In Opposition H.B. 1378 HD2 Relating to the State Foundation on Culture and Arts

Chair Lee, Vice Chair Inouye and members of the Senate Committee on Transportation and Culture and the Arts:

The Office of the Governor respectfully opposes H.B.1378 H.D. 2, Relating to the State Foundation on Culture and Arts. This bill establishes the Performing Arts Grants Program and Performing Arts Grants Special Fund to support performing arts in the State. Clarifies the scope of the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts' responsibilities to include the coordination, planning, promotion, marketing, and execution of performing arts events. Amends the funding sources for the State Art Museum. Amends the amounts required to be transferred by agencies into the Works of Art Special Fund and the allowable uses of the Special Fund.

The Works of Art Special Fund has been a cornerstone of Hawai'i's commitment to arts and culture, ensuring stable, long-term investment in programs that enrich our communities, preserve our cultural heritage, and support local artists. By shifting to federal and general funds, this proposal threatens the long-term stability of arts and culture funding, forcing it to compete with other critical state priorities such as housing, education, and healthcare.

A stable and reliable funding source is essential to ensuring the long-term viability of State Art Museum. Without a dedicated revenue stream, funding becomes uncertain and subject to fluctuations based on economic conditions, shifting legislative priorities, or changes in administration.

For decades, the Works of Art Special Fund has provided a consistent and self-sustaining investment in the arts. I urge the committee to reject this proposal and protect Hawai'i's only dedicated revenue source for the arts, ensuring that future generations continue to benefit from a vibrant and thriving cultural landscape.

RELATING TO THE STATE FOUNDATION ON CULTURES AND THE ARTS

The Department of Budget and Finance (B&F) offers comments on this bill. House Bill (H.B.) No. 1378, H.D. 2:

- Establishes the Performing Arts Grants Program (PAGP) within the State
 Foundation on Cultures and the Arts (SFCA) to provide grants for the coordination,
 planning, promotion, marketing, and execution of performing arts events.
- Establishes the Performing Arts Special Fund (PASF) to be administered by SFCA
 to be used for the coordination, planning, promotion, marketing, and execution of
 performing arts events.
- Amends Section 9-1, HRS, to define "performing arts."
- Amends Section 9-21, HRS, to amend the purpose of SFCA to include the coordination, planning, promotion, marketing, and execution of performing arts events.

- Amends Section 103-8.5, HRS, to establish a cap on the amount transferred into the Works of Art Special Fund (WOASF); to require agencies receiving capital improvement appropriations to calculate their proportionate share of the total annual amount transferred into the WOASF; and to establish a cap on the unencumbered fund balance of the WOASF.
- Appropriates or authorizes 17.50 full-time equivalent (FTE) permanent positions and \$4,028,811 in general funds and 4.50 FTE permanent positions and \$283,962 in federal funds for FY 26 and FY 27 for SFCA.
- Appropriates an unspecified amount of general funds in FY 26 and FY 27 to SFCA to provide grants under the PAGP.

B&F supports the intent of the bill to establish a compliant process on the utilization of bond proceeds and create stability within the State Foundation of Culture and Arts. Utilization of bond proceeds are subject to tax exempt regulations of the Internal Revenue Service and could have unintended consequences when incorrectly expended. However, implementing a cap on the transfers into the WOASF will create administrative challenges due to the nature on which capital improvement projects are authorized and executed. In order to effectively and accurately calculate a proportional share, the department recommends that cost elements be identified during the appropriation process.

As a matter of general policy, B&F does not support the creation of any special fund, which does not meet the requirements of Section 37-52.3, HRS. Special funds should: 1) serve a need as demonstrated by the purpose, scope of work, and an explanation why the program cannot be implemented successfully under the general

fund appropriation process; 2) reflect a clear nexus between the benefits sought and charges made upon the users or beneficiaries or a clear link between the program and the sources of revenue; 3) provide an appropriate means of financing for the program or activity; and 4) demonstrate the capacity to be financially self-sustaining. Regarding H.B. No. 1378, H.D. 2, it is difficult to determine if the PASF would be self-sustaining.

In consideration of HB1378 HD2 RELATING TO THE STATE FOUNDATION ON CULTURE AND THE ARTS

Chair Lee, Vice Chair Inouye, and members of the Committee. The Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism (DBEDT) offers comments on HB1378 HD2, establishing a Performing Arts Grants Program and Performing Arts Special Fund to support performing arts in the State. This legislation clarifies the scope of the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts' responsibilities to include the coordination, planning, promotion, marketing, and execution of performing arts events. Amends the funding sources for the State Art Museum, and amends the amounts required to be transferred by state agencies into the Works of Art Special Fund, allowable uses and appropriates funds.

While DBEDT supports the bill's intent, we understand the areas in which there may be impacts and encourage continued dialogue with SFCA to mitigate these concerns while striking a compromise to achieve the intent.

The construct of the special fund is crucial to the current federal landscape impacts on agencies such as the NEA which also provides SFCA with funding

resources.

In light of the transfer of SFCA to DBEDT active in other measures this session, we do agree that additional staffing is needed should HB1378, HD2 pass, both in DBEDT and SFCA.

The State Foundation on Culture and the Arts has served Hawaii admirably for decades. DBEDT looks forward to working with SFCA, our lawmakers and community to strike the right balance of the intent of this measure, in support of the value of all arts, including performing arts and in recognition of the landmark 1% for Art statute established by the Legislature and visionary architect Alfred Preis.

The Department of the Attorney General provides the following comments.

The purpose of this bill is to establish the Performing Arts Grants Program within the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (SFCA) to support performing arts. The bill also expands SFCA's responsibilities to include the coordination, planning, promotion, marketing, and execution of performing arts events. Further, this bill amends the permitted uses of the Works of Art Special Fund (WASF) and the amounts required to be transferred by agencies into the WASF.

The WASF, established by section 103-8.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), consists of one percent of the cost element of all state fund appropriations for the construction and renovation of state buildings. The WASF is generally funded by tax-exempt general obligation bonds. To maintain the tax-exempt status of the general obligation bonds, WASF moneys must be used in a manner that is consistent with the requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. Using the tax-exempt general obligation bond proceeds for operating purposes jeopardizes the tax-exempt status of the bonds. See Treasury Regulations, 26 C.F. R § 1.148-1(c)(4)(iii) (definition of replacement proceeds), and 26 C.F. R § 1.148-10(a)(4) (overburdening the tax-exempt market).

This bill amends section 103-8.5(a), HRS (page 8, line 18, through page 9, line 8), by putting a cap on the total amount transferred to the WASF per fiscal year.

However, the bill does not specify how the caps on transfers into the WASF are implemented and how the Comptroller will segregate the excess funds in a way that the tax-exempt general obligation bonds are not calculated or transferred along with the excess funds. If the Legislature intends to transfer moneys from the WASF to the general fund, this could negatively impact the tax-exempt status of the general obligation bonds.

Additionally, the bill amends section 103-8.5(c), HRS (page 9, line 20, through page 10, line 10), by establishing a maximum unencumbered balance for the WASF in the previous fiscal year to prevent additional transfers of the one percent of appropriations. This bill further amends section 103-8.5(e), HRS, on page 10, line 12, through page 11, line 2, requiring agencies receiving capital improvement appropriations to calculate their "proportionate share of the total annual amount" to be transferred into the WASF. Currently, the Comptroller provides each user agency receiving capital improvement appropriations with criteria to determine which appropriations are subject to the one percent assessment. The user agencies then request, on an allotment basis, the transfer of one percent of the construction costs to the SFCA.

Because the bill does not clarify how the Comptroller or agencies should calculate the total amount and their proportionate share of the WASF, user agencies would not be able to determine when the WASF reaches its cap on transfers. Because there are no cost elements for capital improvement appropriations when appropriations bills are signed into law, it is not possible to calculate both the total amount to be transferred into the WASF or a user agency's proportionate share at that time. The bill also does not explain how the cap will be monitored; therefore, it will be difficult to find an equitable implementation of the cap on transfers into the WASF to determine which capital improvement projects will be subject to the WASF transfer.

