HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES' OFFICE OF YOUTH SERVICES AND JUVENILE JUSTICE STATE ADVISORY COUNCIL TO EXAMINE THE AVAILABILITY AND UTILIZATION OF AINA-BASED LEARNING PROGRAMS OFFERED TO YOUTH IN THE JUVENILE LEGAL SYSTEM.

1 WHEREAS, research shows that charging fees, fines, costs,
2 and restitution to youth is harmful to young people and their
3 families; and

5 WHEREAS, in Hawaii, the consequences of such costs fall 6 disproportionately on Native Hawaiian, Pacific Islander, and 7 African-American youth, who are more likely to be arrested, 8 detained, and unable to afford fees, fines, costs, and 9 restitution; and

11 WHEREAS, youth involved in the juvenile justice system are 12 frequently ordered to complete hours of community service in 13 lieu of court costs; and

15 WHEREAS, in Hawaii, typical community service opportunities 16 do not give youth a chance to connect back with their culture 17 and the land, preventing rehabilitation and healing; and 18

19 WHEREAS, this disconnection from culture increases the 20 likelihood of intergenerational trauma and recidivism; and

22 WHEREAS, aina-based learning is grounded in teaching and 23 learning through aina, which encompasses the land, ocean, air, 24 and all living things; and

26 WHEREAS, aina-based learning offers an opportunity for 27 minors to carry on the practices of their kupuna, strengthening 28 families and communities; and



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1 WHEREAS, through aina-based approaches, learners can deepen 2 their relationships with the natural environment, cultivating 3 connections with their communities and building critical skills 4 that can be applied to real-world issues; and 5 6 WHEREAS, the majority of organizations utilizing aina-based 7 learning are not-for-profit organizations eager to support 8 9 youth; and 10 WHEREAS, Hawaii has already committed to providing aina-11 based education and stewardship opportunities to youth through 12 the Aloha+ Challenge; and 13 14 15 WHEREAS, the State can do more to refer youth to organizations employing aina-based learning to complete 16 community service obligations; now, therefore, 17 18 19 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Thirty-third Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 20 of 2025, the Senate concurring, that the Department of Human 21 Services' Office of Youth Services and Juvenile Justice State 22 23 Advisory Council are requested to examine the availability and utilization of aina-based learning programs offered to youth in 24 25 the juvenile legal system; and 26 27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Human Services' Office of Youth Services and Juvenile Justice State 28 Advisory Council are requested to create and disseminate a list 29 of organizations employing aina-based learning that the courts 30 31 may use to assign community service to minors in the family 32 court system; and 33 34 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 35 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Director of Human Services, Executive Director of the Office of Youth Services, 36 37 and Chairperson of the Juvenile Justice State Advisory Council.
