A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SEX TRAFFICKING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that sex trafficking is a 2 form of modern-day slavery. According to a 2018 report published by Arizona State University and the Hawai'i state 3 commission on the status of women, one out of every eleven adult 4 5 males living in the State is an online sex shopper. The report also estimated that there were 53,541 potential sex buyers in 6 the State at the time of the study. Moreover, during the COVID-7 2019 pandemic, a service provider for sex trafficking victims in 8 9 the State reported seeing a three hundred per cent increase in demand for services, which included trauma-informed care. 10

11 The legislature further finds that education ends 12 exploitation. By empowering students to protect themselves from 13 harm and build healthy relationships, training school staff in 14 how to respond to at-risk youth in a trauma-informed manner, and 15 creating sexual health programs that include information about 16 sex trafficking, schools can equip students with the knowledge

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1	and skills needed to prevent themselves from becoming victims o		
2	sexual exploitation as minors and upon reaching adulthood.		
3	Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to protect the		
4	State's public school students from sexual exploitation by		
5	requiring the department of education to offer training to		
6	teachers and school staff on how to prevent and respond to		
7	potential cases of sex trafficking.		
8	SECTION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
9	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated		
10	and to read as follows:

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(c) The department may coordinate and contract with any			
state or county department or agency, victim service provider,			
or other expert in the field of sex trafficking prevention an			
response to implement this section.			
(d) As used in this section, "victim service provider"			
means any nongovernmental organization that provides direct			
intervention, social, medical, mental health, legal, case			
management, educational, emergency, or housing services to			
victims of sex trafficking."
