A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the department of
- 2 education is the largest department in the State with two
- 3 hundred ninety-five schools and forty-two thousand salaried and
- 4 part-time employees. The department of education must procure
- 5 numerous goods, services, and construction to run its
- 6 operations. The legislature also finds that the Hawaii public
- 7 procurement code mandates that the department of education
- 8 comply with procurement laws for its purchases triggered by
- 9 certain threshold amounts. Exempting the department of
- 10 education from certain small purchase procurement requirements
- 11 will help the department timely procure necessary goods,
- 12 services, and construction.
- 13 The legislature further finds that the electronic system,
- 14 due to its complicated and onerous nature, places a heavy burden
- 15 on school administrators seeking to address repair and
- 16 maintenance backlogs and further strains the already limited
- 17 time and resources of these school administrators.

- 1 Additionally, with the recent influx of federal funding and the
- 2 various conditions attached thereto, including the maintenance
- 3 of effort provisions within the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and
- 4 Economic Security Act, the department of education needs to have
- 5 additional flexibility to expend federal funds in a timely
- 6 manner.
- 7 The purpose of this Act is to provide procurement
- 8 exemptions for the department of education.
- 9 SECTION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 10 amended by adding a new section to part V to be appropriately
- 11 designated and to read as follows:
- 12 "§302A- Procurement; educational goods and services;
- 13 small purchases. Notwithstanding section 103D-305(c) or any
- 14 other law to the contrary, the department may procure goods and
- 15 services of less than \$100,000 without using an electronic
- 16 system; provided that the procurement shall be subject to the
- 17 rules governing procurements of less than \$25,000; provided
- 18 further that, based on specifications and with adequate
- 19 reasonable competition, a procurement of:
- 20 (1) At least \$5,000 but less than \$15,000 shall require at
- 21 least three quotations; and

1	(2) At least \$15,000 but less than \$100,000 shall require
2	at least three quotations in writing."
3	SECTION 3. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4	amended by adding a new section to subpart A of part VI to be
5	appropriately designated and to read as follows:
6	"§302A- Procurement; educational construction; small
7	purchases. Notwithstanding section 103D-305(c) or any other law
8	to the contrary, the department may procure construction of less
9	than \$250,000 without using an electronic system; provided that
10	the procurement shall be subject to the rules governing
11	procurements of less than \$25,000; provided further that, based
12	on specifications and with adequate reasonable competition, a
13	procurement of:
14	(1) At least \$5,000 but less than \$15,000 shall require a
15	least three quotations; and
16	(2) At least \$15,000 but less than \$250,000 shall require
17	at least three quotations in writing."
18	SECTION 4. Section 103D-102, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
19	amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
20	"(b) Notwithstanding subsection (a), this chapter shall
21	not apply to contracts by governmental bodies:
