A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PHARMACY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Chapter 461, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 2 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 3 and to read as follows:
- 4 "<u>\$461-</u> Registered pharmacy technicians; registration
- 5 required. (a) Beginning January 1, 2026, no person shall act
- 6 as a pharmacy technician without first obtaining a valid
- 7 registration issued by the board pursuant to this section.
- 8 (b) Each registration shall be valid through December 31
- 9 of each odd-numbered year, upon which the registration shall
- 10 lapse and a new registration shall be required.
- 11 (c) The registration fee for a pharmacy technician shall
- 12 be \$20.
- (d) Beginning January 1, 2026, a pharmacy shall only
- 14 employ registered pharmacy technicians to perform pharmacy
- 15 <u>technician duties</u>. The pharmacist-in-charge shall determine
- 16 that the person is registered as a pharmacy technician and that
- 17 the board has issued a certificate of registration for the

- 1 pharmacy technician before the pharmacy technician performs any
- 2 tasks identified in this chapter or rules adopted pursuant to
- 3 this chapter. The supervising registered pharmacist shall be
- 4 responsible for the actions of the registered pharmacy
- 5 technician.
- 6 (e) The certificate of registration shall be prominently
- 7 displayed in an area accessible to the public in the workplace
- 8 where the pharmacy technician is employed or practices.
- 9 (f) If the registered pharmacy technician is suspected to
- 10 have violated any law or regulation regarding the practice of
- 11 pharmacy, legend drugs, or controlled substances or if there is
- 12 evidence that a registered pharmacy technician may have violated
- 13 any such law or regulation, the pharmacist-in-charge shall
- 14 notify the board, in writing, within ten days or, if any danger
- 15 to the public health or safety exists, immediately. Any other
- 16 registered pharmacist, whether or not practicing in the same
- 17 pharmacy, who has such knowledge or suspicion shall notify the
- 18 board, in writing, within ten days or, if any danger to the
- 19 public health or safety exists, immediately."

1	SECT	'ION 2. Section 461-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended b	y adding three new definitions to be appropriately
3	inserted	and to read as follows:
4	" <u>Aux</u>	iliary pharmacy personnel" means a person who works in
5	a pharmac	y assisting a registered pharmacist and registered
6	pharmacis	t technicians and who may perform the following tasks:
7	(1)	Retrieval tasks such as retrieving prescriptions or
8		files;
9	(2)	Clerical tasks such as data entry, typing labels, and
10		maintaining patient profiles;
11	<u>(3)</u>	Tasks such as selling prescriptions, telephoning,
12		filing, and typing;
13	(4)	Accounting tasks such as recordkeeping, maintaining
14		accounts receivables, third-party billing and posting;
15	(5)	Inventory control tasks such as monitoring, pricing,
16		dating, invoicing, stocking pharmacy, and preparation
17		of purchase orders; and
18	(6)	Custodial tasks such as helping maintain a clean and
19		orderly pharmacy.
20	"Reg	istered pharmacy technician" means a person, exclusive
21	of pharma	cy interns and auxiliary pharmacy personnel, registered

1	with the board who may, in addition to the tasks of an auxiliary
2	pharmacy personnel, perform filling, packaging, manipulative,
3	repetitive, or other nondiscretionary tasks, and tasks specified
4	in section 461-11.4, only while assisting and while under the
5	direct supervision and control of a pharmacist.
6	"Supervision" means the direction and oversight of a
7	registered pharmacy technician or pharmacy intern by a
8	physically present, responsible registered pharmacist at all
9	times when either party performs acts specified in this chapter
10	or rules adopted pursuant to this chapter."
11	SECTION 3. Section 461-4.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
12	amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
13	"(a) In addition to any other powers and duties authorized
14	by law, the board:
15	(1) Shall adopt, amend, and repeal rules pursuant to
16	chapter 91, as it deems proper for the purposes of
17	this chapter, Public Law 100-293, and title 21 Code of
18	Federal Regulations part 205;
19	(2) Shall examine, license, reinstate, and renew the
20	licenses of qualified applicants for registered
21	pharmacists and wholesale prescription drug

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1	distributors, issue certificates of registration for
2	registered pharmacy technicians, and issue and renew
3	permits to operate pharmacies;

- 4 (3) May require the inspection of any wholesale 5 prescription drug distributor premises in the State to ensure compliance with this chapter and rules adopted 6 7 under this chapter, or may require an applicant for a 8 pharmacy license to submit a statement that the 9 premises, including but not limited to security and 10 sanitation, are in conformance with the board's 11 requirements and that the applicant possesses the 12 reference materials and technical clinical equipment 13 and supplies as may be specified in rules adopted 14 under this chapter;
 - registration, or permit for any cause prescribed by this chapter, or for any violation of the rules adopted under this chapter, and refuse to grant or renew any license, registration, or permit for any cause which would be ground for revocation or suspension of a license, registration, or permit;

