A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that roadway safety is
- 2 the top transportation priority. Pedestrians, bicyclists, and
- 3 other vulnerable roadway users are disproportionately impacted
- 4 by traffic fatalities and injuries, which are on the rise.
- 5 Between the 2009 to 2013 and the 2014 to 2018 five-year time
- 6 periods, pedestrian fatalities across the State rose by
- 7 twenty-six per cent. Decades of automobile-centric planning and
- 8 development have created formidable mobility barriers, including
- 9 the lack of safe and accessible bicycle and pedestrian
- 10 infrastructure. Under Navahine v. Hawai'i Department of
- 11 Transportation, CIVIL NO. 1CCV-22-0000631 (Hawaii Cir. Ct.), the
- 12 State has committed to completing its multimodal, bike and
- 13 pedestrian network within the next five years.
- 14 The legislature further finds that a disproportionately
- 15 high number of pedestrian injuries and deaths occur at
- 16 crosswalks and intersections. One solution proven to help

1	reduce th	ese tragedies is to allow pedestrians and motorists	
2	greater v	isibility as they enter and drive through crosswalks.	
3	The	legislature finds that illegal parking near crosswalks	
4	and intersections creates dangerous conditions for pedestrians,		
5	particula	rly children walking to school. To ensure that fines	
6	from these violations are used to improve pedestrian safety,		
7	these revenues should be deposited into the safe routes to		
8	school pr	ogram special fund to fund infrastructure improvements	
9	that prom	ote public safety.	
10	Ther	efore, the purpose of this Act is to:	
11	(1)	Prohibit street parking within twenty feet on each	
12		side of any crosswalk or intersection, regardless of	
13		the presence or absence of official signs or curb	
14		markings;	
15	(2)	Require fines collected for street parking	
16		restrictions to be deposited into the safe routes to	
17		school program special fund; and	
18	(3)	Specify that signs or curb markings are not required	
19		to restrict parking within twenty feet of a crosswalk	

or intersection.

9	designated	d buffer zone if the vehicle is:
10	(1)	An authorized emergency vehicle performing the
11		functions under section 291C-26;
12	(2)	An official federal, state, or county vehicle in the
13		performance of its duty;
14	(3)	A stalled or broken vehicle;
15	(4)	Assisting a stalled or broken vehicle;
16	<u>(5)</u>	Yielding to an authorized emergency vehicle pursuant
17		to section 291C-65; or
18	<u>(6)</u>	Otherwise authorized by law.
19	(b)	Any person who violates this section shall be subject
20	to a fine	of not more than \$50 for each violation. Each day a
21	wiolation	occure shall constitute a separate offense

1	(c) All fines collected pursuant to this section shall be			
2	deposited into the safe routes to school program special fund			
3	established under section 291C-4."			
4	SECTION 3. Section 291C-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is			
5	amended to read as follows:			
6	"§291C-4 Safe routes to school program special fund;			
7	establishment. There [is] shall be established in the state			
8	treasury the safe routes to school program special fund, into			
9	which shall be deposited:			
10	(1) Assessments collected for speeding in a school zone,			
11	pursuant to section 291C-104; [and]			
12	(2) Safe routes to school program surcharges collected in			
13	accordance with sections 291-16 and 291C-5[\div]; and			
14	(3) Fines collected for street parking restrictions			
15	pursuant to section 291C"			
16	SECTION 4. Section 291C-111, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is			
17	amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:			
18	"(b) The director of transportation, the counties, and			
19	owners of private highways, with the consent of the county			
20	official responsible for traffic control with respect to			
21	highways under their respective jurisdictions, shall place signs

- 1 or curb markings that are clearly visible to an ordinarily
- 2 observant person prohibiting or restricting the stopping,
- 3 standing, or parking of vehicles on the highway[--Such];
- 4 provided that any sign or curb marking shall not be required to
- 5 restrict parking within twenty feet of a crosswalk or
- 6 intersection in accordance with section 291C- . The signs or
- 7 curb markings shall be official signs and markings, and no
- 8 person shall stop, stand, or park any vehicle in violation of
- 9 the restrictions stated on [such] the signs or markings[-]
- 10 except as otherwise provided by law."
- 11 SECTION 5. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
- 12 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
- 13 begun before its effective date.
- 14 SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 15 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 16 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on January 1, 2026.
