SENATE BILL 2815 RELATING TO INFRASTRUCTURE

Chairs Lee and Gabbard, Vice Chairs Inouye and Richards, and Members of the Committees:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill 2815. This bill establishes a working group to conduct a comprehensive study to assess the State's port and harbor system and the potential viability of each location in that system to support current and future agricultural product transportation methods and needs. The Department expresses our **strong support**.

With statewide goals to increase local food production, and state agency goals to purchase 30% to 50% local, there are significant changes needed to the logistics infrastructure enabling a quintupling of food being transported within the state. While it is ideal to grow what the surrounding community will consume, the reality of our food system requires transportation of food. To make it the most cost-effective, and resilient, port upgrades and infrastructure deployment in and around ports will be necessary.

The department requests two additional areas be included in the assessment. While dry and refrigerated areas are needed, shaded areas to inspect and hold livestock at both air and seaports are necessary to ensure the health and safety of the animals and staff.



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The second request is to ensure areas to inspect good moving between islands, along with areas to quarantine and destroy infested product safely are taken into consideration.

The department respectfully calls attention to a report prepared in 2008 for the Agribusiness Development Corporation, "The Demand for Interisland Shipping and the Impact of Shipping Costs on Hawaii Agriculture Production" posted on the HDOA website, wherein the recommendations (page 23) included a need for "centralized facility for consolidation, deconsolidation and inspection may best serve the needs of Hawaii's agricultural industry and at the same time, maximize the State's ability to increase its level of self-sufficiency." Farmers, ranchers, aquaculturists and horticulturists would be well-served by shaded areas to consolidate and distribute their shipments at every port, as well as by the provisions for in this bill.

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawai'i Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawai'i's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawai'i **Farm Bureau supports SB 2815,** which establishes a working group to conduct a comprehensive study to assess the State's port and harbor system and the potential viability of each location in that system to support current and future agricultural product transportation methods and needs.

HFB policy supports a viable interisland transportation system to meet the needs of our farmers and ranchers. Hawaii's intrastate transportation system is critical to Hawaii's agriculture. Improvements to the system are necessary for the current and future success of agriculture, including Biosecurity concerns.

The Hawaii Department of Agriculture's "2015 Agricultural Baseline Summary" reports the State has 913,261 acres in production of which 41,818 are on O'ahu. This means the major agricultural acreage is on the neighbor islands making them even more dependent on ports and harbors as part of their supply chain.

This study will also be a useful tool in allowing for data-driven decision-making relating to agricultural product transportation. The Hawai'i Farm Bureau is prepared to assist with providing input to the Working Group for the study.