1	(5)	May (deny a license to any applicant who has been
2		disc	iplined by another state or federal agency.
3		Notw	ithstanding any law to the contrary, a final order
4		of d	isciplinary action taken pursuant to this
5		para	graph shall be a matter of public record; and
6	(6)	May a	approve pilot and demonstration research projects
7		for :	innovative applications in the practice of
8		pharm	macy; provided that the projects shall not include
9		thera	apeutic substitution or substitution of a medical
10		devi	ce used in patient care; provided further that
11		noth	ing in this paragraph shall be construed to expand
12		the o	definition of "practice of pharmacy" [as defined]
13		unde	r section 461-1. The board may also:
14		(A)	Approve a provision that grants an exception to
15			any rule adopted under this paragraph;
16		(B)	Extend the time an exception to a rule is
17			granted, as may be necessary for the board to
18			adopt an amendment or modification to the rule;
19		(C)	Condition approval of a project upon compliance
20			with this section and any rules adopted under
21			this section; and

1	(D) Rescind approval and terminate a project if, at
2	any time, a project fails to protect public
3	health or welfare."
4	SECTION 4. Section 461-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
5	amended by amending its title to read as follows:
6	"§461-5 [Qualifications] Registered pharmacists;
7	qualifications for license."
8	SECTION 5. Section 461-8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
9	amended by amending subsections (a) and (b) to read as follows:
10	"(a) All licenses and permits issued by the board, except
11	temporary licenses issued under section 461-7, shall be renewed
12	biennially on or before December 31 of each odd-numbered year.
13	Failure to pay the biennial fee and[, beginning with the renewal
14	for the licensing biennium commencing on January 1, 2008,] to
15	satisfy the continuing education requirement on or before
16	December 31 of each odd-numbered year, shall constitute a
17	forfeiture of the license as of the date of expiration. Failure
18	to pay the biennial fee on or before December 31 of each odd-
19	numbered year shall constitute a forfeiture of the permit as of
20	the date of expiration.

1 Any license or permit forfeited pursuant to subsection 2 (a) may be restored within three years upon payment of any 3 penalty fee, the current biennial fees, and the renewal fee for 4 the next biennium, if applicable, upon submission of proof of 5 compliance with the continuing education requirement for the 6 prior biennium, and upon meeting any other requirements 7 specified in rules adopted pursuant to chapter 91." 8 SECTION 6. Section 461-9, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 9 amended by amending subsections (b) and (c) to read as follows: 10 "(b) No person shall practice as a pharmacy intern without 11 having first obtained a permit from the board. The board shall 12 adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 defining the functions of a 13 pharmacy intern, establishing the requirements to be met by an 14 applicant for a pharmacy intern permit, and specifying the 15 duration of the permit and the procedures for the immediate 16 supervision of the pharmacy intern by a registered 17 pharmacist[-]; provided that the supervising registered 18 pharmacist shall supervise the actions of the pharmacy intern. 19 (c) A registered pharmacy technician may be employed to [assist the registered] perform filling, packaging, 20 21 manipulative, repetitive, or other nondiscretionary tasks, and

1 tasks specified in section 461-11.4, only while assisting and 2 while under the direct supervisions and control of a pharmacist 3 and under rules adopted by the board pursuant to chapter 91 4 [that define the qualifications and functions of the pharmacy 5 technician and provide the procedures for control and 6 supervision by a registered pharmacist]." 7 SECTION 7. Section 461-11.4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 8 amended by amending subsections (a) through (d) to read as 9 follows: 10 A pharmacist, pharmacy intern, or registered pharmacy 11 technician under the direct supervision of a registered 12 pharmacist may administer a vaccine to a person three years of 13 age or older; provided that: 14 (1)The vaccine is authorized or approved by the United 15 States Food and Drug Administration; 16 (2) The vaccine has been ordered by a registered 17 pharmacist and administered in accordance with the 18 recommendations of the Advisory Committee on 19 Immunization Practices of the United States Department 20 of Health and Human Services;

1	(3)	The pharmacy intern has completed a practical training
2		program approved by the Accreditation Council for
3		Pharmacy Education that includes hands-on injection
4		technique, clinical evaluation of indications and
5		contraindications of vaccines, and the recognition and
6		treatment of emergency responses to vaccines;
7	(4)	The <u>registered</u> pharmacy technician has completed a
8		practical training program approved by the
9		Accreditation Council for Pharmacy Education that
10		includes hands-on injection technique;
11	(5)	The <u>registered</u> pharmacy technician has a Certified
12		Pharmacy Technician certification from either the
13		Pharmacy Technician Certification Board or National
14		Healthcareer Association;
15	(6)	The <u>registered</u> pharmacist, pharmacy intern, or
16		registered pharmacy technician has a current
17		certificate in basic cardiopulmonary resuscitation;
18	(7)	The <u>registered</u> pharmacist or <u>registered</u> pharmacy
19		technician has completed a minimum of two credit hours
20		in immunization-related continuing education courses
21		during each licensing biennium;

