

Liquor Statute Bills

This bill addresses problems that restaurants have been experiencing in getting new or transferred licenses. The bill authorizes the liquor commission to issue a new restaurant liquor license prior to the restaurant commencing operation. The bill also requires an applicant for a new restaurant liquor license to include a certification that the applicant intends and shall derive no less than thirty per cent of the establishment's gross revenue from the sale of foods. It clarifies that a restaurant liquor license is transferrable, provided that the transferee certifies that the transferee intends and shall derive no less than thirty per cent of the establishment's


