

### **II. Background and Summary**

#### **1. A brief description of the applicant's background;**

Founded in 2007 for Hawaiian fishpond revitalization and community education, the mission of Maunalua Fishpond Heritage Center (MFHC) is E ho‘ola kākou i na loko i‘a a Maunalua – let us properly preserve the fishponds of Maunalua. We currently steward two of the last remaining fishponds in Maunalua: Kalauha‘iha‘i and Kānewai, both considered historic properties with cultural resources as they are the only intact shoreline fishponds in Honolulu.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

Our goal and objective is to have a safe roof that provides community members shelter from the elements for our cultural stewardship programs. Also, a roofed restroom will improve accessibility for keiki through kupuna.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

Approximately 800 participants are served per year in MFHC's programs. We receive many school and community requests for access and stewardship annually. Providing a new roof would help improve the accessibility for the community and staff to steward and restore the sites.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

Our target population to be served are keiki through kūpuna that live on the island of O'ahu. Community stewardship has been ongoing for years with thousands of volunteers removing non-native species since 2010. Through engagement from keiki to kūpuna, we have preserved these fishponds through property ownership, lease acquisition, restoration of hydrology, habitat management, restoration of traditional Hawaiian fishpond infrastructure, perpetuation of access and support of cultural practices. Many diverse and vulnerable groups have been served and participated, including youth groups from urban housing projects, transitional shelters, correctional facilities, elder care homes and boys and girls clubs. School classes from preschool to university regularly participate. Cultural groups such as hula hālau, weaving practitioners, lei makers, 'oli, lawai'a, limu practitioners, lā'au lapa'au and hapai pōhaku are some of the Hawaiian cultural practices served. MFHC receives many requests for access and stewardship annually, far more than current capacity allows. Much more could be accomplished to improve community access and restore the sites with a repaired roof that creates a safe learning environment for community and staff.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

Island of O'ahu, generally serving the areas from East, South and West O'ahu.

### **III. Service Summary and Outcomes**

MFHC will obtain proposals to reroof its facility from roofing contractor(s) as well as obtain estimates for structural carpentry work for areas of the roof which require work with the help of our community advisor Franco Coluccio. We'll work quickly to decide which contractors to use and engage them within 2 months. Executive Director, Chris Cramer, will act as the Project Manager, and assume primary responsibility for signing and implementing the contracts. Chris co-founded the organization in 2007, is a former teacher, and is uniquely familiar with the sites, the work and serving the community's needs for the past 17 years.

2. Provide a projected annual timeline for accomplishing the results or outcomes of the service;

This Project should be completed in one year or less. Because we have received estimates for the roofing and the structural repair, we would just need updated estimates and obtain a permit (if necessary). We expect to be able to move quickly from the start of the grant to actual construction and completion. However, timing might be a factor due to rain or permitting delays. We estimate that we can have the inspection of the roof and structural repairs done in the 1st month and obtain updated estimates for structural repairs to the roof as well as roofing in the 2nd month. By the 3rd month we will hire the contractors (carpenter and roofing company) who will begin work by the 4th month if no permit is necessary. Also in the 4th month, community visits will be temporarily halted and our Project Manager will begin to pay contractor invoices and submit them for reimbursement. If a permit is necessary to reroof, the contractor hired will provide this service using a third party permitting service to expedite the process. This Project will take an estimated 7 months for structural repairs to support the reroofing as well as the roofing work. By the last 2 months, we estimate the roof will be inspected, all invoices will be submitted for reimbursement along with all required documentation and community workdays will resume. The long term benefit to the community is that the new roof will be a multiplier to facilitate and support community gatherings and cultural learning of the fishponds for at least a decade.

3. Describe its quality assurance and evaluation plans for the request. Specify how the applicant plans to monitor, evaluate, and improve their results; and

Executive Director Chris Cramer will serve as Project Manager and consult with our Board and advisors, including community advisor Franco Coluccio, on this Grant. In addition, with funding received through our federal NOAA grant, we expect to hire a Grant Support Specialist with Federal grant experience soon who will manage and maintain financial grant reporting records in accordance with grantor requirements; prepare accurate and timely financial reports for us as assigned; monitor grant spending and identify and resolve financial issues; prepare grant-related invoices, budget modifications, and reimbursement requests; assist in the preparation of budget development and grant process documentation. This reroofing project does not include an ongoing scientific data or monitoring component, and is not expected to generate such data.



However some associated data may be collected, such as number of volunteers engaged in supporting this project, number of workshops or workdays, numbers of limu and fish propagated, areas revegetated, etc.

