A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AGRICULTURAL CRIME.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. This Act shall be known and may be cited as	
2	"Duke's Law" in memory of Cranston "Duke" Pia.	
3	SECTION 2. The legislature finds that agricultural crimes,	
4	including theft, vandalism, and trespassing have significantly	
5	impacted the State's agricultural sector, leading to economic	
6	losses and safety concerns for farmers and ranchers. These	
7	types of crimes not only affect individual livelihoods, but also	
8	the State's broader agricultural economy and food security.	
9	Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:	
10	(1) Establish an agricultural crimes task force to address	
11	the issue of agricultural crime in the State; and	
12	(2) Increase penalties for property crimes committed on	
13	agricultural property.	
14	SECTION 3. Chapter 141, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
15	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated	
16	and to read as follows:	



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1	" <u>§14</u>	1- Agricultural crimes task force. (a) There is
2	establish	ed an agricultural crimes task force within the
3	departmen	t of agriculture for administrative purposes that shall
4	<u>consist o</u>	f the following members:
5	(1)	The chairperson of the board of agriculture, or the
6		chairperson's designee, who shall serve as chairperson
7		of the taskforce;
8	(2)	A representative from the department of law
9		enforcement;
10	(3)	A representative from the department of the attorney
11		general;
12	(4)	A representative from the department of the
13		prosecuting attorney of the city and county of
14		Honolulu;
15	(5)	Two members representing agricultural organizations or
16		farmer associations to be invited by the chairperson;
17	(6)	Two members from a law enforcement agency with
18		experience with agricultural crimes; and
19	(7)	One member from the academic community specializing in
20		agriculture or criminology, to be invited by the
21		chairperson.



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1 The task force shall: (b) 2 Develop strategies to prevent agricultural crimes; (1) 3 (2) Coordinate with local law enforcement to enhance 4 responses to reports of agricultural crime; 5 (3) Coordinate with state and county prosecutors to 6 develop methods to prioritize the prosecution of 7 agricultural crimes to the fullest extent of the law; 8 (4) Recommend legislation to address gaps in existing law relating to agricultural crime; 9 10 (5) Facilitate education and outreach programs for farmers 11 on crime prevention; and 12 Monitor and report on the effectiveness of any (6) 13 policies and programs implemented. 14 The members of the agricultural crimes task force (C) shall serve without compensation, but shall be reimbursed for 15 reasonable expenses necessary for the performance of their 16 duties, including travel expenses. 17 (d) The agricultural crimes task force shall submit a 18 19 report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty 20 21 days prior to the convening of each regular session."

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1	SECTION 4. Chapter 708, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
2	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated		
3	and to read as follows:		
4	"§708- Agricultural crime. (1) A person commits the		
5	offense of agricultural crime if the person:		
6	(a) Is on agricultural property and:		
7	(i) Commits a property crime;		
8	(ii) Violates section 183D-26 or 183D-27; or		
9	(iii) Commits the offense of negligent failure to		
10	control a dangerous dog under section 711-1144;		
11	or		
12	(b) Is the parent or legal guardian of a minor who		
13	violates paragraph (a).		
14	(2) A person commits a property crime if the person		
15	engages in conduct that constitutes an offense under this		
16	chapter. It can be established that the person has committed a		
17	property crime by either the prosecution proving that the person		
18	is guilty of, or by the person pleading guilty or no contest to,		
19	committing any offense under this chapter.		
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1	"Agr	icultural property" means farming assets used for
2	agricultu:	ral production, including but not limited to land,
3	buildings	, equipment, livestock, and crops.
4	<u>"Min</u>	or" means any person under the age of eighteen years.
5	(4)	Agricultural crime is a class C felony.
6	(5)	For a conviction under this section, the sentence
7	shall be e	either:
8	<u>(a)</u>	For a first offense, a fine of not more than \$2,000 or
9		imprisonment for not more than one year, or both; or
10	<u>(b)</u>	For a second or subsequent offense, a fine of at least
11		\$10,000 or imprisonment for not more than five years,
12		<u>or both.</u>
13	(6)	In addition to any other penalties, any person who is
14	convicted	of a violation of this section shall be ordered to
15	make rest.	itution to the owner of the agricultural property for
16	any damage	es or losses incurred due to the violation."
17	SECT	ION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
18	revenues (of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$500,000 or so much
19	thereof a	s may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and the
20	same sum o	or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
21	2026-2027	for the operational costs of the agricultural crimes

The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 3 4 of agriculture for the purposes of this Act. SECTION 6. This Act does not affect rights and duties that 5 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were 6 7 begun before its effective date. SECTION 7.
