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SENATE RESOLUTION

URGING THIS BODY TO ENDORSE THE PARTICIPATION OF TAIWAN AS AN OBSERVER IN THE UNITED NATIONS FRAMEWORK CONVENTION ON CLIMATE CHANGE, INTERNATIONAL CIVIL AVIATION ORGANIZATION, WORLD HEALTH ORGANIZATION, AND INTERNATIONAL CRIMINAL POLICE ORGANIZATION; SUPPORTING THE FURTHER PROGRESS ON THE UNITED STATES-TAIWAN INITIATIVE ON 21ST-CENTURY TRADE, A SPEEDY CONCLUSION TO THIS NEGOTIATION, AND ENCOURAGING THE UNITED STATES TRADE REPRESENTATIVE TO COMMENCE NEGOTIATIONS TO ENTER INTO A BILATERAL TRADE AGREEMENT WITH TAIWAN; AND SUPPORTING THE STATE OF HAWAII'S THIRTY-FIRST ANNIVERSARY OF SISTER-STATE RELATIONS WITH TAIWAN AND COMMEMORATING THE FORTY-FIFTH ANNIVERSARY OF THE TAIWAN RELATIONS ACT.

1 WHEREAS, the United States and the Republic of China, known 2 commonly in the United States as Taiwan, are bonded by a shared 3 commitment to democracy, human rights, the rule of law, and a 4 free market economy; and

6 WHEREAS, for years, Taiwan has actively engaged in climate
7 change research, supported anti-terrorism cooperation, and
8 worked with its partners to tackle transnational crime; and

10 WHEREAS, Taiwan's meaningful participation in bodies such 11 as the World Health Organization, International Criminal Police 12 Organization, United Nations Framework Convention on Climate 13 Change, and International Civil Aviation Organization would make 14 international mechanisms truly global; and

16 WHEREAS, the Congress of the United States passed the 17 landmark Taiwan Relations Act in 1979, which is the foundation 18 of United States-Taiwan relations as it promotes a close 19 bilateral relationship that advances mutual security and 20 commercial interests between the United States and Taiwan; and 21

WHEREAS, preserving peace and stability in the TaiwanStrait is crucial to the maintenance of a free and open Indo-



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Pacific and Taiwan is an indispensable partner in this endeavor; 1 2 and 3 WHEREAS, Taiwan is the ninth largest trade partner of the 4 United States, with bilateral trade totaling \$135,500,000,000 in 5 6 2022; and 7 8 WHEREAS, Taiwan supports the United States-led Indo-Pacific 9 Economic Framework, as it will help bolster the economic potential of the region by defining shared trade objectives 10 11 among partners and by addressing standards for technology, supply chains, the digital economy and clean energy; and 12 13 14 WHEREAS, the United States-Taiwan Initiative on 21st-Century Trade intends to develop concrete methods to deepen 15 their economic and trade relationship, advance mutual trade 16 priorities based on shared values, and promote innovative and 17 inclusive economic growth for workers and businesses, including 18 19 through new trade agreements; and 20 WHEREAS, in order to strengthen bilateral trade, the 21 22 government of Taiwan has expressed its desire for a Bilateral Trade Agreement, Bilateral Investment Agreement, and an 23 Avoidance of Double Taxation agreement; and 24 25 WHEREAS, since establishing a sister-state relationship in 26 27 1993, Hawaii and Taiwan have developed an enduring and mutually beneficial friendship exemplified by the Taiwan government's 28 generous \$500,000 contribution to Hawaii in the aftermath of the 29 30 disastrous Maui wildfire in 2023; and 31 32 WHEREAS, Taiwan is Hawaii's tenth largest import partner, 33 and its ninth largest export partner, as Taiwan imported \$54,000,000 worth of goods, with award-winning Kona coffee beans 34 35 being the most popular, and exported \$13,000,000 worth of goods in 2023; and 36 37 38 WHEREAS, the State of Hawaii Office in Taipei and the Taipei Economic and Cultural Office in Honolulu have been 39 working together to promote substantial cooperation and 40 41 exchanges in the areas of tourism, agriculture, culture, education, and trade between Hawaii and Taiwan; and 42



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1 2 WHEREAS, the United States-Taiwan Education Initiative was launched in 2020 to strengthen cooperation in international 3 education and to highlight Taiwan's capacity to provide Mandarin 4 language instruction; and 5 6 7 WHEREAS, given Mandarin's designation as a critical language, as well as Taiwan's plans to be bilingual by 2030, 8 schools and institutions of higher education in both Hawaii and 9 10 Taiwan are encouraged to enhance their exchanges, as exemplified by the partnership between the University of Hawaii and the 11 National Tsing Hua University; and 12 13 WHEREAS, Taiwan has established the Gift Scholarship at the 14 15 University of Hawaii to sponsor Language Flagship for students interested in Mandarin immersion programs in Taiwan, and the 16 University of Hawaii and the National Taiwan Ocean University 17 18 have signed a memorandum of understanding on Academic Cooperation and an Agreement of Cooperative 3+2 Master Programs, 19 which will further improve the bilateral exchange of education; 20 21 and 22 23 WHEREAS, the United States has assisted Taiwan in participating in the World Health Organization, the 24 25 International Civil Aviation Organization, and the International 26 Criminal Police Organization and will continue to support 27 Taiwan's meaningful participation in these and other international organizations; now, therefore, 28 29 30 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2024, 31 that this body is urged to join the United States to endorse the 32 participation of Taiwan as an observer in the United Nations 33 34 Framework Convention on Climate Change, International Civil Aviation Organization, World Health Organization, and 35 International Criminal Police Organization; and 36 37 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this body is urged to support 38 the further progress on the United States-Taiwan Initiative on 39 40 21st-Century Trade, a speedy conclusion to this negotiation, and encourage the United States Trade Representative to commence 41



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negotiations to enter into a bilateral trade agreement with 1 2 Taiwan; and 3 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this body is urged to support 4 the State of Hawaii's thirty-first anniversary of sister-state 5 relations with Taiwan and commemorates the forty-fifth 6 7 anniversary of the Taiwan Relations Act; and 8 9 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the President of the United States; 10 President of the United States Senate; Speaker of the United 11 States House of Representatives; United States Secretary of 12 State; members of Hawaii's congressional delegation; Governor; 13 and Director of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism. 14
