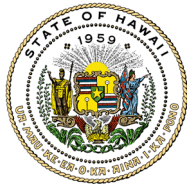
**In consideration of
SENATE BILL 1319
RELATING TO FUNDS**

Senate Bill 1319 proposes to reinstate Governor's authority to transfer funds to cope with the effects of natural disasters, for operating purposes, or to supplement the Department of Land and Natural Resources' Fire Fighter's Contingency Fund. **The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) supports this measure.**

The Department supports the Governor's ability to respond rapidly to a natural disaster and transfer funds to the Department to fund its emergency response operations. The Department's Division of Forestry and Wildlife is the primary responder for wildfires on 26% of the land area in Hawai'i and has approximately 150 staff trained to respond to not only fire but to support other departments in their response to flooding and hurricanes. While the Department's wildfire suppression budget has increased to meet its ten-year rolling average of expenditures, there is the possibility of an extreme wildfire season or other prolonged disaster response (volcanic eruption) that would require additional funds to support continued emergency operations.

Aloha Chair McKelvey, Chair Inouye, Vice-Chair Gabbard, Vice-Chair Elefante and members of the committees:

I am James Barros, Administrator of the Hawai'i Emergency Management Agency (HI-EMA).

HI-EMA provides written testimony in **SUPPORT** of SB1319.

This bill would reinstate the Governor's authority to transfer funds to, among other purposes, cope with the effects of natural disasters and to supplement the Fire Fighter's Contingency Fund within the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR).

HI-EMA is an all-hazard agency that may be called upon to support emergency management needs at any time, regardless of the needs that were anticipated when funding allocations were made. There may be times when the demands of emergency incidents exceed the resources allocated in a normal operational budget, but other funds are available.

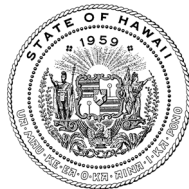
Restoring this flexibility to transfer funds would improve Hawaii's ability to respond nimbly to the demands of natural disasters, hazards and threats by redeploying existing resources when necessary. These hazards include wildland fires that affect DLNR but also pose a risk to developed areas.

RELATING TO FUNDS

The Department of Budget and Finance (B&F) supports this bill.

Senate Bill (S.B.) No. 1319 proposes to reinstate the Governor's authority to transfer funds to cope with the effects of natural disasters or unforeseen emergencies, for operating purposes, or to supplement the Department of Land and Natural Resources' Fire Fighter's Contingency Fund. This bill would amend Act 88, SLH 2021, as amended by Section 8(1), (5), and (6) of Act 248, SLH 2022, to restore Sections 61, 72 and 87, respectively.

We cannot foresee when a disaster or emergency will occur and, operationally, it is not possible to consistently predict the service level requirements for certain programs. These provisos provide the flexibility necessary for the Executive Branch to quickly respond to disaster situations or continue to provide services within the current operating budget, without additional funding. As such, B&F strongly supports S.B. No. 1319 to restore these critical provisions.

I am in support of the Bill. There are several other States that support a Dead Red provision. For history, the reason why this bill did not pass in previous sessions was that there were supposed to be some new devices that would detect a bicycle, moped or motorcycle regardless of size and weight.

These devices are not statewide as of yet and this provision would allow for a temporary fix until the new detection devices are in, and would allow for a provision in case the new system is in malfunction status.
