Reopened: 'Īao Valley State Monument

'Īao Valley State Monument is set to open to the public on **May 1** after the State Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) completes the final phase of its slope stabilization project. DLNR also announced efforts to manage the impact of over-tourism with a new reservation and parking system.



Because the park gets busy at certain times, non-Hawaii residents will be required to schedule visits to manage crowd traffic and parking availability. Reservations may be made up to 30 days in advance.

Hawaii residents will be able to visit Tao Valley without a reservation and will not have to pay parking or entrance fees. But visitors accompanied by residents are not exempt from the entry fees and must purchase the "entry-only" tickets in advance.

The parking fee is \$10 per vehicle and entry-only fee is \$5 per person, with no charge for children under three years old. There are separate fees for commercial vehicles. For more information or all day-use reservations, visit https://gostateparks.hawaii.gov/iao-valley.

Get free parking with the new Park Maui pilot program

The new Park Maui parking project is expected to implement a Wailuku pilot project later this year to help bring free parking to Maui residents. The project will include 1-2 hours of free parking in small town parking garages and discounted on street parking, and eventually include affordable and accessible employee parking permits.

To be eligible for discounted and free parking you must use a valid Hawaii State drivers license with a Maui zip code authorized at a pay station or through the new mobile app which will debut this summer. The Park Mobile app will also allow you to pay for parking straight from your phone.

The goal of this project is to help local residents access Maui's small towns, beaches and parks. It will also help to combat the shortage of parking for residents as tourism levels rise. Park Maui's goal is to help create positive parking experiences for all, and minimize congestion and overcrowding at popular destinations.

Park Maui is also looking for feedback from residents on their parking experience. The short survey on the Park Maui website will help address parking issues across Maui and what Park Maui's next steps should be in the pilot program.

Finding solutions for community issues require intergovernmental cooperation

During Maui County Mayor Richard Bissen's State of the County address, he laid out his plans on housing, water, emergency preparedness and taxes, among other issues. At a recent Town Hall by United States Representative Jill Tokuda, she also expressed similar priorities. It is reassuring to know that we are all aware of the same issues, and are all working towards a common goal.

I was recently a guest on a panel at PBS Hawaii's show Insights with Senate Housing Chair Stanley Chang, Chief State Housing Officer Nani Medeiros, and Kenna StormoGipson from the Hawai'i Appleseed Center for Law and Economic Justice.



The topic was housing. Long story short, comments received from viewers didn't surprise us - our kids are leaving Hawaii to find better opportunities, wealthy non-residents are paying cash sight unseen, and a mix of sighs and frustration when housing is described as "affordable."

We already know that finding instant housing solutions is challenging, but I can assure you that we are doing the work to chip away at the issue, by ensuring that funds go to the right programs, by eliminating barriers, and by using the power of taxation to create sustainable policies.

My office is also open to ideas. What programs have worked for other jurisdictions? Are there multi-use designs we can incorporate in our island living that might work? How can we leverage private partnerships to bring the cost of housing down, and make sure units go to local residents?

It has been an interesting spring at the Legislature. Thank you for contacting my office with your concerns and questions about our district. Keep them coming!
