SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF LAW ENFORCEMENT TO CONVENE A SEARCH AND RESCUE WORKING GROUP TO DEVELOP AND MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS TO DETER HIKERS FROM ENTERING ILLEGAL HIKING TRAILS AND TO ADDRESS RISING SEARCH AND RESCUE COSTS FACING THE STATE AND COUNTIES DUE TO INCREASED ILLEGAL HIKING TRAFFIC.

1 WHEREAS, hiking is a popular outdoor activity to enjoy the
2 State's unique natural environment, including endemic flora,
3 majestic waterfalls, and panoramic views of the ocean; and
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5 WHEREAS, the COVID-19 pandemic has increased outdoor
6 activity around the world, specifically hiking in Hawaii; and
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8 WHEREAS, certain areas within the numerous hiking trails
9 available to the public throughout the State pose safety
10 concerns and consequently have been closed to the public; and
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12 WHEREAS, despite warnings, some individuals and groups
13 unlawfully enter trails that have been closed to the public due
14 to safety concerns, ultimately putting themselves at risk of
15 significant injury and risking damage to native habitats and
16 other natural resources that may be in those closed areas for
17 preservation purposes; and
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19 WHEREAS, an increase in hiking in the State requires more
20 emergency responders to be readily available in case hikers are
21 in need of search and rescue; and
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23 WHEREAS, the more searches and rescues made, the more risks
24 there are to emergency responders; and
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26 WHEREAS, the State and counties of Hawaii incur significant
27 costs associated with the rescue of hikers who choose to go on
28 illegal hikes and often ignore signs prohibiting access; and

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1 WHEREAS, each rescue costs upwards of thousands of dollars,
2 and nearly one thousand rescues are made every year in Hawaii;
3 and
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5 WHEREAS, six states - Idaho, Maine, New Hampshire, Oregon,
6 South Dakota, and Vermont - have existing laws in place that
7 impose a financial penalty for individuals needing to be rescued
8 outdoors because of their lack of preparation; and
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10 WHEREAS, because of the considerable costs associated with
11 the search and rescue of individuals who willfully disregard
12 their and others' safety by ignoring warning signs, it is
13 critical to develop policies that encourage public safety and
14 accountability; now, therefore,
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16 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-second
17 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2024,
18 that the Department of Law Enforcement is requested to convene a
19 Search and Rescue Working Group to develop and make
20 recommendations to deter hikers from entering illegal hiking
21 trails and to address rising search and rescue costs facing the
22 State and counties due to increased illegal hiking traffic; and
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24 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Search and Rescue Working
25 Group is also requested to examine:
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- 27 (1) Existing applicable fines or fees and propose, if
28 appropriate, new or amended fines or fees;
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- 30 (2) The process for collecting fines or fees; and
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- 32 (3) The policies of other states with regard to fees
33 imposed on persons rescued from illegal hikes; and
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35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Search and Rescue Working
36 Group is requested to consist of the following members, or their
37 designees:
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- 39 (1) The Director of Law Enforcement;
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- 41 (2) The Attorney General;
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
- 1 (3) A member of the Judiciary, appointed by the Chief
- 2 Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court;
- 3
- 4 (4) The chief of police from each county;
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- 6 (5) The fire chief from each county; and
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- 8 (6) The prosecuting attorney from each county; and
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10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Search and Rescue Working
11 Group is requested to submit a report of its findings and
12 recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the
13 Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
14 the Regular Session of 2025; and

16 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this
17 Resolution be transmitted to the Director of Law Enforcement,
18 Attorney General, Chief Justice, chief of police of each county,
19 fire chief of each county, and prosecuting attorney of each
20 county.
