# <u>Hawai'i's 3R's To Assist Hawai'i State Department Of Education (HIDOE) With</u> Donations To Cool Schools

# <u>Hawai'i State Judiciary's Self-Help Centers Provide Legal Information To 10,000+</u> <u>People</u>

More than 10,000 people have now been assisted at courthouse self-help centers in the State of Hawai'i. These centers were established through collaboration among the Hawai'i State Judiciary, the Hawai'i Access to Justice Commission, Legal Aid Society of Hawai'i, and the Hawai'i State Bar Association. The first Self-Help Center was opened four years ago on Kauai, and these centers are now available statewide to self-represented litigants who wish to consult with volunteer attorneys regarding civil legal matters at no cost to the litigant, and virtually no cost to the state.

There are currently six locations, including at circuit courthouses in Lihue, Wailuku, Kona and Hilo, and on Oahu, where they are called Access to Justice Rooms, at Family Court in Kapolei and at District Court in Honolulu.

"Legal Aid receives nearly 20,000 calls a year and we are grateful to the Hawai'i State Judiciary for its commitment to the court self-help centers and expanding the resources available for those navigating the legal system on their own," added Legal Aid Society of Hawai'i Executive Director, M. Nalani Fujimori Kaina. Each month, the Self-Help Centers and Access to Justice Rooms statewide serve hundreds of people. In addition, the Hawai'i State Judiciary has also partnered with the Legal Aid Society of Hawai'i and the Hawai'i State Public Library System to make self-help interactive court forms software available at the Self-Help Centers and Access to Justice Rooms and public libraries across the state as well as online.

# Record Ocean Temperatures Causing Coral Bleaching Across Hawai'i

As predicted, coral reefs across Hawai'i from Kure Atoll, the northmost land feature in the Hawaiian Archipelago, to Hawai'i Island are starting to feel the effects of coral bleaching. This is the result of coral sensitivity to rises in ocean. Brian Neilson, an aquatic biologist with the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) Division of Aquatic Resources (DAR) said, "Coral bleaching is a result of a loss of algae living within the coral's tissue that provide them with energy and give them their colors. This loss results in the pale or white 'bleached' appearance of the impacted corals.

There are also concerns of corals dying from bleaching because degraded reefs diminish shoreline protection and the availability of habitat for fish and other marine species, which negatively impacts ocean-related businesses and tourism, availability of fish, as well as quality of life for humans. To measure and respond to anticipated coral bleaching effects, DLNR has begun mobilizing monitoring surveys and meeting with partners statewide to devise coordinated response actions. In addition, DLNR Chair Suzanne Case encourages people across Hawai'i to help reduce stressors and help promote the recovery of reefs. "Being extra careful to not damage corals, preventing pollution inputs, and using pono fishing practices can help corals to recover from this bleaching event" said Case.
