A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO BURIAL SITES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that traditional Hawaiian
- 2 burials play a critical role in Hawaiian culture. A recognized
- 3 traditional Hawaiian practice for treatment of human remains
- 4 involves reducing the remains to its skeletal remains, known as
- 5 'iwi, and interring the 'iwi in a kapa or lauhala container. The
- 6 cultural significance of 'iwi is deeply rooted in Native Hawaiian
- 7 oral traditions, language, and culture. Native Hawaiian burial
- 8 traditions acknowledge the natural cycles of life and death.
- 9 'Iwi are vital to the perpetuation of living Native Hawaiians, as
- 10 they are the lasting embodiment of ancestors and a continuous
- 11 genealogical link from past, present, and future generations.
- 12 The legislature further finds that coastal erosion is an
- 13 increasing threat to Hawaiian burial sites. The effects of
- 14 climate change pose a significant threat to 'iwi exposed or
- 15 likely to be exposed by coastal erosion caused by rising sea
- 16 levels. Recent extreme weather events such as torrential rains
- 17 and king tides have catalyzed coastal erosion in low-lying



- 1 areas, which increase the likelihood of landslides and high
- 2 surface runoff. Unidentified 'iwi in coastal areas are at severe
- 3 risk of being exposed and compromised by coastal erosion that
- 4 may impact burial sites as early as 2030.
- 5 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to create an inter-
- 6 division program within the department of land and natural
- 7 resources consisting of the state historic preservation
- 8 division, land division, office of conservation and coastal
- 9 lands, and island burial councils, that shall, in partnership
- 10 with the office of Hawaiian affairs, address the location of
- 11 Hawaiian burial sites and safe movement and restoration of 'iwi
- 12 that are exposed or likely to be exposed due to coastal erosion.
- 13 SECTION 2. (a) The state historic preservation division
- 14 of the department of land and natural resources shall establish
- 15 an inter-division program to address the location, movement,
- 16 relocation, and restoration of Hawaiian burial sites that are
- 17 exposed or likely to be exposed by coastal erosion due to
- 18 climate change. The state historic preservation division shall
- 19 collaborate with the land division, office of conservation and
- 20 coastal lands, island burial councils, and office of Hawaiian
- 21 affairs in the development of the program.

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1	(Q)	The	inter-division	program	snall:

- 2 (1) Examine the fiscal impacts of the movement and
 3 relocation of 'iwi affected by coastal erosion to
 4 locations inland that maintain lineal genealogical or
 5 cultural connections;
- 6 (2) Take appropriate steps to move and relocate 'iwi from impacted burial sites to areas further inland within the same moku;
- 9 (3) Provide guidance and technical assistance to
 10 communities, organizations, and other stakeholders
 11 with lineal genealogical or cultural connections to
 12 the impacted 'iwi; and
- 13 (4) Develop policies and procedures to protect impacted
 14 'iwi and burial sites that have not been relocated or
 15 those that have been relocated.
- 16 (c) The state historic preservation division may adopt
 17 rules in accordance with chapter 91, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to
 18 carry out the purposes of this section.
- (d) The inter-division program shall collaborate with
 interested stakeholders, including appropriate Hawaiian
 organizations, property owners, community organizations, and

- 1 other state and county government agencies and private
- 2 organizations concerned with the location and movement of 'iwi
- 3 from areas impacted by coastal erosion caused by climate change.
- 4 (e) The state historic preservation division shall submit
- 5 a report of its findings and recommendations, including any
- 6 proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty
- 7 days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2025.
- 8 SECTION 3. For 'iwi found, the office of Hawaiian affairs
- 9 shall cover costs related to the movement and relocation of 'iwi
- 10 impacted by coastal erosion. For non-Hawaiian human remains,
- 11 the department of land and natural resources shall utilize funds
- 12 appropriated in this Act to move and relocate remains in areas
- 13 impacted by coastal erosion.
- 14 SECTION 4. In accordance with section 9 of article VII of
- 15 the Hawaii State Constitution and sections 37-91 and 37-93,
- 16 Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined that the
- 17 appropriations contained in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023,
- 18 and this Act will cause the state general fund expenditure
- 19 ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be exceeded by
- 20 \$ or per cent. This current declaration takes
- 21 into account general fund appropriations authorized for fiscal

- 1 year 2024-2025 in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023, and this Act
- 2 only. The reasons for exceeding the general fund expenditure
- 3 ceiling are that:
- 4 (1) The appropriation made in this Act is necessary to
- 5 serve the public interest; and
- 6 (2) The appropriation made in this Act meets the needs
- 7 addressed by this Act.
- 8 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
- 9 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 10 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for
- 11 the development of policies and procedures to advance the
- 12 purposes of this Act and for the movement and restoration of
- 13 non-Hawaiian burial sites impacted by coastal erosion or likely
- 14 to be impacted by coastal erosion.
- The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 16 land and natural resources for the purposes of this Act.

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1 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2024.

Report Title:

DLNR; State Historic Preservation Division; OHA; Burial Sites; Coastal Erosion; Expenditure Ceiling; Appropriation

Description:

Establishes an inter-division program within the Department of Land and Natural Resources consisting of the State Historic Preservation Division, Land Division, Office of Conservation and Coastal Lands, Island Burial Councils, and the Office of Hawaiian Affairs that addresses the location, movement, and restoration of Hawaiian burial sites or 'iwi, exposed or likely to be exposed to coastal erosion. Makes an appropriation.

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