MFHC will be running a “Raise the Roof” campaign in 2025 and anticipates that as much as \$50,000 may be raised through a concert, auction and private donations. At this time, we don’t anticipate asking foundations or other funding sources for assistance. Should we not receive a GIA grant, MFHC will cultivate prospective sources of funding to equal the this funding request.

## **V. Experience and Capability**

### **1. Necessary Skills and Experience**

MFHC has been conducting stewardship in the Maunalua region since 2010. We engage the East Honolulu community in place-based stewardship. We have a proven track record, with thousands of volunteers to date. We have also successfully worked to preserve fishponds through property ownership, lease acquisition, restoration of hydrology, habitat management, restoration of traditional Hawaiian fishpond infrastructure, perpetuation of access and support of cultural practice.

MFHC has successfully managed several large grants: In 2017, MFHC partnered with the Trust for Public Land to obtain funding and successfully purchase and preserve Kānewai Spring for community and cultural preservation as follows: \$1.3 million of the purchase cost was secured through a competitive process through the State Legacy Lands Fund; \$1 million of the purchase cost was secured through the City and County of Honolulu Clean Water and Natural Lands Fund; and MFHC raised \$300,000 for ongoing site stewardship.

At Kalauha'iha'i Fishpond, MFHC has partnered with the State DLNR Engineering Branch and worked with Rep. Mark Hashem to secure over \$1,500,000 to date

towards the project to restore the traditional water flow to the Fishpond and Maunalua Bay. The project also included successful demolition and removal of the two condemned structures at the Fishpond. This has allowed them to be safer and more useful for the community. At the State's property next door to Kānewai Spring on Kānewai Fishpond, we have a right of entry to steward it as well and we have applied for a Reconnecting Communities grant from the National Department of Transportation.

MFHC's staff is supported by its Board of Directors who are from the area and most are Native Hawaiians. They include a professional administrative staff with 40 years of experience who managed a State GIA grant for Lunalilo Home previously, a graduate of the William S. Richardson School of Law with an Environmental Law Certificate, two Federal environmental employees, a Legislative Aide, a natural resource conservationist with over 15 years of experience in project and grants management and a retired nurse who helped manage the Hōkūle'a's Mālama Hawai'i sail and Mālama Honua Worldwide Voyage from 2013 to 2017. With all the years of collective conservation and cultural experience, MFHC is uniquely qualified to carry out this grant. We anticipate hiring 3 additional employees in the next few months which will increase our capacity as well. MFHC works closely with representatives at the State and City levels as well as the local Neighborhood Boards to support the fishpond efforts. The organization gives an annual report to the Kuli'ou'ou / Kalani Iki Neighborhood Board and produces newsletters each year to inform stakeholders and strengthen relationships. The organization also attends yearly outreach events in the community and does presentations to create awareness. The organization has a number of partnerships with environmental and cultural hui nearby comprised of community nonprofits in the area and island wide.

## **2. Facilities**

MFHC's facilities are located at Kānewai Spring, 5975 Kalaniana'ole Highway, Honolulu, HI 96821. Built in 1947 and abandoned for decades, the current facility is currently boarded up due to the condition of the roof. Volunteers need shelter due to hot weather and seasonal rain so the current roof severely limits our ability to serve the public in the cultural and educational stewardship of Kānewai Spring and address the community needs for gathering space and Hawaiian cultural perpetuation and sustainability. This is especially important as families move from the area and the next generation is at risk of losing traditional cultural ties and practices. To meet community needs, the facility at Kānewai Spring needs to have a functioning roof.

MFHC will obtain proposals to reroof its facility from roofing contractor(s) as well as obtain estimates for structural carpentry work for areas of the roof which

require work. We'll work quickly to decide which contractors to use and engage them within 2 months and apply for a permit (if necessary). Executive Director, Chris Cramer, will act as the Project Manager, and assume primary responsibility for signing and implementing the contracts. Chris co-founded the organization in 2007, is a former teacher, and is uniquely familiar with the sites, the work and serving the community's needs for the past 16 years.

WhiteSpace Architects donated architectural plans which will enhance the facility. PBR Hawai'i has donated a landscaping plan that will allow us to offer more stewardship opportunities. Chaminade University design program students designed wonderful interior spaces for our community to gather when the roof is fixed.

