A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SURFING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that surfing is of
- 2 significant cultural, social, and economic value to the people
- 3 of the State, as well as the many visitors who travel to the
- 4 State for surfing. In recognition of surfing as a part of the
- 5 State's history and its long-standing cultural roots in Hawaii,
- 6 surfing was sanctioned by the department of education and
- 7 approved by the board of education as a high school sport in
- 8 2016. However, only one of five local athletic leagues have
- 9 sponsored surfing. The lack of interscholastic surfing programs
- 10 limits opportunities for inspired students to pursue competitive
- 11 surfing.
- 12 The legislature further finds that surfing is a significant
- 13 economic driver for the State. Surfing has grown into an
- 14 important industry in the State, bringing in tourists from all
- 15 over the world. The State is also known for hosting prestigious
- 16 surf contests that attract numerous competitors and spectators
- 17 who are interested in viewing the sport in person. An economic

- 1 impact study on the 2010 Vans Triple Crown of Surfing, held on
- 2 the north shore of Oahu, estimated that the event generated
- 3 \$20,900,000 in spending. Devoting resources to surfing programs
- 4 in the State's schools will perpetuate the sport of surfing in
- 5 the State and continue to entice tourists across the globe to
- 6 visit the State to spectate or experience surfing firsthand.
- 7 The purpose of this Act is to appropriate funds to the
- 8 department of education to support the establishment of surfing
- 9 as an interscholastic sport.
- 10 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
- 11 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$685,870 or so much
- 12 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and the
- 13 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 14 2026-2027 to support the establishment of surfing as an
- 15 interscholastic sport.
- 16 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 17 of education for the purposes of this Act.
- 18 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2025.