We recommend that the Committee work with the Department of Budget and Finance and the Department of Accounting and General Services to resolve the implementation problems in the bill, both to prevent jeopardizing the tax-exempt status of general obligation bonds and to clarify how agencies would calculate their share of

transfers to the WASF. We note that the House Draft 1 version of the bill does not present such implementation difficulties.

Chair Lee and members of the Committee,

Due to the introduction of amendment H.D. 2, the SFCA **OPPOSES** H.B.1378 H.D.2 which amends the Works of Art Special Fund and shifts much of the Art in Public Places program funding to a General Fund appropriation. The SFCA supported HB1378 as originally introduced as a measure to support the performing arts in Hawaii with an appropriation yet, H.D. 2 amendeds the measure to line out sections of the the Works of Art Special Fund 103-8.5 HRS.

Regarding H.B.1378 H.D.2 SECTION 6 which amends the Works of Art Special fund 103-8.5 HRS, the SFCA is grateful for the support of the legislature to fund the Art in Public Places Program though a General Fund appropriation in the State's budget, yet the SFCA OPPOSES amending 103-8.5 HRS by lining out much of section (b).

- (b) The works of art special fund shall be used solely for [the following purposes:
- (1) Costs] costs related to the acquisition of works of art[, including any consultant or staff services required to carry out the art in public places and relocatable works of art programs; (2) Site modifications, display, and interpretive work necessary for the exhibition of works of art; (3) Upkeep services, including maintenance, repair, and restoration of works of art; (4) Storing and transporting works of art]

With the current Federal uncertainty, we are concerned if the APP program and positions shift to general funds and there is a State fiscal shortfall, there will be no funding source to support the SFCA and therefore the agency will cease to function.

Since the inception of the works of art special fund in 1989, the fund has supported staff services. If there is concern over its use for salaries, the positions financed through the Works of Art Special Fund can be supported through the general fund without amending 103-8.5.

The SFCA **SUPPORTS** SECTIONS 1 - 5 Which establish the Performing Arts Grants Program to support performing arts in the State; Clarifies the scope of the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts' responsibilities to include the coordination, planning, promotion, marketing, and execution of performing arts events; Appropriates funds to provide grants under the Performing Arts Grants Program.

TESTIMONY IN OPPOSITION TO HOUSE BILL HB1378 HD2

Aloha Chair Lee, Vice Chair Inouye and Members of the Committee,

My name is Konrad Ng and I serve as the Chair of the Board of Commissioners for the Hawai'i State Foundation on Culture and the Arts. I strongly oppose House Bill 1378 HD2 (HB1378). This bill threatens the well-being of our local economy, communities and cultural institutions by removing the only dedicated and sustainable funding for the arts. Put plainly: this is a bad law because it hurts Hawai'i.

Economic Consequences: HB1378 will have far-reaching financial consequences. Many of Hawai'i's cultural organizations and nonprofits rely on funding, grants and community support to sustain their programs. This bill will create additional barriers that jeopardize their financial stability, ultimately resulting in job losses, reduced services and negative impacts on local businesses that depend on a thriving cultural sector.

A Threat to Cultural and Community Institutions: HB1378 poses a direct threat to Hawai'i's vibrant arts, cultural and nonprofit sectors. These institutions are fundamental to preserving our heritage and fostering creative expression, yet the bill's provisions could severely impact their ability to operate effectively. Policies that restrict or hinder these organizations will undermine the cultural richness that makes Hawai'i unique.

Disparate Impact on Hawai'i's Communities: HB1378 risks exacerbating existing inequities by displacing funding and placing undue burdens on communities. Many of these communities rely on the programs and services provided by the very institutions this bill would harm. The unintended consequences of this legislation could disproportionately affect Native Hawaiians, immigrants, and communities that depend on these resources for education, expression, and support.

Lack of Justification and Public Input: The rationale behind HB1378 is not sufficiently justified, and it appears to lack meaningful engagement with stakeholders who would be directly impacted. Before enacting any legislation that could have such profound consequences, it is imperative to conduct thorough research, engage in transparent dialogue and consider alternative solutions that would strengthen rather than weaken Hawai'i's cultural and nonprofit landscape.

For these reasons, I strongly urge you to vote against HB1378 HD2. Instead, I encourage that the Works of Art Special Fund remains unchanged.

Thank you for your time and consideration. I appreciate your commitment to representing the best interests of our community and I hope you will stand in opposition to this harmful bill.

Dear Chair Lee, Vice-Chair Inouye, and members of the committee,

I am writing to respectfully urge you to oppose **HB 1378-HD2.** While I appreciate that the bill would create funding for a Performing Arts Grants Program and a Performing Arts Grants Special Fund, it would cut essential funds for arts education and destabilize the arts in Hawai'i.

I work with a new program called HŌʻĀ, which is funded by the Works of Art Special Fund's educational branch. In this program, children in public and charter schools develop emotional well-being & a sense of place through immersive arts & mālama 'āina experiences. The students go on two field trips to a culturally important place in their home moku. In addition to learning about how to mālama this place, they reflect on their learning and connection through the arts. Teaching Artists and 'Āina Educators come together with classroom teachers to create an experience with the arts and 'āina that is long-term, nuanced, and deeply informed by history and mo'olelo.

After the program, a 3rd grade student from Wai'anae Elementary reflected, "I learned that we have a special island that has history!" A teacher from this class also remarked, "The students who struggle in the classroom thrived outdoors and in the arts."

We have moku cohorts in Wai'anae, O'ahu; Ko'olaupoko, O'ahu; and Kona, Hawai'i Island. A teacher from this last cohort shared that she loved "the integration of art, hana, song, dance, oli - all these things went together. And when the students got to share their knowledge at the hō'ike they became a type of expert. The students felt proud of not only their work, but their knowledge. In many ways, they are still internalizing things as we continue to practice them. The learning is still happening."

It is because the Works of Art Special Fund offers stable support for the arts that we can build partnerships with schools, parents, and community that are based in trust. With a stable source of funding, communities can count on our program returning year after year. While HB 1378-HD2 offers a temporary \$4 million allocation for fiscal years 2026 and 2027, there is no commitment beyond that. Unfortunately, general funds and federal grants that could fill in for the special fund are subject to cuts and shifting priorities.

Please continue to support arts education for Hawai'i's children by opposing HB 1378-HD2.

Dear Chair Lee, Vice Chair Inouye, and Members of the Transportation and Culture and the Arts Committee:

I strongly **oppose HB 1378-HD 2**, particularly the provisions that amend the amounts required to be transferred into the Works of Art Special Fund and restrict its allowable uses.

HB 1378-HD 2 Jeopardizes Long-Term Arts Funding

The Works of Art Special Fund is the **only dedicated and sustainable** source of public funding for arts and culture statewide. This bill would severely limit its reach, placing arts programs, jobs, and future creative opportunities at risk.

While the bill proposes a **temporary general fund appropriation**, it comes with no guarantee of future support and is not a reliable replacement. As federal funding declines, state general funds will be prioritized for essential services like health, housing, and education—leaving the arts with little to no funding at all.

Why Protecting the Works of Art Special Fund Matters

Arts and culture are essential to Hawai'i's identity and economy, preserving our cultural heritage, driving tourism, enriching education, and contributing to economic vitality and community well-being. At a time when federal arts funding is declining, making arts funding increasingly precarious, it is critical to protect rather than dismantle the very foundation that sustains Hawai'i's creative and cultural communities. For decades, the Works of Art Special Fund has been a lifeline, providing stability during economic uncertainty and ensuring that Hawai'i's arts sector thrives for generations to come.

Proposed Amendment: Move Performing Arts Grants to HB 925-HD 3

We also propose that language from HB 1378-HD 2, which establishes a Performing Arts Special Fund and appropriates funds for Performing Arts grants, be moved to HB 925-HD 3, where it is more topically aligned. HB 925-HD 3 also proposes a dedicated revenue source by allocating a percentage of fees from state-run performing arts venues to the fund.

The Hawai'i Arts Alliance serves as an **advocate and trusted ally to artists and audiences** across the state. We work to amplify the transformative power of the arts, while engaging and educating keiki and families in arts that promote healing and cultural relevance.

