## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII RESIDENT TUITION FEE.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that facilitating
postsecondary education and training for all interested high
school graduates is a matter of statewide concern.


4 Postsecondary options assist graduates by preparing them for 5 jobs and career pathways that typically pay higher wages, which 6 enables them to achieve their educational and career goals and 7 afford the State's high cost of living. Increased enrollment 8 and completion of postsecondary education and training will 9 increase the State's human capital.

10 The legislature further finds that the university of Hawaii 11 amended its administrative rules to streamline the enrollment 12 process for all applicants for admission into the university of 13 Hawaii system; however, the current statutory requirements 14 regarding residency for tuition purposes pose challenges for 15 some local graduating high school seniors or recent graduates. 16 Specifically, some students experiencing homelessness have 17 difficulty providing evidence of bona fide residency as required


