The Hawaii Technology Development Corporation (HTDC) strongly supports SB2113 that appropriates money to the Hawaii Technology Development Corporation for its manufacturing assistance programs.

HTDC is dedicated to advancing the infrastructure, capital, and talent essential for fostering the growth of technology and manufacturing jobs in Hawai'i. Aligned with our mission, HTDC's programs are designed to offer both technical and financial assistance to innovative small businesses, offering support from any phase to reach expansion and global outreach. These initiatives are closely coordinated with other programs from the Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism (DBEDT) and the University of Hawaii (UH) to maximize their impact and effectiveness.

HTDC actively supports initiatives geared towards the promotion of technology and manufacturing jobs. Since 1989, HTDC has been instrumental in providing Phase I matching grants to companies awarded under the Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) program. In FY16, HTDC expanded its support by awarding Phase II and Phase III matching grants. The federal SBIR funds, while highly competitive and with a fixed budget annually, have been crucial for Hawai'i. Despite a consistently high number of qualified applicants each year, the available funds fall short, leading to none of the Phase II/III

applicants receiving the full eligible amount since FY16. However, the program is expected to yield success metrics like the Phase I matching program over time. The HSBIR program has proven to be a sound investment, with every dollar invested resulting in the attraction of over 20 federal dollars back to the state, along with additional commercialization funding.

Since FY16, HTDC has been offering MAP matching grants specifically tailored for manufacturers. Under the federally funded INNOVATE Hawai'i program, HTDC extends comprehensive support services alongside the matching grants, aiming to enhance the global competitiveness of Hawai'i manufacturers. Hawai'i manufacturers contribute significantly to areas such as food security, sustainability, resilience initiatives, and serve as a crucial driver for innovation.

Business accelerator programs are designed to accelerate the growth of startups by providing seed funding, mentorship, and business network to the strongest applicants. While the Silicon Valley origin of these programs were exclusively targeting software internet businesses, Hawai'i accelerator programs have evolved into a broad range of specializations including software, renewable energy, products, aquaculture technologies, social impact, female founders, fashion, creative media, University, and defense research. The state has partnered/co-invested/sponsored many of the private sector accelerator programs. The model is an extremely cost-effective way of providing support to emerging Hawai'i businesses. Before the accelerator programs were established in Hawai'i, entrepreneurs had to leave the state to receive this type of capital and business support.

HTDC believes the 3 core grant programs provide leverage and positive economic development value for the State.

Aloha Chair DeCoite, Vice-Chair Wakai, and Members of the Committee:

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawai'i Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawai'i's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate, and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawai'i Farm Bureau supports SB 2113, which appropriates funds to the Hawai'i Technology Development Corporation for its manufacturing assistance program.

As expenses rise, increases in farm revenues and profits are critical to the continued viability of farms and ranches. One way farmers can do this is by "adding value" to raw agricultural crops. Currently, off-grade and excess production is sometimes wasted due to market conditions. Converting them into value-added products will not only increase farm revenue but also provide new business opportunities, increase employment opportunities, and address Hawai'i's goals of increased self-sufficiency and sustainability.

High production costs are a major driver of narrow profit margins for Hawai i's farmers and value-added food producers. Labor, taxes, land, transportation, utilities, and supplies are all costs of doing business that often result in value-added food producers just being able to break even.

Hawai'i is potentially losing millions of dollars because of the cost of processing agricultural crops into value-added products. HFB supports any program that supports the production of value-added products so that farmers can increase their income while allowing locally produced value-added goods can compete with imported products, strengthening our local economy.

The strength of Hawai'i's economy is dependent upon a diversity in commerce that is resilient to economic downturns and aggressive in creating new growth opportunities. The HTDC manufacturing assistance program supports this goal.

Makai Ocean Engineering, Inc. **STRONGLY SUPPORTS SB2113** that makes an appropriation to HTDC to provide grants to businesses through the manufacturing assistance program.