I urge you to **protect the Works of Art Special Fund** and ensure that Hawai'i's arts and culture sector remains strong for generations to come. Mahalo for the opportunity to submit testimony and for your commitment to supporting Hawai'i's creative community.

Aloha Chair Lee, Vice Chair Inouye, Senator Kanuha and members of the Committee,

On behalf of the board of directors, staff, and 450 members of the Donkey Mill Art Center, I respectfully submit this testimony **in strong opposition to HB 1378-HD2**.

While the original intention of this bill—to establish a performing arts grant program—is welcomed and supported by many, HB 1378-HD2 has turned into a vehicle to restructure a committed funding source for HSFCA, which we strongly oppose. As a visual arts and culture center, the Donkey Mill Art Center deeply respects and supports all forms of artistic expression, including the performing arts, often incorporating them into our youth programs. However, the proposed changes, including restrictions on the Works of Art Special Fund, and shift to general fund appropriations are concerning and pose a significant threat to the arts and culture ecosystem across our state.

Since its establishment in 1967, the Works of Art Special Fund has been a cornerstone of Hawai'i's creative and cultural community and has provided an incredible amount of security to the sector. Altering its structure or imposing limitations jeopardizes the sustainability of organizations like ours and undermines our ability to effectively serve our community. For these reasons, we oppose HB 1378-HD2 in its current form.

Why Now Is the Wrong Time for This Change

1. HB1378-HD2 Jeopardizes Long-Term Funding for the Arts.

The bill restricts the Works of Art Special Fund, which is the only dedicated and sustainable source of public funding for arts and culture statewide. Without it, Hawai'i's creative community will face deep cuts, leaving programs, jobs, and future opportunities at risk.

2. General Funds Are Not a Reliable Replacement.

The proposed general fund appropriation is temporary and comes with no guarantee of future support. As federal funds diminish, general funds will likely be diverted to essential services such as health, housing, and education—leaving the arts with little to no funding at all.

3. Arts and Culture Are Essential to Hawai'i's Identity and Economy.

The arts not only preserve our cultural heritage but also contribute to tourism, education, and community well-being. We need stable, dedicated funding to ensure arts and culture can thrive for future generations.

Impact on Donkey Mill Art Center and the Arts Ecosystem

The Donkey Mill Art Center serves as a vital resource in Kailua-Kona on Hawai'i Island, providing arts and cultural opportunities for over 5,000 people annually. Our mission is to strengthen and support individual and collective well-being through hands-on classes, exhibitions, and cultural events in the visual arts.

Of particular importance is our Youth Education Program, which has provided keiki ages 2–17 with access to arts and cultural education for 30 years. This program is supported in part by the SFCA's Artist in the Schools program, funded by the Works of Art Special Fund. These funds allow us to serve over 400 West Hawai'i keiki annually at under-resourced Title I schools such as Kahakai Elementary and Holualoa Elementary and provides professional development opportunities to our teaching artists and classroom teachers.

Through this funding, we integrate visual arts, literature, performing arts, environmental studies, and 'āina-based learning to nurture our students' sense of self, family, community, and world. For schools and communities with limited resources, programs like these are invaluable and must be preserved.

We respectfully urge you to oppose HB 1378-HD2 in its current form and preserve the integrity of the Works of Art Special Fund. Dismantling this vital funding mechanism would have far-reaching consequences, particularly for rural communities and under-resourced schools like ours.

Dear Chair Lee, Vice Chair Inouye, and Members of the Transportation and Culture and the Arts Committee:

I strongly **oppose HB 1378-HD 2**, particularly the provisions that amend the amounts required to be transferred into the Works of Art Special Fund and restrict its allowable uses.

HB 1378-HD 2 Jeopardizes Long-Term Arts Funding

As HB 1378-HD2 states the mission of the state foundation and culture and the arts is to promote, perpetuate, preserve and encourage culture and the arts as central to the quality of life and people of the State. The Works of Art Special Fund is the **only dedicated and sustainable** source of public funding for arts and culture statewide. This bill would severely limit its reach, placing arts programs, jobs, and future creative opportunities at risk.

While the bill proposes a **temporary general fund appropriation**, it comes with no guarantee of future support and is not a reliable replacement. With the reduction in federal funding, changes in foreign policies, and skyrocketing national debt, the nation's economy will wreak havoc on state's general funds - most likely leaving the arts with little to no funding at all. Such an outcome will not only be devasting to our communities' because our ability to preserve and promote a sense of place, history, heritage, and future endeavors will be sabotaged but the economy will also suffer. Culture and the arts is a major contributor to the state's regenerative tourism endeavors, enhances the productivity of other sectors, generates revenues, and creates jobs.

We are Living in Perilous Times

On the federal level, with the signing of two Executive Orders, the arts are being significantly undermined. Below are two examples:

Executive Order on "Initial Recissions of Harmful Executive Orders and Actions" revokes the previous administration's Executive Order #14084 promoting the arts, humanities, museums, and libraries. Case in point, the future of a vast collection of public artwork is in doubt as the Trump administration plans to fire workers who preserve and maintain more than 26,000 pieces owned by the U.S. government, including paintings and sculptures by renowned artists, some dating to the 1850s. (Attachment A)

Executive Order on "Ending Radical and Wasteful Government DEI Programs
And Preferencing" has results in such actions as the National Endowment for the
Arts canceling its Challenge America grant that was designed for 'underserved
communities.' (Attachment B)

This lack of understanding and appreciation for the role and impact culture and the arts has on our nation's well-being and prosperity will be further compounded by the actions being considered in this bill. Tampering with The Works of Art Special Fund in ways that significantly alter its intent creates great uncertainty for the SFCA, thereby, the people of Hawai'i.

A Way Forward - Move Performing Arts Grants to HB 925-HD 3

A way to move forward to support both the Performing Arts and SFCA is to move the language from HB 1378-HD 2 that establishes a Performing Arts Special Fund and appropriates funds for Performing Arts grants, into HB 925-HD 3, where it is more germane. HB 925-HD 3 also proposes a dedicated revenue source by allocating a percentage of fees from state-run performing arts venues to the fund.

I urge you to **protect the Works of Art Special Fund** and ensure that Hawai'i's arts and culture sector remains strong for generations to come.

Trump administration slashes division in charge of 26,000 U.S. artworks

The fate of holdings dating to before the Civil War is uncertain after the dismissal of most workers in the General Services Administration's fine arts and preservation units.

The future of a vast collection of public artwork is in doubt as the Trump administration plans to fire workers who preserve and maintain more than 26,000 pieces owned by the U.S. government, including paintings and sculptures by renowned artists, some dating to the 1850s.

Fine arts and historic preservation workers at the General Services Administration told The Washington Post that at least five regional offices were shuttered last week and that more than half of the division's approximately three dozen staff members were abruptly put on leave pending their terminations. Workers expressed fear that the cuts will threaten a collection of precious art housed in federal buildings across the country, including Alexander Calder's 1974 "Flamingo" at the John C. Kluczynski Federal Building in Chicago and Michael Lantz's 1942 "Man Controlling Trade" outside the Federal Trade Commission building in D.C.

The cuts and restructuring follow President Donald Trump's executive orders on hiring freezes and reductions across the federal workforce, a GSA spokesperson said Tuesday, adding that the agency is "making decisions to optimize the workforce for our future mission, and remains committed to supporting impacted employees as they transition from federal service."

"This email serves as notice that your organizational unit is being abolished along with all positions within the unit — including yours," read the March 3 memo, signed by acting GSA administrator Stephen Ehikian. Ehikian added that the eliminated units "no longer align" with agency and White House goals, and referenced the efforts by Elon Musk's U.S. DOGE Service to slash costs across the government.

"It's just the rug being pulled out," said a worker who received the email, who spoke on the condition of anonymity because staff have been instructed not to speak to the media while on leave.

The worker said the dismissals have already left precious artworks in limbo. The 1941 Gifford Beal painting "Tropical Country," which normally sits in the Interior Department building, is temporarily in a conservator's studio for restoration — but the conservator now doesn't know who to reach at the GSA or whether he'll be paid for his work. "There's been no planning or accounting or consideration for that," the staffer said. "It's supremely shortsighted."

