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# HOUSE RESOLUTION

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URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO UNDERTAKE PRELIMINARY  
EDUCATION, OUTREACH, AND VACCINATION DRIVE EFFORTS AT  
SCHOOLS IN HAWAII WITH VACCINATION RATES UNDER THIRTY  
PERCENT, BEGINNING AT THE START OF THE 2025-2026 SCHOOL  
YEAR.

1 WHEREAS, high vaccination rates are essential to  
2 maintaining public health through herd immunity and preventing  
3 the outbreak of eradicable diseases such as measles and  
4 smallpox; and  
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6 WHEREAS, the State recognizes the Department of Health's  
7 essential work in keeping Hawaii's communities safe and healthy;  
8 and  
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10 WHEREAS, data from the Department of Health shows a  
11 concerning drop in vaccination rates across the State's public,  
12 charter, and private schools, with some private schools having  
13 non-vaccination rates in excess of sixty percent; and  
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15 WHEREAS, in the 2023-2024 school year, that 17.09 percent  
16 of all students either have no immunization record or are  
17 missing some immunizations, which is more than triple the number  
18 of students receiving religious exemptions; and  
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20 WHEREAS, the State recognizes increasing community access  
21 to vaccines as an essential part of any public health plan to  
22 increase vaccination rates; and  
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24 WHEREAS, the State further recognizes that a program of  
25 increasing vaccination availability must be complemented by  
26 community engagement and education about the safety and efficacy  
27 of vaccines; and  
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1 WHEREAS, multiple studies have shown that outreach and  
2 education on the safety and efficacy of vaccines have led to  
3 increased vaccination rates; and  
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5 WHEREAS, a program of student education and vaccination  
6 clinics carried out by the City of Seattle to increase  
7 coronavirus disease 2019 vaccination was successful at  
8 increasing levels of vaccination by an average of 8.8 percent  
9 over a six-month period; and  
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11 WHEREAS, when a public-private partnership in Washington  
12 launched a vaccination campaign called "Immunity Community", it  
13 was successful in reducing rates of vaccine hesitancy among  
14 parents by almost ten percent over a period of three years; and  
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16 WHEREAS, Michigan launched a public-private partnership  
17 education program called "I Vaccinate" and achieved a twelve  
18 percent increase in teen vaccination rates statewide, using  
19 techniques such as parent-to-parent messaging, the maintenance  
20 of a public website, and engagement through a social media  
21 profile; and  
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23 WHEREAS, a vaccination education program similar to that in  
24 other states but adapted to Hawaii's unique cultural context  
25 would be beneficial to the public health of all residents of  
26 Hawaii; now, therefore,  
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28 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the  
29 Thirty-third Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session  
30 of 2025, that the Department of Health is urged to undertake  
31 preliminary education, outreach, and vaccination drive efforts  
32 at schools in Hawaii with vaccination rates under thirty  
33 percent, beginning at the start of the 2025-2026 school year;  
34 and  
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36 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Health is  
37 urged to partner with the Department of Education to develop a  
38 plan for a long-term program to counter vaccine hesitancy and  
39 increase vaccination rates across Hawaii's schools; and  
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41 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Health is  
42 requested to submit a report on the development of the long-term



1 program to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to  
2 the convening of the Regular Session of 2026; provided that the  
3 report is requested to include recommendations on the funding  
4 and any administrative restructuring needed to effectively carry  
5 out the program; and

7 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this  
8 Resolution be transmitted to the Superintendent of Education and  
9 Director of Health.
