## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO IMPLEMENT A HAWAIIAN LANGUAGE REQUIREMENT AS PART OF THE HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS, CONSISTENT WITH EXISTING ENGLISH GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

WHEREAS, olelo Hawaii, the Hawaiian language, is the native 1 language of the Native Hawaiian people; and 2 3 WHEREAS, once spoken throughout Hawaii by Native Hawaiians 4 and foreigners alike, olelo Hawaii was considered to be nearly 5 extinct by the 1980s, when fewer than fifty fluent speakers 6 7 under the age of eighteen were left; and 8 WHEREAS, a major reason for the deterioration of the 9 Hawaiian language was an 1896 law that required English 10 instruction in Hawaii schools: and 11 12 WHEREAS, in practice, this law functioned to "ban" students 13 from speaking olelo Hawaii at their schools; and 14 15 WHEREAS, to save the Hawaiian language, a number of 16 historic initiatives were launched, including Aha Punana Leo's 17 Hawaiian language immersion preschools, the Department of 18 Education's Hawaiian language immersion program, and the 19 Hawaiian language programs of the University of Hawaii system; 20 and 21 22 WHEREAS, in 1978, the Hawaii Constitution was amended to 23 recognize the Hawaiian language as one of the two official 24 languages of the State; and 25 26 WHEREAS, several important gubernatorial proclamations on 27 olelo Hawaii were issued in the 1990s, including gubernatorial 28 proclamations in 1994 and 1995, written in both Hawaiian and 29 30 English, that were issued recognizing February 1994 and February 1995 as "Hawaiian Language Month in Hawaii"; and 31

2 WHEREAS, the proclamations urged people to participate in 3 Hawaiian language activities held in February; and 4 5 WHEREAS, while the Hawaiian language revitalization movement has made major strides in the last thirty years, for 6 olelo Hawaii to not just survive, but also to thrive, more 7 people need to speak Hawaiian; now, therefore, 8 9 10 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2024, the 11 House of Representatives concurring, that the Department of 12 Education is urged to implement a Hawaiian language requirement 13 as part of the high school graduation requirements, consistent 14 15 with existing English graduation requirements; and 16

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 17 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Superintendent and 18 19 Chairperson of the Board of Education.