The dismissals come as the GSA, the central agency for federal building and technology operations, has indicated that it wants to sell off some 50 percent of its portfolio of federal buildings. On March 4, the GSA <u>published but then deleted</u> a list of "noncore" buildings that it intended to sell, including the headquarters for the Justice Department, the FBI and GSA properties, including historic buildings in Washington's monumental core. A GSA spokesperson told The Post last week that the agency plans to republish the list.

According to former staffers, the agency is looking to end its lease for a storage facility in Northern Virginia that holds hundreds of paintings and sculptures, including pieces sponsored by the Depression-era Works Progress Administration, a New Deal program responsible for some of the nation's most iconic images. Federal government watchdogs over the years have <u>sought to reclaim</u> WPA artworks, some of which were sold on eBay. When the works were commissioned, artists were paid as much as \$42 a week in 1934, or roughly \$1,000 a week in today's dollars, for finished pieces.

The federal government's art collection works like a distributed museum, with paintings and sculptures spread across courthouses and office buildings around the country. The government continues to add to its collection through the Art in Architecture Program, which devotes 0.5 percent of estimated construction costs for a federal building toward commissioning new artworks. Since 1974, the GSA has commissioned more than 500 works by artists for public plazas and federal offices, among them Sam Gilliam, Ellsworth Kelly and Maya Lin.

Many of them require frequent care, which is managed by small teams located in each of 11 regions across the country, plus a central office in Washington. The federal art collection is managed by a staff much smaller than that of other American art museums; Crystal Bridges in Bentonville, Arkansas, for example, boasts a smaller collection but employs about 300 people.

Some of these works are literally part of the buildings, such as Ben Shahn's 1942 fresco "<u>The Meaning of Social</u> <u>Security</u>" plastered onto the wall of the Wilbur J. Cohen Federal Building in

Washington. Staffers wonder what would happen to those works if buildings were sold.

"The Fine Arts Program makes decisions regarding final disposition of artworks in disposed buildings on a case-by- case basis," the GSA spokesperson said. "The overarching goals are to protect the artwork in the best way possible and to ensure the public's access to the artwork."

Possible actions, according to the agency, may include transferring limited ownership of an artwork to a building's new owners, with an agreement to protect it; retaining ownership of a work or relocating it; or fully transferring a work to a building's new owner and removing it from the GSA's collection.

Fine-arts staff said the reduction-in-force notices came suddenly, leaving them little time to notify artists under C ommission or contractors working on objects.

Employees placed on leave described ongoing contracts with artists to commission new works that may now go unfulfilled. Repairing public sculptures clipped by vehicles or cleaning artworks vandalized with graffiti are routine parts of the job. Every two years, staff visit and personally inspect each artwork in the collection, a census that takes about four months.

A day after staffers were placed on indefinite leave, the director for the GSA Center for Fine Arts instructed employees to quickly upload their documents into a shared folder or risk losing the preservation history for these works, according to a copy of her email obtained by The Post. That director addressed her email to "for everyone left" and ended it by writing "this needs to be a priority."

Staff members described fears about what long-term changes to the GSA's art procurement process could mean. Trump signed an <u>executive order</u> on Jan. 29 restoring a <u>directive</u> from his first administration authorizing a National Garden of American Heroes, a monumental park to include some 250 statues of historical figures. Typically, the Art in Architecture Program has identified artists for commissions and asked them to take the lead, rather than dictate the content for artworks to be produced.

"One of the beautiful things is we're not prescriptive. We don't tell artists what to work on," said another staffer, who also spoke on the condition of anonymity. "They go and percolate and come up with their concepts."

NEA nixes grant program for 'underserved communities,' shifting priorities

The National Endowment for the Arts canceled one initiative and said another would prioritize projects about the Declaration of Independence.

The National Endowment for the Arts said Thursday that it will alter its 2026 grant guidelines, eliminating a fund for underserved communities and prioritizing projects that honor the 250th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence.

The moves come as the Trump administration's directives to shut down diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) programs are forcing changes in Washington's federally funded cultural institutions and as the executive branch seeks to put its mark on a patriotic celebration planned for next year.

The Challenge America grant will be canceled for 2026, the NEA said in a news release. That program was reserved for projects that "extend the reach of the arts to underserved groups/communities," according to the NEA's website. The agency encouraged Challenge America applicants instead to apply with the Grants for Arts Projects program.

Now, however, Grants for Arts Projects will "encourage projects that celebrate the nation's rich artistic heritage and creativity by honoring the semiquincentennial of the United States of America," its release said.

Applicants have until July 10 to apply. Organizations that already submitted grant applications under the program must submit a new one that complies with the updated guidelines, the agency said. The agency has numerous <u>other programs</u> for individuals and organizations.

"Funding priority will be given for projects that take place in 2026-2027 that celebrate and honor

the 250th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence," the statement continued.

According to the NEA, the changes were made because of "recent directives" and to "align with the agency's mission."

The announcement by the NEA follows an <u>executive order</u>, signed by President Donald Trump on Jan. 29, establishing a new task force — separate from the congressionally appointed U.S. Semiquincentennial Commission — that comprises the president, vice president, various agency leads and the chair of the NEA.

Under the order, the White House task force will "plan, organize and execute" the celebration, relegating the congressional commission to providing "recommendations and advice." Federal agencies across the government are required to submit their plans for 2026 events no later than March 1. (The same executive order also revived an unrealized plan from Trump's first term: the creation of a National Garden of American Heroes to feature 250 statues of U.S. historical figures.)

Efforts to prepare for the 250th anniversary predate the Trump administration. The National Endowment for the Humanities, for example, announced an initiative in 2019, "A More Perfect Union," to fund grants in all 50 states and jurisdictions related to the nation's founding.

Mary Anne Carter, whom Trump appointed NEA chair in 2019, is leading the organization as a senior adviser. Its previous chair, Maria Rosario Jackson, stepped down Jan. 20.

The NEA receives <u>about \$200 million</u> in federal funding every year as it awards grants to theaters, museums and other cultural groups. The agency received 2,195 eligible Grants for Arts Projects applications for the current fiscal year, which were submitted in February 2024. For 2025, the NEA previously said it would award 1,127 grants for a total of \$31,825,500 to support arts projects in 15 artistic disciplines and fields.

On Thursday, Elizabeth Auclair, an assistant director of public affairs at the NEA, wrote in an email to The Washington Post: "The FY2025 grants announced earlier this year were all approved by the NEA Chair under the previous administration. The recommended organizations then work with the NEA on finalizing the awards. Today's update relates to applicants for FY2026."

The cancellation of Challenge America, which offered \$10,000 grants to groups that could find matching funds, will be a particularly large blow to small arts organizations.

Will Bowling, director of education for Relative Theatrics, a theater company in Laramie, Wyoming,

which offers a literacy initiative for students, described Challenge America as "crucial."

"I feel like the Challenge America program is on the chopping block specifically because it helps support communities with lesser access to the arts and, in some verbiage, may be considered 'marginalized' or 'underserved' — which are now rapidly becoming keywords that are associated with diversity, inclusion, equity and access," Bowling said. "Wyoming is also one of the most underserved states in terms of access to artistic, cultural resources, and that's sometimes just based on geography. Our cities are many hundreds of miles apart. One of the schools I serve is about 40 miles outside of town, stuck in the middle of the prairies. So providing arts access to rural communities is a really important component."

Other grantees who benefited from the Challenge America program worry its elimination could harm the already fragile ecosystem for arts funding.

"We hope that having a track record of successful projects with the NEA would open doors to other funders," said Diane Dowling, chief financial officer of Carpe Diem Arts, an arts organization in Silver Spring, Maryland. "That's still to be seen. And with the Challenge America grant going away, I'm not sure what's going to transpire with that."

The move by the NEA comes less than two weeks after other cultural organizations across the federal government announced changes to comply with the flurry of new directives from Trump.

