## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE SUPPLEMENTAL NUTRITION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that many low-income
- 2 households struggle to purchase food due to Hawaii's high cost
- 3 of living and food prices. The supplemental nutrition
- 4 assistance program (SNAP), formerly known as the food stamp
- 5 program, is crucial to providing necessary food assistance to
- 6 some of Hawaii's most economically disadvantaged residents.
- 7 The legislature further finds that SNAP is the most
- 8 effective anti-hunger initiative in the country. In Hawaii,
- 9 SNAP supports over one hundred thirty thousand individuals,
- 10 bringing more than \$630,000,000 into the State's economy each
- 11 year. These benefits help economically vulnerable households
- 12 meet their basic nutritional needs without sacrificing their
- 13 financial security.
- 14 The legislature additionally finds that a study co-authored
- 15 by the university of Hawaii economic research organization and
- 16 Hawaii Public Health Institute found that eliminating the net
- 17 income limit criteria for SNAP beneficiaries would provide an



- 1 additional \$45,000,000 in benefits to struggling families across
- 2 the State and expand eligibility for thirteen thousand to
- 3 fourteen thousand more households, with each household receiving
- 4 an average of \$3,200 annually in food assistance. In September
- 5 2024, Governor Josh Green subsequently announced that the State
- 6 would remove the net income limit criteria to strengthen
- 7 Hawaii's social welfare system for working-class families.
- 8 The legislature also finds that SNAP access and
- 9 participation rates are hampered by understaffing at the
- 10 department of human services. Improvements to SNAP in the
- 11 State, including elimination of the net income limit, will only
- 12 be effective if they are able to be fully implemented, which
- 13 will require additional staffing for the department of human
- 14 services. Moreover, since SNAP benefits are federally
- 15 reimbursable, increasing staff for the State's SNAP program
- 16 could generate hundreds of millions of dollars in federal
- 17 revenue to combat food insecurity in local communities by
- 18 strengthening the State's SNAP participation rate.
- 19 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to appropriate
- 20 funds to the department of human services to enhance staffing
- 21 related to the supplemental nutrition assistance program.
