2023 Summary: Putting People

This year's Legislature enacted several measures of special importance to Pearl City residents.

Our large number of senior citizens and their families will benefit from a public awareness campaign on Alzheimer's Disease and related dementias that will provide information on where caregivers can find help and steps they can take to delay the onset of the disease.

The \$1 million campaign has long been a high priority for the legislative Kupuna Caucus, which I co-chair, because Alzheimer's Disease and related dementias already affect more than 30,000 persons in Hawaii and are such a rapidly growing concern.

Another measure establishes an Illegal Fireworks Task Force and provides \$1.25 million to plan and carry out law enforcement operations to interdict illegal fireworks and develop a comprehensive strategic plan to stop the importation of illegal fireworks and explosives into Hawaii.

Current laws are ineffective in curbing illegal use of fireworks, with the use of illegal fireworks increasing in recent years and

aerial fireworks being exploded in Pearl City and other neighborhoods throughout the year.

Several measures introduced by Rep. Gregg Takayama were passed into law.

Home renovations. Reduces cost of home renovations by eliminating the need for approval by an architect or engineer when submitting City permit applications for projects involving single-story homes costing up to \$180,000 (up from \$40,000); and for two-story homes up to \$162,000 (up from \$35,000).

For example, a homeowner hiring a contractor for a renovation project costing \$60,000 will not be required to have an architect or engineer to "stamp" the plans, saving typical fees of 3-4%, or about \$2,000.

Pearl City resident **Shely Chang**, counselor at Kaʻimiloa Elementary School, was honored as 2023 Hawaiʻi School Counselor of the Year and former Pearl City educator **Aaron Tominaga**, principal at Waipahu Elementary, was recognized as the 2022 National Distinguished Principal of the Year.

This exemption for small home renovation projects has not been adjusted for higher costs since 1979 and was suggested by a retired Pearl City contractor. HB 217, Act 177

Anger counseling. Requires certain criminal offenders to complete an assessment and either domestic violence intervention or anger management course as part of their sentence. HB 1344, Act 23

Prescription labels. Requires pharmacies to provide prescription drug label information in special large-print formats for visually impaired persons upon request. This addresses the problem of persons sometimes mistakenly taking the wrong drug or incorrect dosages because of problems deciphering standard-print labels on medications. HB218, **Act 256**

Blind and visually impaired services. Establishes a Neighbor Island pilot program to supplement existing services for blind and visually impaired persons who are unable to access services on Oahu and appropriates \$93,000. HB870, **Act 253**

The **House Judiciary Committee** chaired by Rep. David Tarnas, with Gregg as Vice Chair, spearheaded passage of 20 new state laws on ethics and campaign reforms.

School improvements receive funding

The 2023 Legislature approved nearly \$10 million for improvements to Pearl City schools.

PEARL CITY HIGH SCHOOL'S MICHAEL D. NAKASONE PERFORM-ING ARTS CENTER (formerly known as the Pearl City Cultural Center Auditorium): \$4 million to replace its lighting and dimmer system, and other electrical improvements.

HIGHLANDS INTERMEDIATE
SCHOOL: \$2.2 million for plans and construction of a large, covered bus stop and seating area to shelter the 350 students who ride school buses

PEARL CITY ELEMENTARY SCHOOL: \$1.4 million to replace campus water lines.

MANANA ELEMENTARY SCHOOL: \$1.1 million for planning and construction of restroom facilities for its portable classrooms.

PEARL CITY HIGHLANDS ELEMENTARY SCHOOL: \$1 million for electrical upgrades to accommodate air-conditioning and other equipment.

In addition, construction is advancing on several important school projects which were funded in recent years.

PEARL CITY HIGH SCHOOL: \$1.6 million was released to enable

construction of a health science classroom. The funds will renovate and equip an existing classroom building and is expected to be completed in February 2025.

\$400,000 was released to resurface the campus driveway near the athletic fields.

LEHUA ELEMENTARY SCHOOL: \$7.5 million for design of needed infrastructure and building replacements required due to ground erosion on the current campus.

PALISADES ELEMENTARY SCHOOL: \$5.5 million for construction of a covered playground and restrooms, with completion expected by July 2025.

HIGHLANDS INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL: Projects totaling \$300,000 for improvements to the cafeteria ventilation system, plus new ceiling fans for Building B classrooms and replacement of library air-conditioning equipment.