At the end of January, the Smithsonian Institution told employees that it would close its diversity office in response to Trump's <u>executive order</u> that declared DEI initiatives to be "illegal and immoral discrimination programs."

The Smithsonian made the changes days after the separate National Gallery of Art closed its diversity office and reassigned its staff in the wake of Trump's executive order. The gallery's website once listed values such as "diversity, equity, access and inclusion" but has swapped them for the phrase "welcoming and accessible."

Also in January, Trump's newly appointed Federal Communications Commission chairman, Brendan Carr, called for <u>an investigation</u> into NPR and PBS over their commercials and suggested that both entities could lose federal funding.

During Trump's first term, the White House submitted multiple budget proposals before Congress that recommended eliminating the NEA, which has long been a target of some politicians on the right.

Roger Schmidt, executive director of Sitka Fine Arts Camp, which serves students from rural Alaska

and more than 20 other states, called the change "a political and ideological stunt." The camp has regularly received NEA grants, including \$60,000 for 2025, and is uncertain about how to craft an application that will fit the new funding priorities.

"What will we do here?" Schmidt said. "I don't know. We'll write something about how supporting kids in the arts is the way to celebrate being an American."

He added: "If I were to tell the kids that this summer was going to be about the Constitution ... I think that narrow focus would be really devastating."

HB1378 Puts Hawai'i's Arts Sector at Risk

- 1. **No Permanent Funding** The bill offers only a temporary \$4 million allocation for fiscal years 2026 and 2027, with no long-term commitment. Without a dedicated source of funding, the future of arts and cultural programs remains uncertain.
- Unstable and Competitive Funding Sources By shifting arts funding to general funds and federal grants, this bill forces the arts sector to compete with other essential services like housing, education, and healthcare—sectors that already struggle for adequate resources.
- 3. Loss of a Critical Safety Net The Works of Art Special Fund has ensured that Hawai'i's arts sector remains resilient, even during economic downturns. Eliminating this fund leaves arts organizations vulnerable to budget cuts and shifting state priorities.
- 4. **A False Trade-Off** While short-term financial allocations may seem beneficial, sacrificing a dedicated funding source ultimately weakens the arts ecosystem rather than



strengthening it. A thriving arts sector contributes to economic growth, community engagement, and overall well-being.

At HHHRC, we see firsthand how the arts provide healing, connection, and a sense of belonging, especially for marginalized communities. We also see at the federal level how programs and services for our queer communities are increasingly under attack. Now is not the time to weaken support for the very institutions that protect and uplift us. The arts do more than preserve culture; they provide safe spaces for expression, advocacy, and social change.

The arts are not a luxury, they are a necessity. They preserve our cultural heritage, promote public health, and provide a platform for marginalized communities to share their stories. As an organization committed to harm reduction and community wellness, we urge lawmakers to protect the Works of Art Special Fund and reject HB1378-HD2.

We respectfully ask the committee to **OPPOSE HB1378-HD2** and seek alternative solutions that do not jeopardize long-term arts funding.

The Hawai'i Community Foundation (HCF) strongly opposes House Bill 1378 HD2 regarding the works of arts special fund (Section 6). If enacted, HB 1378 HD2 will restrict the use of this fund to costs related to the acquisition of works of art. Capping the revenue and shifting State Foundation on Culture and the Arts' operating funding away from this dedicated source, risks stability to SFCA and the greater community which benefits from many programs that are supported by this special fund.

HCF has a long history of partnering with SFCA to increase access to arts education at public and charter schools through the Artists in the Schools program. This program is supported by this fund and restricting use of the fund will greatly reduce access to arts education for keiki throughout the state. HCF believes that when opportunities to practice and participate in arts and culture are inclusive and accessible to everyone, from keiki to kūpuna, we will have a healthier community in Hawai'i. HCF is committed to increasing access to arts and culture as one of the six essential sectors of the CHANGE Framework.

While HB 1378 HD2 provides that general and federal funds can be appropriated to finance positions and other costs of SFCA, these funds are not guaranteed over time and jeopardizes stable funding for arts and culture. With the uncertainty of federal funding and the need to address many priorities in the state, it is essential to maintain funding to provide stability to the arts & culture community which contributes significantly to the well-being of our whole community.

Thank you for your service to the State of Hawai'i.

I am writing to respectfully oppose HB1378-HD2, scheduled for hearing on Thursday, March 13, at 3:15 pm.

At a time of great uncertainty in state and federal funding for all public essentials, HB1378-HD2 dismantles a critical safety net for local arts workers, artists, our creative economy, and most importantly, the communities we serve across the state.

The long-term impact of this is debilitating to the people of Hawai'i. In the bill, temporary general funds are allocated for FY26 and FY27, but there is no commitment beyond that. On March 10, 2025, House Finance Chair, Representative Kyle Yamashita, spoke about the state budget with Hawaii News Now, saying, "What we can see, the number is probably going to go down." Senate Ways and Means chair Donovan Dela Cruz concurred that hundreds of millions may need to be trimmed from the budget for state programs. (Source: Recession fears could dent state budget).

As Gaye Humphrey stated in a <u>Civil Beat Community Voice piece</u> recently, The arts are not just about creative expression — they are a major economic driver in Hawai'i. More than 20,000 Hawai'i residents work in the creative economy, contributing to a \$3.3 billion industry that fuels small businesses across the state.

If this bill is passed and moves state funding for arts programs out of the Works of Art Special Fund and into general funds, and then in the final FY26 FY27 budget those general funds are cut, we risk destruction of a major economic driver in Hawai'i, while robbing keiki of critical arts education programs and sending a message to everyone that the state of Hawai'i devalues culture.

Art saves lives, and art changes lives. When the hundreds of children and students a week pass through the museum, I am honored to give talks and share with them drawings and 3D sculpted and printed concepts that explore new realms like Hawaiian Science Fiction and Pacific Futurism. Coupled with this, I leave them with two "forever ideas".

The first is that Art is problem solving. Every human-made thing began with paper and pencil, and with these vital tools, we can draw our way out of the state of the world we are in.

And lastly, I remind them that for every hour they spend playing video games or watching television, then need to spend an hour drawing, or painting, or writing poetry, or working on the the great novel we all carry within. At least a 1 to 1 ratio; one hour taking, and one hour making.

Aloha,

As a member of the arts community in Hawai'i and a scholar of art history more generaly, I wan't to vehemently oppose this bill. I have a PhD in Art History from Harvard University and have worked in the arts for last 25 years. I am concerned that this bill will impact the art history of Hawai'i, and the Unites States more generally, in ways that have not been anticipated or considered by this committee.

The most worrisome part about this bill is that, while seemigly increasing the definition of arts to the performing arts, the bill does not offer permanent funding for any arts beyond 2027. Neither the arts as defined before this bill nor afterwards are protected after 2027. This leaves both the priorities of arts funding before this bill and after sorely at risk.

As an art historian by trade, I can attest that previous art funding in Hawai'i has guaranteed that we are able to tell the story of these islands. My current institution (although I am testifying as an individual) and institutions outside of Hawai'i have borrowed works from the State Foundation in order to tell the story of this territory. At present, HoMA has works from the State Foundation on view, the MAC in Maui plans to also borrow works, and the Musuem of Contemporary Art in Los Angeles is currently considering borrowing works from the Foundation for a large exhibition that will examine the art history of Japanese American postwar artists. These exhibitions would be greatly diminished without these works, and the history of the islands would be harder to access, to the deminishment of all people of Hawai'i and beyond. These are but three current examples of what we would loose if we stop funding or dimish the funduing of the visual arts in Hawai'i. We lose no less than our history, our identities, our understanding of self. This is a loss that cannot be easily replaced. A loss that we chose not only for ourselves but for future generations. It is short sighted and history will judge us harshly.

I agree that arts should be considered more widely. Your arguments for the significance of the performing arts are well taken, but if you stand behind your arguments for the significance of these arts, then you do not need to diminish visual arts funding, but to increase the funding for performing arts. The performing arts have state funding of their own and that funding should remain, not compete with visual arts. And if the performing arts are as significant as you claim, their funding shouwl certainly be guaranteed beyod 2027.

