## TESTIMONY ON HOUSE BILL 2483, HOUSE DRAFT 1 RELATING TO CRIMINAL HISTORY RECORD CHECKS.

Chair Yamashita, Vice Chair Kitagawa, and Members of the Committee:

The Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (DCR) strongly **supports**House Bill (HB) 2483, House Draft (HD) 1 amending statutory authority covering
criminal history record checks for current and prospective volunteers and purchase of
service contracted and subcontracted service providers and their employees who are
directly involved in providing correctional programs, treatment, and services to persons
committed to a correctional facility or places them in close proximity to persons
committed when providing services on behalf of the DCR or the correctional facility.

DCR requires NCIC and CJIS background checks on its volunteers and contract service agencies. In 2022, the Hawai'i Criminal Justice Data Center notified the DCR that there is no legal authority or statute that authorizes the Corrections Programs and Services Division (CPSD) to conduct background checks. However, this division is responsible for vetting and training volunteers, and purchasing service contractors that provide programs and services to the offender population at correctional facilities statewide. These programs include but are not limited to education programs,

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substance abuse treatment, sex offender treatment, religious programs, Alcoholics and Narcotics Anonymous meetings, and mentoring programs.

The inability to conduct background checks has negatively impacted CPSD's ability to provide programs and services that are imperative to an offender's success in rehabilitation and eventual reentry into the community. Additionally, CPSD's ability to conduct background checks ensures that correctional programs and services are staffed with qualified individuals and volunteers that aid in the success of our offenders. For these reasons, the DCR is seeking changes to the appropriate statutes to allow the CPSD to conduct the required background checks. This is a no cost measure that seeks to provide statutory authorization for CPSD of the DCR to conduct required criminal history record checks.
