A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE SENIOR MEDICARE PATROL PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the safety and
- 2 welfare of the islands' kupuna is a priority. Scams and
- 3 fraudulent activities targeting kupuna are unacceptable and
- 4 diminish kupuna's assets, dignity, and legacy.
- 5 The legislature further finds that medicare loses over
- 6 \$70,000,000,000 annually to fraudulent claims. Hawaii's
- 7 population ranks first in the nation in terms of longevity, with
- 8 an average life expectancy of 81.3 years. As the baby boomer
- 9 generation continues to age, the number of people eligible for
- 10 medicare will continue to grow.
- 11 The legislature further finds that the State's senior
- 12 medicare patrol program, established in 1997, has a documented
- 13 history of advocating for, educating, and protecting Hawaii's
- 14 most vulnerable population. The program was established with
- 15 two temporary full-time positions and continues to provide
- 16 services with only two full-time staff positions, despite
- 17 significant increases in reports of fraudulent activity. In



- 1 addition, the State's senior medicare patrol program does not
- 2 limit its assistance to fighting health care fraud and abuse.
- 3 The executive office on aging recognizes that other types of
- 4 fraud and abuse that deceive kupuna into providing personal
- 5 information and money, including gift card and charity schemes;
- 6 romance, caregiver, and imposter scams; and ransomware, have the
- 7 potential to harm kupuna. To address increasing reports of
- 8 fraud, medical billing errors, and abuse, more full-time staff
- 9 positions are needed to expand the State's senior medicare
- 10 patrol program and its delivery of services. The additional
- 11 staff will allow the program to work closely with other private
- 12 and government service providers to build a wider "help net" and
- 13 assist kupuna statewide.
- 14 The purpose of this Act is to appropriate funds for three
- 15 additional positions within the State's senior medicare patrol
- 16 program to meet the rising demand for assistance resulting from
- 17 increasing reports of fraud, medical billing errors, and abuse.
- 18 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
- 19 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 20 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and
- 21 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal

- 1 year 2024-2025 for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) program
- 2 specialist III position, one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE)
- 3 program specialist IV position, and one full-time equivalent
- 4 (1.0 FTE) program specialist V position within the executive
- 5 office on aging for the State's senior medicare patrol program.
- 6 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the executive
- 7 office on aging for the purposes of this Act.
- 8 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on December 31,
- 9 2050.