Consider also the debt we all have to support Hawai'is creative sectors. This goes well beyond the jobs and opportunities for people directly involved in the visual arts, it affects other industries, including tourism, education, and healthcare, to name a few.

Some version of this bill has come up more than once and the public opposition is strong. Disguising it as an increase in the definition of arts does not take away from the reality that funding is not secure past 2027.



Mahalo for the opportunity to express my strong OPPOSITION to HB 1378 HD2.

A resident of Waimea on Hawaii Island, I served two terms as an at-large commissioner with the Hawaii State Foundation on Culture and the Arts, and during those eight years I never tired of advocating for the SFCA and proudly explaining how the founding of SFCA and its revolutionary funding model — a percent for the arts —established a model for public arts organizations across the country. I am alarmed at the destructive threat that this bill poses to the SFCA.

I heartily support programs that benefit the performing arts. After graduating from the University of Hawaii in 1968 with a degree in theatre, I spent my professional life working in the theatre. I worked in both commercial and in non-profit theatre. I have depended on grants from the National Endowment for the Arts and the New York State Arts Council on the Arts. I worked in regional non-profit theatre, at the New York Shakespeare Festival, co-founded a successful non-profit Off-Broadway theatre, and I was a Broadway producer and general manager with about two dozen shows and several Tony Awards to my credit. I produced in London, Germany, Canada and across the U.S.. As a Broadway producer, I subsidized the budgets of non-profit regional theaters across the country so that they could co-produce new shows with the potential to move to Broadway. I love theatre. I know what it's like to start a theatre and to struggle for funding to keep it alive. In retirement, I've served on the board of directors of the Kahilu Theatre, been board president and also served as interim artistic director.

My lifetime commitment to the performing arts cannot be questioned, but I firmly believe that HB 1378 HD2 is not the way to support the performing arts. If the intent is to support the performing arts, do it in a way that doesn't turn the SFCA into legislative roadkill. A standalone performing arts bill with a discrete funding source could be administered effectively by the SFCA. Support for the performing arts should not be the sugar coating on a poison pill for the SFCA.

The Works of Art Special Fund has ensured the financial stability of the SFCA for more than 50 years. That apolitical funding stream is critical to the SFCA's continued success.

The mission of the SFCA — to promote, perpetuate, and preserve culture and the arts in Hawai'i and to celebrate and emphasize the cultural richness and diversity of Hawai'i — is under unprecedented attack by a federal government determined to erase cultural and artistic diversity and values from our society. In Hawaii, those are the values that we honor and celebrate. Now is the time to strengthen and defend SFCA and its mission, not to threaten or diminish it in any way.

Chair Kapela, Vice Chair Kong, and Members of the Committee,

My name is Amy Rose Craig, and I am an artist, educator, and advocate for arts funding that prioritizes the visual arts, community engagement, and the integrity of the Works of Art Special Fund. I submit this testimony in strong opposition to this bill, which seeks to divert funds from the existing Works of Art Special Fund and expand the responsibilities of the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (SFCA) beyond its original mission.

Concerns with the Bill

1. Misallocation of the Works of Art Special Fund

The Works of Art Special Fund was established to support public visual art installations, conservation, and education. This bill seeks to dilute those resources by expanding allowable uses to include performing arts events, marketing, and administrative costs that were never part of the original intent. The fund was designed to ensure that visual art remains an integral part of public spaces, and redirecting these funds undermines that purpose.

2. Administrative Overreach and Mission Creep

The SFCA has historically managed visual art programs, including public art acquisition, museum curation, and conservation. This bill shifts SFCA's focus toward event production and marketing for performing arts, which is not within its core competencies. Expanding SFCA's responsibilities without adequate planning, expertise, or infrastructure may lead to inefficiencies and mismanagement.

3. Threat to Visual Arts Funding

By removing clear funding allocations for visual arts and introducing vague language about grants and operational costs, this bill risks deprioritizing the creation, preservation, and exhibition of public art. Visual artists, educators, and conservators rely on the Works of Art Special Fund, and any reallocation reduces opportunities for new commissions, maintenance of existing artworks, and community arts education.

4. Lack of Fiscal Transparency and Oversight

The bill does not provide a clear funding cap for the proposed Performing Arts Grants Program, nor does it establish safeguards to prevent the depletion of existing visual arts funds. Without proper oversight, this could lead to significant financial strain on SFCA's current projects and reduce its ability to fulfill existing commitments.

5. Alternative Avenues for Performing Arts Funding Already Exist

The performing arts are already supported through multiple state, federal, and nonprofit grant programs, including the Hawai'i State Foundation's existing grants program. Rather than forcing SFCA to redirect funds away from public art, a separate funding mechanism should be established for performing arts initiatives.

Conclusion

While performing arts are an essential component of Hawai'i's cultural landscape, this bill undermines the foundational mission of the SFCA and threatens to erode critical funding for public visual art. Instead of repurposing existing funds, lawmakers should explore alternative funding sources for performing arts grants that do not jeopardize Hawai'i's visual arts programs.

For these reasons, I urge the committee to oppose this bill and to protect the integrity of the Works of Art Special Fund for its intended purpose.

This testimony is to express my strong objection to HB 1378 - HD2

. I have been an art professor at University of Hawai'i at Mānoa since 1992, and am also appointed Acting Director of the John Young Museum, The Art Gallery, and the Commons Gallery at UHM from 8/23-8/85. As an educator and Acting Gallery Director, I see the positive impacts that the 1% for art makes on the community, Native Hawaiian artists, and the emerging artists. The SFCA is one of the only avenues for support for Native Hawaiian artists. Recently, the The Art Gallery at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa held the exhibition Mai Nā Kūpuna Mai, which featured works by Native Hawaiian artists. The SFCA recommended four major pieces out of this show for purchase. Three of those artists had not had work previously collected by the SFCA (Marques Hanalei Marzan, Maika'i Tubbs, Puni Jackson) The fourth artist, Sean Kekamakupa'aikapono Kaonohiokalani Lee Loy Browne, is considered a treasure of the community. While the SFCA has collected his sculpture in the past, this is the first of his paintings recommended for collection. The bill states that "the SFCA has enough works of art and there is no need to acquire more art for the state collection." That is not true. The state does not have enough work by Native Hawaiian artists and is working to address that through recommendations of purchases.

The state also does not have enough work by the upcoming generations of emerging artists. Recently the SFCA also recommended for purchase the work of three MFA students part of the current show that is up at the UH Art Gallery, *Still Standing*. There are currently 280 art students at UHM, who have a great deal to contribute to the community. Often the first opportunity students have professionally is funded through programs offered by the State Foundation and

Culture in the Arts. The SFCA f unds organizations that give young artists the opportunity to exhibit and sell their work and to work in the community doing valuable service such as Arts in the School. Compared to other states Hawai'i is sadly lacking in art education in public schools. Often the only exposure students get to the arts is through SFCA programs. Already, there is a huge brain, drain, with talented students going to other states where there is more opportunity, without the 1% for art, we would lose even more of our talented young artists. Because I work closely with these young artist, I know how passionate driven and gifted they are. I know how much they are willing to give back to the community, and it is important for them to have the cultural institutions in place that allow them to reach their full potential. In sharing their immense talents with the community they make the state a better place to live in. I have taught at UHM for 33 years, and over the years, I have seen the great impact that my former students have made in the community because of their access to programming that is funded by the SFCA.

Most other states have private galleries that participate in the cultural discourse and support artists. Because of the high cost of real estate Hawai'i has far fewer private galleries. Artists who are making a cultural impact and furthering the pursuit of knowledge in the field of art are completely dependent on public institutions to show and sell their work. Many of the wealthiest property owners in the state live in other states or countries, and support the cultural institutions in their home cities, not here. SFCA is one of the only sources of revenue for nearly every major cultural institution. The SFCA was the first institution of its kind in the country and marks a major achievement for the State.

Tourist destinations are becoming more competitive. Many tourists look for a place that offers cultural engagement. Funding of the arts is essential in making Hawaii a desirable destination. The arts also raise the quality of life for those who live here. Thank you for considering my testimony. Please consider your commitment to the future, to the quality of life for local residents and for the perpetuation of Kanaka culture. Mahalo for your time in reviewing my testimony.

