A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that there is a need for
2	community readiness centers in various communities to ensure
3	emergency preparedness. A community readiness center will serve
4	as a place for residents to receive emergency preparedness
5	training and emergency information, supplies, and basic medical
6	care during and after an emergency event. The community
7	readiness centers will also be used to store and refrigerate
8	medical supplies and provide a place for residents to charge
9	electrical devices and access the internet. The establishment
10	of these community readiness centers will require partnerships
11	between numerous agencies and private entities and the
12	legislature finds that the Hawaii emergency management agency is
13	the most capable agency to coordinate the establishment of
14	community readiness centers.
15	The legislature further finds that community readiness
16	center sites should be carefully identified to ensure proper
17	connection to the electrical grid and be equipped with a solar
18	and back-up battery storage system to quard against power

1 outages. Communities should be directly involved in the 2 location and design of community readiness centers in their 3 respective communities. 4 The legislature notes that the use of funds from the environmental response, energy, and food security tax is 5 appropriate for this purpose. The legislature further finds 6 7 that the establishment of community readiness centers will require dedicated funding and that there is a nexus between the 8 need for community readiness centers and the use of petroleum 9 10 and other fossil fuels. Therefore, it is appropriate to tax petroleum and other fossil fuel usage to fund community 11 readiness centers. 12 13 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to: Establish the community readiness centers program to 14 (1) be implemented and administered by the Hawaii 15 emergency management agency; 16 Establish the community readiness centers special fund **17** (2) for the implementation and administration of the 18 19 community readiness centers program; Rename the environmental response, energy, and food 20 (3) 21 security tax to the environmental response, energy, food security, and resilience tax; and 22

1	(4) Allocate portions of the environmental response,					
2	energy, and food security tax into the community					
3	readiness centers special fund.					
4	SECTION 2. Chapter 127A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is					
5	amended by adding two new sections to be appropriately					
6	designated and to read as follows:					
7	"§127A-A Community readiness centers program; established					
8	(a) There is established the community readiness centers					
9	program within the agency to set up community readiness centers					
10	in various communities to ensure emergency preparedness by					
11	providing training and emergency information, supplies, and					
12	basic medical care during and after an emergency event. The					
13	community readiness centers shall also be used to store and					
14	refrigerate medical supplies and provide a place for residents					
15	to charge electrical devices and access the internet.					
16	(b) In implementing and administering the community					
17	readiness centers program, the agency shall:					
18	(1) Identify potential site locations for the					
19	establishment of community readiness centers					
20	<pre>facilities;</pre>					
21	(2) Negotiate and arrange for the purchase or lease of					
22	suitable sites;					

1	(3) Contract to design and construct community readiness					
2		centers facilities, which may include retrofitting				
3	current structures; provided that if constructed on					
4	empty site, the agency shall ensure that the commun					
5	readiness centers facilities will abide by the					
6	International Code Council 500 standard, which is					
7	capable of withstanding 250 mph wind - category five					
8		hurricanes;				
9	(4)	Install a solar and back-up battery storage system,				
10		multiple electrical charging stations, internet				
11		access, and the capability to refrigerate medical				
12		supplies at each community readiness center site; and				
13	(5) Obtain suitable emergency supplies, including non-					
14		perishable food, and equip each community readiness				
15		center site with emergency supplies.				
16	(c)	The agency shall provide a selection criteria matrix				
17	of standa:	rds necessary for constructing community readiness				
18	centers in	n consultation with the Hawaii earthquake and tsunami				
19	advisory o	committee and the State hazard mitigation forum to				
20	identify o	geographic areas where community readiness centers				
21	sites wou	ld be able to withstand natural disasters.

