HHHRC seeks to maintain its medical-legal partnership with Legal Aid Services of Hawaii to offer needed direct legal assistance to its clients and participants on civil legal matters, including the procurement of needed documents related to identification (birth certificates, SSNs), medical insurance and available government benefits, and resolution of disputes with landlords, utilities, and family law concerns. Those served include unsheltered homeless, kauhale residents, and those reached by our street medical outreach team, mobile medical unit, syringe exchange program, and clinical services, including mental health and substance use disorder treatment.

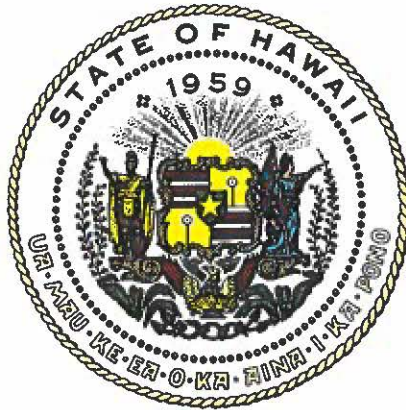

HHHRC's mission is to reduce harm, promote health, create wellness, and fight stigma in Hawai'i and the Pacific.

HHHRC carries the work of its predecessor organizations, Life Foundation and The CHOW Project, forward by providing medical case management services to over 500 persons living with HIV on Oahu and mobile syringe exchange services on O'ahu, Kaua'i, Maui, and Hawai'i Island. It offers HIV and hepatitis testing, linkage to care, and safer sex supplies a no-cost in its clinic, syringe exchange

mobile units, and its mobile medical unit. HHHRC's street medicine team provides wound care and access to behavioral health services in downtown Honolulu and through a mobile medical unit across the island. Overdose prevention training and access is provided on a statewide basis. HHHRC also provides homelessness services in urban Honolulu and the Upper Windward Coast (including North Shore). During much of the COVID-19 pandemic HHHRC staffed the state's quarantine facility in Waikīkī.

HHHRC's individual case management approach to service provision has proven to be effective in the context of securing safe and stable housing or ensuring that those receiving specialized medical care have the necessary supports to remain alive and healthy. In recent years, this has included a medical-legal partnership (MLP) with Legal Aid Services of Hawai'i (LASH), which assists our clients with the navigation of legal issues that are barriers to obtaining and maintaining housing and medical care. Since 2021, the MLP has been sustained through time-limited private grant funding and available discretionary resources.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

The overall goals of this ongoing partnership are (1) to more effectively meet the needs our clients and participants in accessing needed documents, applying for needed medical insurance (MedQuest) and available government support (including SSI and SSDI), and resolving disputes with landlords and utility companies, and (2) to reduce the number of hours that HHHRC staff spends on the procurement of government documents and dispute resolution. HHHRC began to explore the possibility of a medical-legal partnership due to reports from our medical case managers and outreach workers regarding persistent obstacles in the procurement and retention of housing, medical care, and income support.

Medical-legal partnerships have an established record in reducing health-harming legal needs to improve client health and well-being. People with chronic illnesses, including HIV and viral hepatitis, maintain better health and are admitted to the hospital less frequently, saving health care costs. Those served by medical-legal partnerships more commonly take their medications as prescribed; experience improvements in mental health; are more stably housed and less likely to have utilities shut off; and have access to greater financial resources. Health care providers also benefit, as clinical services provided to patients with access to medical-legal partnerships are more frequently reimbursed by public and private payers.

We are fortunate to have an experienced legal services partner that is engaged in medical-legal partnerships elsewhere in the state with community health centers. These centers typically have clients with less acuity than those persons served by our agency. Our LASH attorney has informed us on an anecdotal basis that we are her most active MLP.