Dear Committee and Representatives,

As an art educator (with decades of teaching art in special ed programs and higher education Hawaii), I speak from experience: Art is critical to our survival as human beings in a world overwhelmed by virtual/social media/streaming content – and the passive nature of our existence. The act of creating something from nothing – be it clay, poetry, paint, music, or dance – engages our spirit unlike anything else. We can travel beyond the mundane and enter our own personal creative dimension. We can express ourselves by giving form to the thoughts and feelings that lie deep within us.

A final comment about endorsing funding for the arts: We can't help but pause and wonder at the statue of Father Damien at the entrance to the Hawai'i State Capitol or Chicken Man at HISAM, both of which are the result of funding for the arts.

For the sake of uplifting and free experiences with the arts for the people of Hawaii, for the sake of nurturing one's soul in ways that bear no cost, I ask that you vote against HB 1378-HD2.

Held once every three years, Hawai'i Triennial is internationally known, attracting artists, curators, and art seekers from around the world, many of whom recognize that Hawai'i has a unique viewpoint to share on the artworld's stage. The theme of this iteration is ALOHA NŌ, which invites artists to consider the many layered meanings of aloha as a practice in truth-telling, resilience, resistence, connection (to 'āina and one another), and healing. Triennial is a massive undertaking for our organization—an endeavor that is made possible by crucial, foundational funding from SFCA, which delivers support efficiently. The program offers arts integrated residencies to public and charter schools in the State of Hawaii. Arts integrated residencies provide valuable learning opportunities and experiences for students to learn and express not only arts but also other core subjects, such as reading, math, science, and other subjects in more holistic approaches. The program is offered to public schools for free currently and without this, many students will not have the valuable learning opportunities offered by teaching artists. Especially for neighbor island schools where the accessibility to arts is even more limited, they will suffer even more from having much less opportunities to learn in more creative and innovative approaches.

Supporting education for our future is crucial. Hawaii has much less accessibility to arts and arts education compared to most mainland states due to our remote location in the world. Aloha Chair, Vice Chair, and members of the Committee,

I am writing in strong opposition to HB1378 HD2, which proposes to establish the Performing Arts Grants Program and expand the responsibilities and funding structures of the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (SFCA).

While supporting the performing arts is a worthy goal, this bill raises significant concerns regarding transparency, prioritization of state resources, and potential displacement of existing cultural efforts:

1. Lack of Community Accountability

Expanding the SFCA's responsibilities to include planning and execution of performing arts events, without clear mechanisms for community consultation or representation, risks centralizing cultural authority in ways that could marginalize grassroots artists and culturally grounded practices. Hawai'i's diverse communities—particularly Kānaka Maoli artists and cultural practitioners—must be at the center of any efforts to promote the arts in our islands.

2. Shifting of Funds and Priorities

This bill amends the funding sources for the State Art Museum and increases transfers into the Works of Art Special Fund. Without clear accountability or detailed explanation of how these funds will be used, this risks diverting critical resources away from broader, existing cultural preservation and education programs. The prioritization of events and grant administration over long-term cultural sustainability is concerning.

3. Risk of Commercialization Over Cultural Integrity

By placing an emphasis on marketing and promotion, this bill could unintentionally promote commodified or mainstream representations of "Hawaiian culture" that erase or sideline authentic, community-driven expressions—particularly those not considered "performative" in a Western sense. Hawai'i's arts landscape is not just for consumption—it is a living, breathing expression of identity, spirituality, and resistance.

4. Insufficient Safeguards Against Inequity

There are no explicit provisions in HB1378 HD2 to ensure equitable access to these grants or programs, nor guarantees that rural, Native Hawaiian, or marginalized communities will benefit. Without such safeguards, there is a real danger that this program could widen the existing disparities in access to arts funding in Hawai'i.

In conclusion, while supporting the arts is important, HB1378 HD2 lacks the critical components needed to ensure that such support is equitable, community-centered, and culturally respectful. I urge the Committee to defer this bill and instead work with communities—especially Kānaka Maoli cultural practitioners—to co-create policies that uplift the arts in ways that are pono, inclusive, and grounded in aloha 'āina.

I am writing to strongly urge you to OPPOSE HB 1378-HD2, which threatens the future of Hawai'i's arts and culture.

Hawai'i's arts and culture are an essential part of our identity. As a teacher at a Native Hawaiian-focused public charter school, I have observed the positive impact on my students when they learn how to 'ulana lauhala (weave lauhala), kuku kapa (pound kapa), make a hula ki'i (traditional hula using ki'i or images and puppetry). My students also learn how to make traditional tools like i'e kuku (kapa beater), 'ohe kapala (bamboo stamp), and nose flute.

We rely on community partners like the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, Windward Community College, the Hula Preservation Society, and traditional Hawaiian practitioners who depend on the State Foundation on Culture & the Arts and its Works of Art Special Fund to keep our culture alive and thriving, and keep opportunities alive for my young students to make, share, inspire, and grow through art . This fund is the ONLY reliable and dedicated source of arts funding in Hawai'i, and without it, our cultural programs, events, and education opportunities could disappear.

HB 1378-HD2 may look like it's helping by offering temporary funding, but this bill puts the future of our arts in jeopardy. Here's why:

- 1. No Permanent Funding: The bill only promises \$4 million for fiscal years 2026 and 2027, with no guarantee after that. This is not enough to secure the future of Hawai'i's arts.

I am a performing artist, performing arts organizer, a previous recipient of the SFCA Folk Arts Apprenticeship Award, and president of the Hawai'i Museums Association.

I submitted initial testimony in strong support of HB1378, but now oppose HB1378 HD2 in its current form.

I still strongly believe that enabling SFCA to provide direct support to performing arts activities would make an enormous impact in projects involving preservation, innovation, and collaboration across Hawai'i's multicultural landscape. But not at the expense of restricting SFCA's most stable and reliable source of funding: the one percent from state capital improvement projects.

I admire and applaud the lawmakers whose intent is to annually fund both visual and performing arts at levels that strongly fuel Hawai'i's creative economy. However, the one percent law is crucial to providing consistent support that does not leave the arts and culture sector vulnerable to the whims of future legislators. The one percent is a long-term commitment to the deep value and unwavering support of arts and culture in our community.

In 1967, Hawai'i became the first state in the nation to adopt a percent-for-art law with the enactment of the Art in State Buildings Law, expanded in 1989 with the Works of Art Special Fund. This landmark legislation, a source of great pride in Hawai'i, inspired governments around the world to pass similar legislation to support and sustain arts in their communities.

The spirit of HB1378 – to create new funding for performing arts – would have a transformational impact on communities across Hawai'i. **However, I oppose this amended bill because it severely restricts SFCA's most reliable source of funding, and threatens its future.** I urge you to not support this bill.

At a time of great uncertainty in state and federal funding for all public essentials, HB1378-HD2 pours salt into the wound and dismantles a critical safety net for local arts workers, artists, our creative economy, and, most importantly, the communities we serve, from keiki to kupuna.

While at face value, this bill appears positive, its long-term impact is debilitating to the people of Hawaii. In the bill, temporary general funds are allocated for FY26 and FY27, but there is no commitment beyond that. Furthermore, on March 10, 2025, House Finance Chair, Representative Kyle Yamashita, spoke about the state budget with Hawaii News Now, saying, "What we can see, the number is probably going to go down." Senate Ways and Means chair Donovan Dela Cruz concurred that hundreds of millions may need to be trimmed from the budget for state programs. (Source: Recession fears could dent state budget).

My name is Kelsey Angel Baehrens. I'm a professional actor, musician, theater director, and producer from Kailua, O'ahu. I'm writing to you today from Los Angeles, where I'm performing at East West Players, the oldest Theater of Color (not to mention the oldest Asian theater!) in the country.