8	SECTION 3. Section 128D-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is						
9	amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:						
10	"(a)	There is created within the state treasury an					
11	environmental response revolving fund, which shall consist of						
12	moneys appropriated to the fund by the legislature, moneys paid						
13	to the fund as a result of departmental compliance proceedings,						
14	moneys paid to the fund pursuant to court-ordered awards or						
15	judgments, moneys paid to the fund in court-approved or out-of-						
16	court settlements, all interest attributable to investment of						
17	money deposited in the fund, moneys deposited in the fund from						
18	the environmental response, energy, [and] food security, and						
19	resilience tax pursuant to section 243-3.5, and moneys allotted						
20	to the fund from other sources."						
21	SECTI	ON 4. Section 201-12.8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is					
22	amended by	amending subsection (a) to read as follows:					

1 "(a) There is created within the state treasury an energy 2 security special fund, which shall consist of: 3 The portion of the environmental response, energy, [and] food security, and resilience tax specified 4 5 under section 243-3.5; Moneys appropriated to the fund by the legislature; 6 (2) 7 (3) All interest attributable to investment of money deposited in the fund; and 8 9 (4) Moneys allotted to the fund from other sources, including under section 196-6.5." 10 SECTION 5. Section 243-3.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 11 amended as follows: 12 13 1. By amending its title to read: 14 "§243-3.5 Environmental response, energy, [and] food security, and resilience tax; uses." 15 2. By amending subsections (a) and (b) to read: 16 **17** In addition to any other taxes provided by law, 18 subject to the exemptions set forth in section 243-7, there is hereby imposed a state environmental response, energy, [and] 19 food security, and resilience tax on each barrel or fractional 20 21 part of a barrel of petroleum product sold by a distributor to 22 any retail dealer or end user of petroleum product, other than a

5	SECTION 6. Section 304A-2169.1, Hawaii Revised Statues, is					
6	amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:					
7	"(b) Deposits into the special fund may be from the					
8	following:					
9	(1) Appropriations from the legislature;					
10	(2) A portion of the environmental response, energy, [and]					
11	food security, and resilience tax pursuant to section					
12	243-3.5; and					
13	(3) Investment earnings, gifts, donations, or other income					
14	received by the Hawaii natural energy institute."					
15	SECTION 7. In codifying the new sections added by section					
16	2 and referenced by section 5 of this Act, the revisor of					
17	statutes shall substitute appropriate section numbers for the					
18	letters used in designating the new sections in this Act.					
19	SECTION 8. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed					
20	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

Report Title:

HI-EMA; Community Readiness Centers; Community Readiness Centers Special Fund; Environmental Response, Energy, and Food Security Tax

Description:

Establishes the Community Readiness Centers Program to be implemented and administered by the Hawaii Emergency Management Agency. Establishes the Community Readiness Centers Special Fund to fund the Community Readiness Centers Program. Renames the Environmental Response, Energy, and Food Security Tax to the Environmental Response, Energy, Food Security, and Resilience Tax and directs a portion of the tax into the Community Readiness Centers Special Fund. Effective 7/1/2025.

TITLE:

A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMERGENCY

PREPAREDNESS.

PURPOSE:

To establish the Community Readiness Centers

Program within the Hawaii Emergency

Management Agency (HI-EMA) and establish the Community Readiness Centers Special Fund to

fund the Community Readiness Centers

Program.

MEANS:

Add two new sections to chapter 127A, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), and amend section 128D-2(a), 201-12.8(a), 243-3.5, and 304A-

2169.1(b), HRS.

JUSTIFICATION:

The State of Hawaii faces a wide variety of potentially catastrophic natural disasters including hurricanes, wildfires, tsunamis, and earthquakes. Human-caused events are also important to emphasize and require awareness and preparedness. HI-EMA recognizes the importance of education, preparedness, and resiliency in the face of emergency events. The goal of the community readiness center program is to ensure a community understands its role in case of an emergency and can collectively respond to it.

There is a need to construct Community Readiness Centers in various communities, which could potentially become isolated, to help establish community roles and responsibilities and increase preparedness for all emergencies.

Impact on the public: The public will have Community Readiness Centers in their communities to ensure preparedness where they can receive or access training, community information, emergency supplies, basic medical care, electrical device

charging stations, and the Internet during and after an emergency.

Impact on the department and other agencies:
This will require assistance from both the
Department of Land and Natural Resources and
the Department of Accounting and General
Services to identify and purchase land for
the Community Readiness Centers.

HI-EMA, Department of Human Services, and Department of Health will be positively impacted by this program which will allow state agencies to provide and communicate with the communities during a disaster response.
