
A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CANNABIS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that access for
2 qualifying patients and primary caregivers to medical cannabis
3 and particularly licensed medical cannabis dispensaries remains
4 challenging due to limited access to medical providers, delays
5 in obtaining allowed access to enter and purchase medical
6 cannabis, and the availability of cannabis through a thriving
7 illicit market.

8 The legislature further finds that registration for the
9 medical cannabis program has decreased in the last few years.
10 While the number of registered medical cannabis patients reached
11 its peak in August 2021, with 35,444 card-holding patients,
12 since then, the number of patients has decreased over fifteen
13 per cent to 30,035 by November 2024. This appears to indicate
14 that residents are shifting away from licensed medical cannabis
15 dispensaries, and instead are obtaining their medical cannabis
16 from elsewhere due to difficulties, delays in registering, and
17 the ease and lower costs in obtaining cannabis elsewhere.



1 The legislature also finds that this apparent shift away
2 from licensed medical cannabis dispensaries toward the illicit
3 market, undermines the purposes of the medical cannabis program
4 in ensuring patient safety, product safety, and public safety.

5 The legislature additionally finds that in 2021, Act 34,
6 Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, eliminated the requirement for a
7 physician-patient relationship to be established by an initial
8 in-person consultation, and authorized the relationship to be
9 established via telehealth.

10 The legislature further finds that the department of health
11 office of medical cannabis control and regulation has a
12 comprehensive registration system that could temporarily allow a
13 qualifying patient or primary caregiver to purchase medical
14 cannabis, instead of having the patient's access to medical
15 cannabis delayed by a few to several days while awaiting
16 delivery of the registration card from the department.

17 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to expand access to
18 care by easing some of the burdens upon qualifying patients and
19 primary caregivers. Specifically, this Act:

- 20 (1) Repeals the requirement that a provider-patient
21 relationship be established in person; and



1 (2) Allows applicants or primary caregivers to temporarily
2 purchase medical cannabis after the submission of the
3 applicant's certification form.

4 SECTION 2. Section 329-123, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
5 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

6 "(a) Physicians or advanced practice registered nurses who
7 issue written certifications shall provide, in each written
8 certification, the name, address, patient identification number,
9 and other identifying information of the qualifying patient.

10 The department of health shall require, in rules adopted
11 pursuant to chapter 91, that all written certifications comply
12 with a designated form completed by or on behalf of a qualifying
13 patient. The form shall require information from the applicant,
14 primary caregiver, and physician or advanced practice registered
15 nurse as specifically required or permitted by this chapter.

16 The form shall require the address of the location where the
17 cannabis is grown and shall appear on the registry card issued
18 by the department of health. The certifying physician or
19 advanced practice registered nurse shall be required to have a
20 bona fide physician-patient relationship or bona fide advanced
21 practice registered nurse-patient relationship, as applicable,



1 with the qualifying patient[-]; provided that nothing under this
2 part shall require that the bona fide physician-patient
3 relationship or bona fide advanced practice registered nurse-
4 patient relationship be established by conducting an initial in-
5 person consultation. After the submission of the applicant's
6 form but before receipt of confirmed registration from the
7 department of health, the applicant or primary caregiver may use
8 the submission of the applicant's form as proof and
9 documentation authorizing the applicant or primary caregiver to
10 enter and make a one-time purchase of cannabis from a medical
11 cannabis dispensary licensed under chapter 329D in an amount
12 that is no more than fifty per cent of the dispensing limits
13 under section 329D-13. The department of health office of
14 medical cannabis control and regulation shall facilitate the
15 temporary authorization for applicants and primary caregivers.
16 All current active medical cannabis permits shall be honored
17 through their expiration date."

18 SECTION 3. Section 329-126, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
19 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:

20 "(b) For purposes of this section, a bona fide physician-
21 patient relationship may be established via telehealth, as




1 defined in section 453-1.3(j), and a bona fide advanced practice
2 registered nurse-patient relationship may be established via
3 telehealth, as defined in section 457-2; provided that nothing
4 under this part shall require that treatment recommendations
5 that include certifying a patient for the medical use of
6 cannabis via telehealth [~~shall~~] be allowed only after an initial
7 in-person consultation between the certifying physician or
8 advanced practice registered nurse and the patient."

9 SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
10 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

11 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