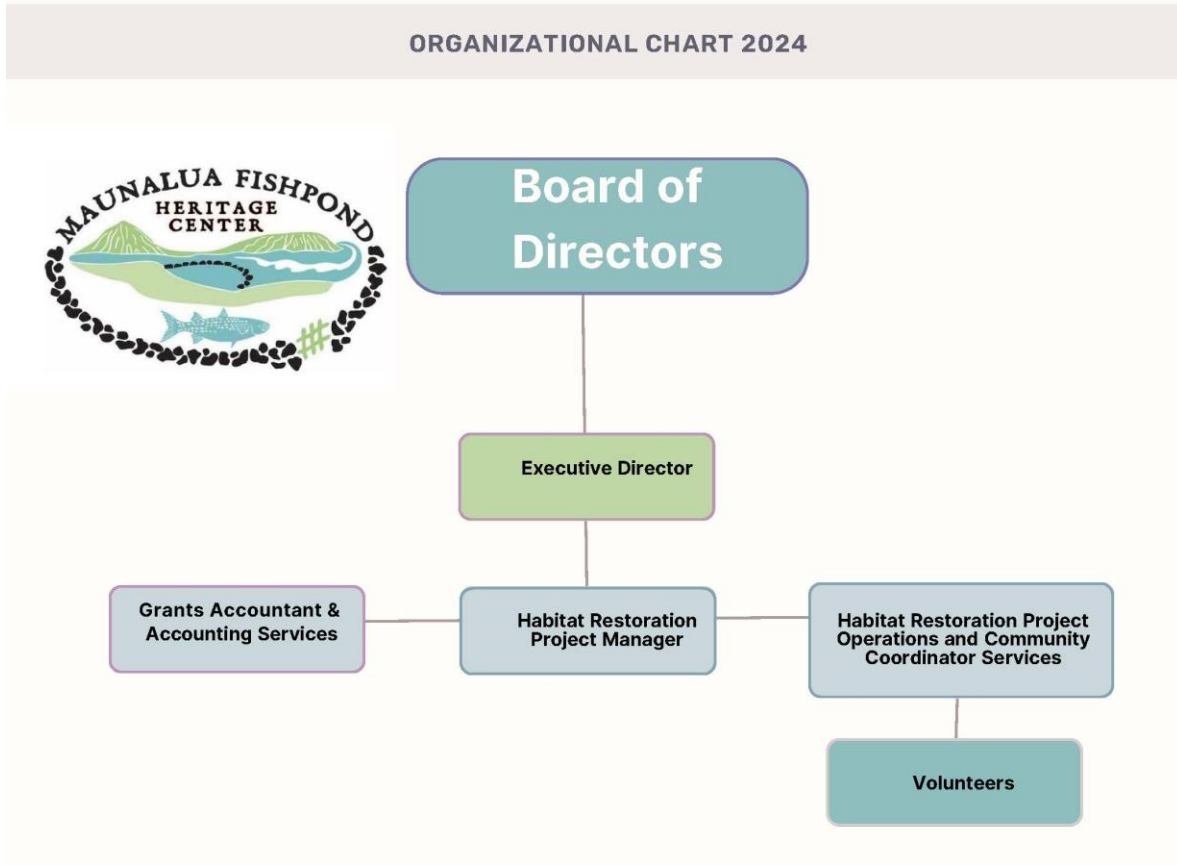
MFHC will obtain proposals to reroof its facility from local roofing contractor(s) as well as obtain estimates for structural carpentry work for areas of the roof which require work with the help of our community advisor Franco Coluccio who is experienced in the construction industry. He'll help to decide which contractors to use with Executive Director, Chris Cramer, who will act as the Project Manager, and assume primary responsibility for signing and implementing the contracts. Chris co-founded the organization in 2007, is a former teacher, and is uniquely familiar with the sites, the work and serving the community's needs for the past 20 years.

Recently, MFHC obtained a 2-year Federal grant from NOAA that runs from October, 2023 through November 30, 2025 in the amount of \$400,000 (\$200,000 per year) to pay for three new staff. While not hired for this Project, they will be available to help keep the Project moving forward as needed.

In summary, we have the tools necessary to increase our capacity for the benefit of the community. We lack the funds to fix a problem with a facility that was abandoned for decades and now poses a safety hazard to our staff and volunteers.



MFHC also possesses a diverse Board of Directors as well as partner organizations that provide support with identifying funding for building maintenance, etc. We also utilize a funding strategy through which we identify additional funding sources, public and private, annually. MFHC will be running a “Raise the Roof” campaign in 2025 and anticipates that as much as \$50,000 may be raised through a concert, auction and private donations.