1	(8)	The <u>registered</u> pharmacist is in compliance with all
2		applicable recordkeeping and reporting requirements,
3		including complying with adverse events reporting
4		requirements;
5	(9)	The registered pharmacist, pharmacy intern, or
6		registered pharmacy technician has reviewed the
7		patient's vaccination records before administering the
8		vaccine;
9	(10)	The <u>registered</u> pharmacist has informed the patient and
10		the patient's primary guardian or caregiver of the
11		importance of a well-child visit with a pediatrician
12		or other licensed primary care provider and has
13		referred the patient as appropriate; and
14	(11)	Where a prescription has been ordered by a person
15		other than the <u>registered</u> pharmacist, the <u>registered</u>
16		pharmacist, pharmacy intern, or <u>registered</u> pharmacy
17		technician shall verify that the prescriber or the
18		prescriber's authorized agent is the patient's medical
19		home.
20	(b)	After the vaccination is administered, the <u>registered</u>
21	pharmacis	t, pharmacy intern, or registered pharmacy technician



- 1 under the direct supervision of a registered pharmacist shall
- 2 immediately provide to the patient a vaccination record
- 3 including the following information:
- 4 (1) The patient's name and date of birth;
- 5 (2) The type of vaccine administered; and
- 6 (3) The date and location that the vaccine was
- 7 administered.
- 8 (c) The registered pharmacist, pharmacy intern, or
- 9 registered pharmacy technician under the direct supervision of a
- 10 registered pharmacist shall make a good faith effort to provide
- 11 within seventy-two hours to the medical home and within five
- 12 business days to the department of health immunization registry
- 13 the same information provided to the patient pursuant to
- 14 subsection (b) as well as the following:
- 15 (1) The name of the vaccine product that was administered,
- including the manufacturer, lot number, and expiration
- 17 date;
- 18 (2) The method of administration; and
- 19 (3) The anatomical site of administration.
- 20 (d) All pharmacy interns or registered pharmacy
- 21 technicians who administer vaccines to persons three years of

- ${f 1}$ age or older shall complete the training program required by
- 2 subsection (a) and submit the completion certificate for the
- 3 training program to the board before administering any vaccine
- 4 to persons three years of age or older."
- 5 SECTION 8. Section 461-21, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 6 amended to read as follows:
- 7 "\$461-21 Disciplinary action. (a) In addition to any
- 8 other actions authorized by law, the board may deny, revoke, or
- 9 suspend any license, registration, or permit applied for or
- 10 issued by the board, in accordance with this chapter, and fine
- 11 or otherwise discipline a licensee, registrant, or permit holder
- 12 for any cause authorized by law, including but not limited to
- 13 the following:
- 14 (1) Procuring a license or registration through fraud,
- misrepresentation, or deceit;
- 16 (2) Professional misconduct, gross carelessness, or
- manifest incapacity;
- 18 (3) Permitting an unlicensed or unregistered person to
- 19 perform activities that require a license or
- registration under this chapter;

1	(4)	Violation of any of the provisions of this chapter or
2		the rules adopted pursuant thereto;
3	(5)	Violation of any state or federal drug, controlled
4		substance, or poison law;
5	(6)	False, fraudulent, or deceptive advertising;
6	(7)	Any other conduct constituting fraudulent or dishonest
7		dealings;
8	(8)	Failure to comply with a board order;
9	(9)	Making a false statement on any document submitted or
10		required to be filed by this chapter, including a
11		false certification of compliance with the continuing
12		education requirement;
13	(10)	Habitual intemperance or addiction to the use of
14		habit-forming drugs;
15	(11)	Administering a vaccine, including a human
16		papillomavirus, Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria, pertussis),
17		meningococcal, or influenza vaccine, without complying
18		with section 461-11.4; or
19	(12)	Prescribing or dispensing contraceptive supplies
20		without complying with section 461-11.6.



- 1 (b) Any person who violates any of the provisions of this
- 2 chapter or the rules adopted pursuant [thereto] to this chapter
- 3 shall be fined not less than \$100 nor more than \$1,000 for each
- 4 violation.
- 5 (c) All proceedings for denial, suspension, fine, or
- 6 revocation of a license, registration, or permit on any grounds
- 7 specified in subsection (a) shall be conducted pursuant to
- 8 chapter 91, including the right of judicial review."
- 9 SECTION 9. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 10 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 11 SECTION 10. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.

Report Title:

Registered Pharmacy Technicians; Registration; Pharmacists-in-charge; Supervision

Description:

Beginning 1/1/2026, requires pharmacy technicians to be registered. Imposes a duty on pharmacists-in-charge to report violations conducted by registered pharmacy technicians. Specifies that supervising registered pharmacists are responsible for the actions of registered pharmacy technicians and pharmacy interns. Effective 7/1/3000. (HD1)
