
4		the district, the reuse plan approved by the governor,
5		and rules adopted pursuant to this chapter [-]; and
6	(9)	Development shall consider the impacts of climate
7		change, sea level rise, and climate-resilient
8		development in the design and siting of buildings."