Makai Ocean Engineering, Inc. is a locally-owned and operated technology company based in Hawaii for 50 years. While Makai has historically been an engineering services provider, with the help of the State's manufacturing assistance program, Makai has been able to diversify into low-volume manufacturing. Makai has been involved in marine-related engineering in Hawaii for 50 years, and began a heat exchanger R&D program in 2009. Now, we are ramping up production from a small manufacturing plant for heat exchangers on the Big Island of Hawaii, which is sustaining approximately 6 highly-skilled, high-paying STEM / engineering jobs in rural Kona. We have a strategic advantage for developing and manufacturing low-volumes of these components in Hawaii for two reasons: the U.S. Navy and Air Force's presence in Hawaii, and Makai already owns and operates a marine heat exchanger test facility and marine corrosion lab on the Big Island. As an example, Makai has been awarded contracts by the U.S. Air Force, U.S. Army, and U.S. Department of Energy to design new heat exchangers for vehicle cooling and renewable energy applications. We hope to continue and scale-up manufacturing units over the coming years.

The program limits reimbursement to 20% of qualified expenses capped at \$100,000. Because they are matching funds, a manufacturer is eligible only if they are already making an investment in the local community and providing jobs. The program amplifies these efforts, and shows the State's support for local manufacturers willing to make the investment and commitment to adding jobs, and growing their businesses and the industry in Hawaii.

This is why we **STRONGLY SUPPORT SB2113**, which would provide the state matching funds for manufacturing assistance to enable companies to build a manufacturing base in the islands. Not only would this expansion of funding enable our tech industry to advance manufacturing within the State, it would provide highly-skilled manufacturing jobs for our keiki here at home.

Our purpose at Big Island Coffee Roasters is to foster Hawai'i's intergenerational specialty coffee economy for the people and land. We do this by paying everyone in the supply chain a livable wage and maximizing the supply chain value of Hawai'i-grown coffee at home through manufacturing: milling, roasting and packaging for retail and wholesale sales. HTDC's Manufacturing Assistance Program (MAP) financially assisted us to purchase the necessary manufacturing equipment to add this value. The MAP helped us procure over \$300k of equipment that resulted in 13 additional full time jobs as our team grew from 13 to 26 people in 2023. In addition, this equipment increased our annual production capacity from 150k pounds of roasted coffee to 550k pounds of roasted coffee.

HTDC's programs and efforts are vital to the success of Hawai'i economic resiliency. Myself and the entire team at Big Island Coffee Roasters wholeheartedly endorse continued funding for HTDC. They helped us tremendously and we are not alone. Programs such as this must be funded for the sake of our future well-being.

By providing these businesses with access to additional funding, we are supporting their ability to grow and expand, leading to increased economic activity and job creation. Our story is direct proof that the HTDC SBIR program is critical to attracting high tech startups to Hawaii, and it has brought millions of additional federal dollars to our local economy. autism. The data we gathered allowed us to win a new fast-track NIH grant proposal last year. We could not have done it without the research funded by the Hawaii matching grant. Thus, the Hawaii SBIR matching grant was directly responsible for us being awarded \$3.6M in additional federal dollars. That money is feeding the local high tech economy, and acting as critical seed capital that will generate dozens of high tech jobs in Hawaii if we succeed.

Furthermore, HTDC has served as a critical conduit for bringing Hawaii tech entrepreneurs together, leading to collaboration and team-building that propelled our success. We met our VP of Clinical Product, Emaley McCulloch, when she was building a business within HTDC's manoa site, and without her, we would not be where we are today. HTDC is a vital hub for Hawaii's technology entrepreneurship, and we are an example of that.

In conclusion, I strongly urge the Senate Committee to consider appropriating state funds to match Small Business Innovative Research grants. This investment in our small businesses will pay dividends for our local economy, creating jobs and driving economic growth. HTDC is exactly the type of investment that our economy needs right now.

