A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO STUDENT TRANSPORTATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that 52,416 students were 2 enrolled in department of education schools in grades nine
- 3 through twelve for the 2022-2023 academic year. While the
- 4 department of education is authorized to provide transportation
- 5 to and from school for students in grades kindergarten through
- 6 twelve, a bus driver shortage has led to significant lapses in
- 7 transportation services. At the beginning of the 2021-2022
- $oldsymbol{8}$ academic year, the department had a shortage of one hundred bus
- 9 drivers, resulting in disruptions to timing and schedule
- 10 consistency, consolidations, and cancellations of school bus
- 11 routes. In the county of Hawaii, a fifty per cent shortage of
- 12 bus drivers led to transportation disruptions in expected school
- 13 bus services for two thousand students. Similarly, at the
- 14 beginning of the 2022-2023 academic year, the State had a
- 15 shortage of nearly ninety bus drivers, indicating a downward
- 16 trend in the available labor pool for the school bus driving
- 17 profession. Presently, 53.2 per cent of high school students

- 1 live within a mile and a half of their high school campus, which
- 2 would exclude them from school bus transportation.
- 3 The legislature notes that other cities in the United
- 4 States offer student free-fare transportation, including Austin,
- 5 Los Angeles, Minneapolis, New York City, and Sacramento. A 2021
- 6 study conducted by the University of Minnesota and Princeton
- 7 University analyzed the Minneapolis go-to student pass program,
- 8 a transportation program that provided students with free access
- 9 to public transit beginning in August 2013. The findings
- 10 concluded that student-reported pass usage and pass eligibility
- 11 reduced student excused absences by 11.5 per cent and 27.5 per
- 12 cent, respectively. Further, for students living within two
- 13 miles of their campus, pass use and pass eligibility reduced
- 14 excused absences by 30.5 per cent and 37.6 per cent,
- 15 respectively. In addition, pass users had grade point averages
- 16 0.28 points higher than non-pass users (Wexler et al, 2021).
- 17 The findings conclude that providing free access to public
- 18 transit is broadly useful to improve student attendance and
- 19 grades, including for students who live within walking distance
- 20 of their schools and may not use transit passes regularly. A
- 21 multi-pronged approach to student transportation is an ideal

- 1 method to address equity concerns and ensure efforts to support
- 2 school choice and attendance.
- 3 Additionally, in 2008, Portland, Oregon began a program to
- 4 provide free bus passes to all public high school students. On
- 5 average, students made approximately sixty trips per month, with
- 6 nearly eighty per cent of the trips being made for the purposes
- 7 of getting to and from work, visiting friends, and running
- 8 errands. Less than ten per cent of students had never used the
- 9 pass.
- 10 A key benefit from increased student use of public transit
- 11 is the experience of using public transit systems. Positive
- 12 experiences with public transit as a child can form behavioral
- 13 habits that often carry over into adulthood. If transit
- 14 agencies can encourage taking the bus as a lifestyle choice in
- 15 young adults, there is greater awareness and an increased
- 16 likelihood that bus ridership behavior will continue.
- 17 The department of education distributes an average of six
- 18 hundred city bus passes per month. However, to qualify,
- 19 students must meet strict demographic eligibility requirements,
- 20 including an active department identification number. By
- 21 simplifying the eligibility requirement, the State can provide

- 1 increased transportation options to high school students,
- 2 including after school and weekend access to medical care,
- 3 groceries, shelters, workforce development opportunities,
- 4 libraries, and other childhood development needs. Presently,
- 5 there is a bus stop within one mile of nearly every school on
- 6 Oahu, Maui, and Kauai. Funding for Hawaii island may also
- 7 assist in the development of more transportation options for
- 8 rural areas. For parents or legal guardians of students who
- 9 sign up for school buses, a completed and signed waiver must be
- 10 submitted that accepts responsibility to locate the closest bus
- 11 route and safe walking route to the nearest bus stop.
- 12 Therefore, the purpose of this Act is to:
- 13 (1) Require the department of education to collect certain
- data on city bus pass usage for public high school and
- charter school students:
- 16 (2) Require annual reports to the legislature; and
- 17 (3) Appropriate funds to the department of education to
- offer student transportation through a city bus pass
- for public high school and charter school students.
- 20 SECTION 2. (a) The department of education shall collect
- 21 data on the EXPRESS county bus pass program for public high

- 1 school students and charter school students. The data shall
- 2 include but not be limited to:
- 3 (1) The total number of first-time users per month;
- 4 (2) The total number of active cards per month;
- 5 (3) The total number of blocked or replaced cards per
- 6 month;
- 7 (4) The total amount billed per month;
- 8 (5) The total number of taps per month;
- 9 (6) The total number of taps per hour of the day; and
- 10 (7) The total number of taps per day of the week.
- 11 (b) For the duration of the EXPRESS county bus pass
- 12 program, the department of education shall submit a report of
- 13 its findings and data collected, including any proposed
- 14 legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior
- 15 to the convening of each regular session beginning with the
- 16 regular session of 2024.
- 17 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 18 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 19 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and
- 20 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal

- 1 year 2024-2025 for the department of education to provide bus
- 2 passes for all public high school and charter school students.
- 3 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 4 of education for the purposes of this Act.
- 5 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
