A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO IMMIGRANT SERVICES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaii has a long
- history of welcoming immigrants. Immigrants and their children 2
- have made, and continue to make, significant contributions to 3
- the State, including the State's economy, workforce, and 4
- 5 community.
- 6 The legislature further finds that immigrants comprise two
- hundred and seventy thousand members, or eighteen per cent, of 7
- Hawaii's population, including one hundred forty-five thousand 8
- 9 persons who are naturalized citizens. Immigrants come to Hawaii
- 10 from many countries; almost half of all immigrants in the State
- 11 come from the Philippines. Immigrants make up forty per cent of
- 12 agricultural workers, thirty-three per cent of tourism and
- 13 hospitality workers, and twenty-three per cent of health care
- 14 workers in the State. Despite these numbers, new immigrants
- 15 face significant barriers to success, including discrimination,
- 16 cultural misunderstandings, and language barriers. These



- 1 barriers may prevent them from accessing government services and
- 2 participating fully in their communities.
- 3 The legislature notes that in 1985, the office of community
- 4 services was established as an attached agency to the department
- 5 of labor and industrial relations. The legislative mandate of
- 6 the office of community services is to serve low-income
- 7 individuals, immigrants, and refugees. In establishing the
- 8 office, the legislature consolidated four anti-poverty agencies
- 9 that administered state and federal funds, including the office
- 10 of the progressive neighborhoods program, Hawaii office of
- 11 economic opportunity, refugee resettlement program, and state
- 12 immigrant services center. Before its consolidation and
- 13 establishment as an agency attached to the department of labor
- 14 and industrial relations, the state immigrant services center
- 15 was attached to the governor's office and received significant
- 16 funding and staffing.
- 17 The legislature believes that the director and staff of the
- 18 office of community services have demonstrated the office's
- 19 ability to serve low-income individuals and families by
- 20 successfully administering millions of dollars in federal funds
- 21 and state grants-in-aid. However, while immigrants and refugees



- 1 can also benefit from these services, the programs offered do
- 2 not address the needs of immigrants and refugees who have
- 3 limited English proficiency or are unfamiliar with government
- 4 regulations and benefits. The legislature considered this issue
- 5 in House Concurrent Resolution No. 169, Regular Session of 2021,
- 6 and convened a working group to "improve access to government
- 7 services for immigrants and increase immigrant opportunities to
- 8 make civic and economic contributions to the community". As
- 9 part of the working group, community groups identified the
- 10 office of community services as the best state agency to serve
- 11 immigrants and suggested that the office be given dedicated
- 12 staff to address immigrant and refugee matters. In response,
- 13 Act 256, Session Laws of Hawaii 2022, provided \$1,000,000 to
- 14 reinstate immigrant resource centers and to support nonprofit
- 15 immigrant service agencies.
- 16 The legislature recognizes that other states provide
- 17 immigrant and refugee services through a statewide, state funded
- 18 office for immigrant affairs. This type of office exists in
- 19 Massachusetts, New York, Maryland, and Nevada, and has recently
- 20 been proposed in California. Many cities across the nation,
- 21 including Seattle, San Francisco, and Los Angeles, have also

- 1 established comprehensive, government-funded offices for
- 2 immigrant and refugee affairs. In Hawaii, the counties of Maui
- 3 and Hawaii have offices for immigrant affairs, but there are
- 4 none in the county of Kauai or the city and county of Honolulu.
- 5 The legislature believes that it is the State's
- 6 responsibility to provide needed support programs for Hawaii's
- 7 immigrants, refugees, and others, and to ensure they have equal
- 8 access to government programs. Dedicated staff and additional
- 9 resources are needed to allow the office of community services
- 10 to meet its full legislative mandate.
- 11 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to establish and
- 12 appropriate moneys for an immigrant services and access unit
- 13 within the office of community services.
- 14 SECTION 2. Chapter 371K, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 15 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 16 and to read as follows:
- 17 "§371K- Immigrant services and access unit. (a) There
- 18 is established within the office of community services an
- 19 immigrant services and access unit. The purpose of the
- 20 immigrant services and access unit shall be to promote economic
- 21 self-sufficiency, inclusion, and community integration for