I write in <u>strong support of SB2113</u> that appropriates funds to the Hawaii Technology Development Corporation for HTDC's core programs: the Manufacturing Assistance Program (MAP), Hawai'i Small Business Innovation Research (HSBIR), and Accelerator programs. HTDC core programs develop infrastructure, capital, and talent to facilitate the development of technology and manufacturing jobs in Hawai'i. Following their mission, HTDC programs aim to provide technical and financial support for innovative small businesses from the startup stage through growth and export.

Our company is an exemplar of how <u>matching SBIR funds can be crucial to the success of local research efforts</u>. Consider our experience with the Velella Project, which was awarded one of **TIME Magazine's "25 Best Inventions of the Year"** for 2012. The Velella Project was funded by the National Science Foundation's SBIR program. Our Phase I and Phase II research work laid the ground-work for understanding the opportunity, but did not identify a ready path to commercialization. By the end of the Phase II project, we were still a long way from having a viable business plan.

By good fortune, one of our collaborating partners – the Illinois Soybean Association – had provided a significant matching contribution to our Phase II research to allow us to obtain a **further \$500,000** in **Phase IIB funds from NSF**. This follow-on funding meant we could go back out offshore, and deploy and operate a modified version of the original concept, which could

then more clearly demonstrate the social, ecological and commercial benefits of the project. Out of that Phase IIB work grew a new Lockheed-Martin spin-off company – Forever Oceans that now operates independently out of NELHA, with Kona-based employees totaling over fifteen engineers and biologists. Their head of biological research is a UH Hilo graduate, and his deputy is a UH Manoa graduate. Forever Oceans has raised \$125 million in equity and debt financing (Source: Tracxn: https://tracxn.com/d/companies/forever-oceans/).

The Velella Project technologies developed through these matching funds also underpin the commercial expansions that we are pursuing offshore of `Ewa Beach, as well as in Florida. These technologies are also applicable to the Kona-based kampachi farm, and other future offshore farms in Hawaii and the Pacific Islands.

Without the Phase II matching support of Illinois soybean farmers, then the NELHA-based Lockheed spin-off company, and our own ongoing research program at NELHA would all have wilted on the vine. As a Hawaii company, we cannot always rely on friends from Illinois; such critical support for Phase II and Phase III match needs to be also available locally.

HTDC core programs develop infrastructure, capital, and talent to facilitate the development of technology and manufacturing jobs in Hawai'i. Following their mission, HTDC programs aim to provide technical and financial support for innovative small businesses from the startup stage through growth and export.

HBI has been a cornerstone of biotechnology in Hawaii for 40 years. The company is focused on the research and development of vaccines and therapeutics for established and emerging infectious diseases. The company has developed proprietary expertise in the production of recombinant proteins and have established a platform technology applicable to the development of safe and effective vaccines. Current vaccine candidates in clinical or pre-clinical development target the West Nile virus, Tick borne flaviviruses, Chikungunya virus and Coronaviruses. HBI's drug development activities are focused on small molecule drugs that block intracellular and extracellular bacterial toxins. Product opportunities include anti-toxin drugs for the lethal factor from B. anthracis and the botulinum toxin from C. botulinum.

Over the years HBI has been awarded over \$130 million in federal research and development grants and contracts. HBI currently has 17 employees and has projected annual revenues of \$5.5 mil. HBI strives to create as many high paying technology positions as possible and it is our mission to expand further and open new positions. In addition, HBI has been awarded matching funds from HDTC through the Hawaii Small Business Innovation Research (HSBIR) Program for some of our programs. The HSBIR



program is instrumental to the company to further our research, support our current staff, fill gaps, and bolster our ability to secure additional federal funding.

Through our active West Nile virus vaccine program, HBI has established manufacturing capabilities in the lwilei facilities. The West Nile vaccine project serves both to demonstrate these capabilities as well as advance the vaccine to human testing. It is important to note that with these efforts being done here in Honolulu, jobs and funds are kept in Hawaii rather than engaging a contract manufacturer on the mainland.