LASH provides on-site direct clinic integration screening, which includes self-introduction to clients as a member of the case-management or clinical team and introduction to available legal services; obtaining required documentation; screening and identification of current and prospective health-harming legal needs; and communication with case managers and primary care providers where written consent is provided.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

HHHRC seeks to maintain its medical-legal partnership (MLP) to offer needed direct legal assistance to those we serve. This list includes persons living with HIV on O'ahu receiving medical case management services, those accessing syringe exchange services on O'ahu, those receiving outreach and housing navigation services in urban Honolulu and the Upper Windward Coast, and those assisted by our transgender services program. There is a persistent demand for legal services, particularly with the procurement of government issued identification to obtain housing, health care, nutrition assistance, and other available support.

Our current partnership with Legal Aid Society of Hawai'i (LASH) provides direct access to legal services for our clients, including in-person private assessments and consultations in our Kaka'ako office, for three hours per week. We hope to continue our partnership and increase our engagement with clients to six hours per week.

Our case managers, patient navigators, and outreach workers have spent an inordinate amount of time assisting clients with issues that could benefit from direct, on-site access to legal services, including paperwork to securing adequate housing, ensuring access to medical insurance, sustained medical care and available government benefits, procurement of identification documents, help with tax filings and advance health care directives, management of conflicts with landlords and utility companies, and discrimination that impacts their ability to access housing, employment, and education.

In the case of those clients who are living with HIV, adherence to their medication regimen is vital to achieving and maintaining viral suppression. Our transgender population has a range of legal issues directly related to their gender identity, including legal name changes, access to gender-affirming medical interventions, and discrimination in housing, education, and employment. Those referred to us by Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion (LEAD), now called Letting Everyone Advance with Dignity, require help with identity documents, shelter and housing, access to medical care, and criminal legal supervision.

A majority of our clients have had some level of involvement with the criminal legal system, most of which is related to chaotic substance use, substance use disorder, mental health conditions, and often long histories of trauma and abuse.

While the MLP does not address criminal legal issues directly, it has assisted with facilitating re-entry through documentation assistance.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

The primary populations to be served by HHHRC's medical-legal partnership with Legal Aid Services of Hawaii are persons experiencing unsheltered homelessness in Regions 1 and 6 on Oahu, persons living with HIV on Oahu, those receiving clinical services through our street-based medicine team and mobile medical unit, including behavioral health services, and those served by its transgender services program, Kua'ana Project.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

Areas that will be served will be primarily based in urban Honolulu (Chinatown to University area), as well as those areas where our mobile medical unit serves, including West O'ahu (Leeward Coast) and Central O'ahu (Wahiawa to North Shore).

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

HHHRC management and staff, including medical case managers and outreach workers, receive ongoing education and training by Legal Aid staff to facilitate intake screening and referral. Where appropriate, HHHRC medical case managers work with Legal Aid staff and a client's primary care provider to address the resolution of medical-legal harms that directly impact a client's immediate health needs. HHHRC's Executive Director and senior management consult regularly with Legal Aid staff to discuss information gathered through legal screenings, to monitor case-specific progress, and to identify systemic issues and challenges.

Our medical-legal partnership facilitated the procurement of identification documents, as well as resolving needs related to income, insurance, housing, and family issues. Legal Aid has five categories of assistance provided to clients: income and insurance, housing and utilities, education and employment supports; legal status needs and veterans' affairs; and personal and family stability.

Through the first three quarters of the current services contract, Legal Aid screened 26 cases and closed 31 cases. Each case represents hours of staff time saved in navigating government and insurance systems to ensure client access to appropriate medical care, housing, and available government support.

Legal Aid is also available to answer questions from our case managers that may not require the opening of a case. In the most recent quarter, it provided us with 9 provider consultations.

2. Provide a projected annual timeline for accomplishing the results or outcomes of the service;

The project budget reflects the cost of a services contract with Legal Aid Services of Hawai'i to maintain three hours per week. Our Legal Aid staff attorney is provided with the necessary office space and technology to conduct business on-site. She will also have the technology necessary to conduct intake assessments in the field in conjunction with our mobile medical unit.

