#### WRITTEN TESTIMONY

**Bill No. and Title:** House Bill No. 1917, Relating to Collective Bargaining.

**Purpose:** Appropriates moneys for collective bargaining cost items for judiciary employees and their excluded counterparts. Declares that the appropriation exceeds the general fund expenditure ceiling for 2024-2025.

### Judiciary's Position:

The Judiciary strongly supports House Bill No. 1917

In January 2020, the U.S. Secretary of Health and Human Services declared the COVID-19 outbreak a public health emergency. On March 4, 2020, Governor David Ige issued the first of several emergency proclamations pertaining to the COVID-19 pandemic for the State of Hawaii, with the last of those proclamations expiring on March 25, 2022.

Unions representing public employees in Hawaii have been pursuing claims for temporary hazard pay for work performed by government employees during the COVID-19 pandemic pursuant to the hazard pay provisions of the respective collective bargaining agreements.

This bill provides appropriations for collective bargaining cost items for temporary hazard pay for employees in bargaining units 1 and 10 and their excluded counterparts. This bill serves as a vehicle for the Judiciary's funding requirements. We will include the final dollar amounts for this bill when calculations are finalized.

Re: Testimony on HB1917 – RELATING TO COLLECTIVE BARGAINING

Chair Tarnas, Vice Chair Takayama, and Members of the Committee:

The United Public Workers, AFSCME Local 646, AFL-CIO ("UPW") is the exclusive bargaining representative for approximately 14,000 public employees, which includes blue collar, non-supervisory employees in Bargaining Unit 1 and institutional, health, and correctional employees in Bargaining Unit 10, in the State of Hawaii and various counties.

UPW <u>strongly supports</u> HB1917, which appropriates moneys for collective bargaining cost items for judiciary employees and their excluded counterparts. Declares that the appropriation exceeds the general fund expenditure ceiling for 2024-2025.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, UPW members continued to serve their respective communities by reporting to work despite the likely exposure to the virus, which in many cases resulted in serious incapacitation and long periods of time lost. Their work helped ensure that the Judiciary continued providing essential services that could not be performed remotely.

Last year, UPW reached a settlement agreement with the Judiciary for eligible members who earned temporary hazard pay ("THP") during the COVID-19 pandemic. While the Bargaining Unit 1 and Bargaining Unit 10 contracts provide for 15% base pay for "severe" and 25% for "most severe" working conditions, our members instead ratified an agreement that would provide them with 20% for a period of 18 months.

This bill is the vehicle that allows the Judiciary to secure the funding necessary to fulfill its obligation to our members. These members have been waiting two years for the THP they earned. Passing this bill will allow these dedicated public servants to receive the much-

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deserved THP they earned for the essential work they performed during the COVID-19 pandemic. We urge you to pass this bill.