Legal Aid Services of Hawaii provides a quarterly report on the number of cases it screens and closes.

In alignment with its current practices for contracted services delivery, HHHRC will continue to advance continuous quality improvement mechanisms in the operation of its medical-legal partnership, including gauging overall client and participant satisfaction by means of a semi-annual client satisfaction survey. This survey measures a client's satisfaction with services received from HHHRC and helps to identify opportunities for improvement.

V. Experience and Capability

1. Necessary Skills and Experience

HHHRC has a long history of working with persons from under-resourced communities who are disproportionately impacted by social determinants of health. We have over 30 years of institutional experience in the provision of medical case management services for people living with HIV on O'ahu and administering Hawai'i's statewide syringe access program on O'ahu, Kaua'i, Maui, and Hawai'i counties. In 2023, we served 529 clients living with HIV, with 85% of that number maintaining an undetectable viral load that maintains their physical health and well-being and prevents the transmission of HIV to others.

HHHRC's clinical services delivery in 2023 included 400 substance use treatment patients, 372 street based wound care patients, 158 mental health services patients, and 197 receiving pre-exposure prophylaxis services. 83 monkeypox vaccinations were administered. 801 STI screenings were administered. In terms of prevention services, we exchanged 599,683 syringes across the state over 19,132 visits and distributed 91,708 packets of condoms and personal lubricant. We conducted 996 HIV tests and 956 HCV tests.

HHHRC trained 301 registered participants on opioid overdose prevention and distributed 13,140 naloxone kits. We also enrolled 713 persons in our smoking cessation services program. We enrolled 265 clients in insurance and provided 97 trans clients with documentation assistance.

These activities are done through services contracts primarily with the Hawai'i State Department of Health, with articulated goals and objectives that are specific, measurable, achievable, relevant, and time bound. Since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, HHHRC expanded its services provision to include housing outreach and navigation services with the Hawaii State Department of Human Services in Regions 1 and 6, including a Youth Homelessness Demonstration Program tailored toward LGBTQIA+ unaccompanied youth experiencing homelessness. HHHRC also operated the state's COVID isolation and stabilization facility in Waikiki through the end of the 2022 calendar year.

We also use a case management approach with clients experiencing homelessness. According to the National Health Care for the Homeless Council, case management can help reduce costs as it may alleviate the economic impact of homelessness through changes in service utilization patterns, increasing insurance coverage, and decreasing substance use and psychiatric symptoms.

Current case management includes the provision of legal services to reduce health-harming legal needs through our medical legal partnership.

2. Facilities

For over two decades, HHHRC has been located on the second floor of the 677 Ala Moana Building in the Kaka'ako District of Honolulu. The building is centrally located with ample visitor parking. The site meets Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requirements (wheelchair accessible business and restroom facilities), and has a telecommunications device for the deaf and the hearing/speech impaired. Computers are connected via a secure local area network and password protected WiFi may be used for personal devices.

HHHRC's office provides privacy and comfort from people who work, visit, or receive services at the organization. With over 8,000 square feet, HHHRC can support the workspace, training needs, and administrative needs for staff and volunteers. The site currently houses HHHRC's clinic, testing, medical case management, and other service programs, including smoking cessation, sexual health, and transgender services. HHHRC's clinic provides wound care, HIV and HCV treatment, STI screening, and behavioral health services, including buprenorphine for opioid use disorder. Additionally, there is a kitchen, several meeting spaces, and a waiting room for client use.

Ms. Lusk has over thirty years of experience dedicated to reducing health disparities and stigma as it relates to HIV, viral hepatitis and other chronic conditions linked to substance use. As the immediate past Chair of Partners in Care, Oahu's homelessness coalition, and Co-Director of Hep Free Hawai'i, she works to support systems integration and the intersection of mental health, substance use, homelessness, chronic health conditions and the criminal legal system.