I consider myself an O'ahu legacy artist. My parents, Angela Angel and Scott Baehrens, are artists themselves who were either raised in or entrenched themselves in Hawai'i arts communities. My mother graduated from Leeward Community College's renowned theater program with local arts heroes like Roslyn Catracchia, Reiko Ho, Patrick Fujioka, and the late great Lisa Matsumoto. She and my father co-created Excel Entertainment, a precursor for 'Ōhi'a Productions, whose original musicals like Once Upon One Noddah Time and The Princess and the Iso Peanut are, in my opinion, among our crown jewels of locally grown theater. My parents were also documentary filmmakers, who traveled to Micronesia to help preserve the endangered cultures there. They built an impactful arts program at Waipahu High School in the 90s called SMILE. My father produced shows for the Waikīkī Blue Note, and for decades, my mom served 'Ōlelo Community Television as a camera operator, producer, and brilliant COO.

I remember being a toddler basking in the joy of the theater and music spaces they created, at the iconic Hawai'i Theater, at Waipahu High School, at Ala Moana Center for shows like Imagination, Wishes and Wings, and Christmas Gift of Aloha, being taken to Honolulu Theater for Youth productions, and ultimately realizing the arts were my destiny, too. Hawaii continued to build me up as I grew. I attended Mid-Pacific School of the Arts, 7th through 12th grade, on a full ride scholarship. My confidence bloomed with local programs for kids like PAPA and Allegra Performing Arts. I cut my professional acting and directing teeth in productions with Hawai'i Theater, 'Ōhi'a Productions, Hawai'i Shakespeare Festival, Manoa Valley Theater, and KOA Theater.

Today, I'm a working artist who thrives solely on the money I make in the arts (on the continent). I am living my and my parents' dream. I am also a co-creator of a new production company called the Talk Story Collective, a team of kanaka and kama'āina wahine producing Hawaiian plays and storytelling arts in communities across the country. Last year, we co-produced our debut theatrical piece in Las Vegas called "Hawai'i Talk Story", where Hawai'i-born actors traveled from 8 states just to be together, to speak pidgin on stage together, and to bring a piece of home to Hawaiians in Vegas. I cannot tell you how meaningful that event was for me, for all of us.

I dream of returning home soon and planting my roots back in Hawaiian soil. Without my foundation in the local arts community, my career would not exist. I need to give back to the place that raised me with such love and joy and encouragement. In order to realize my ambitions to grow our local theater and music scenes, I will need funding from my state government. There is no getting around that. I know firsthand the difficulty of fundraising, the grind in getting folks to believe in your mission as much as you do. You probably understand that feeling better than anyone. Times are hard, and artists are always among the first to feel it. Yet artists are still essential to social infrastructure, as educators, as keepers of culture, as activists, as thought leaders. A friend of mine likes to say that arrt changes culture and culture changes policy.

While HB1378 includes positive provisions that I believe head in the right direction, it ultimately threatens the long-term stability of arts and culture funding by dismantling the Works of Art Special Fund. It is our only dedicated, reliable funding source for the arts. Replacing this funding with federal and general funds, especially now, can only reduce our funding as it will compete with very high priorities like housing, education, and healthcare.

Thank you for reading my testimony and for your tireless work for Hawai'i. It does not go unappreciated with me and my community. Please reconsider HB1378. Artists want to come home to Hawai'i to do their work, and we need local art and artists now more than ever.

The Works of Art Special Fund is a Lifeline

The Works of Art Special Fund has long served as a vital safety net for Hawai'i's arts and culture sector, ensuring that even during economic downturns, the creative sector can survive and thrive. As an artist and professor, I've seen how this funding supports not only professional artists but also students and emerging creatives, helping them develop their skills and contribute to Hawai'i's rich cultural fabric. HB1378-HD2 threatens to undermine this stability by diverting resources away from the fund, jeopardizing long-term support for arts and culture programs statewide.

- 3. **Dismantling a Critical Safety Net** The Works of Art Special Fund has provided consistent and stable support for Hawai'i's creative sector. Weakening this fund would leave arts and culture programs exposed to future budget cuts and funding shortfalls.

4. **No Real Gain for the Arts** – In exchange for temporary funding, the bill sacrifices long-term stability. The potential short-term boost does not justify the long-term harm it would cause to the arts and culture sector.

Why This Matters

Arts and culture are essential to Hawai'i's identity, economy, and community well-being. They foster creativity, preserve traditions, drive tourism, and contribute to economic development. As an artist and educator, I see how arts programs enrich the lives of students and create opportunities for local artists to thrive. At a time when arts and culture are central to community healing and resilience, now is not the time to gamble with funding. Weakening the Works of Art Special Fund will have lasting negative consequences for Hawai'i's creative community.

Aloha, Chair and Members of the Senate Committee on Transportation and Culture and the Arts,

I strongly oppose HB 1378-HD2, a bill that threatens the long-term stability of arts funding in Hawai'i by dismantling the Works of Art Special Fund. While I appreciate efforts to support the arts, replacing a dedicated funding source with temporary allocations and uncertain general funds puts the entire sector at risk.

As a teaching artist working directly with K-12 students, I integrate visual arts into STEM, project-based learning, and Social Emotional Learning (SEL) programs. Through the Artists in the Schools (AITS) program, I bring hands-on, arts-integrated experiences into classrooms. engaging students in creative and critical thinking. My work aligns with the Kennedy Center's definition of arts integration - "...an approach to teaching in which students construct and demonstrate understanding through an art form. Students engage in a creative process which connects an art form and another subject area and meets evolving objectives in both." For example, I use the Engineering Design Process in STEM education to help students develop critical thinking and problem-solving skills through visual art and paper engineering. In projectbased learning, I have collaborated with teachers in Math, Life Science, English, and Social Studies, often partnering with community organizations to foster a deeper appreciation for Hawai'i's native species and the importance of conservation. In my SEL programs, I guide middle school students in navigating adolescence using CASEL's Core Competencies—Self-Awareness, Self-Management, Social Awareness, Relationship Skills, and Responsible Decision-Making—connecting these concepts to the Hero's Journey, a framework they recognize from popular films and literature and can apply to their personal life journeys. The arts provide a bridge to understanding, confidence, and connection in ways that no other subject can replicate. This work benefits all students, but its impact has been especially profound in the wake of the **Lahaina fire**. For those who have suffered trauma and loss, arts education has been a lifeline, providing a safe space for students to process emotions, find their voice, and regain a sense of stability. The creative process fosters healing, resilience, and connection—critical elements in helping our communities rebuild.

Programs like Artists in the Schools (AITS) make these opportunities possible, ensuring students across Hawai'i receive a well-rounded education. However, without a dedicated funding source like the Works of Art Special Fund, these programs face an uncertain future. General funds and

federal grants, while helpful, are not guaranteed and shift with changing priorities. The \$4 million allocation in HB 1378-HD2 for 2026 and 2027 is only a temporary fix—what happens after that? Without stable funding, arts education programs will be left in limbo, forcing schools and educators to scramble for resources year after year.

The arts are not an afterthought—they are essential to education, cultural preservation, and economic vitality. The Works of Art Special Fund has ensured that the arts remain accessible, even in times of economic hardship. Dismantling this fund would weaken Hawai'i's arts ecosystem rather than strengthen it.

I urge you to oppose HB 1378-HD2 and protect the future of the arts in Hawai'i. A thriving arts sector benefits us all and deserves a funding model that reflects its lasting value.

The bill offers a short-term \$4 million general fund appropriation for fiscal years 2026 and 2027, with no guarantee of future funding. In exchange for temporary funding, the bill sacrifices long-term stability, putting the entire sector at risk. As federal funds diminish, general funds will likely be diverted to essential services (health, housing, education and transportation), leaving the arts with little to no funding at all.

Firsthand, I experience how excited our community is, whether they are artists or people enjoying the works of art, to get together at Capitol Modern's special events. The aim is to support, promote, and recognize the excellence of Hawai'i's diverse artists; create, display, and maintain in public places the state art museum's collection of works of art that represent the diversity and excellence of the State's artistic expression.

Giving artists the opportunity to present their work and audiences to experience creative ideas expressed in art forms makes our world as a whole, and Hawai'i in particular, a culturally richer place. Art is not always tangible, but it inspires people in so many different ways. We need innovative concepts to explore new avenues to move forward, think outside the box, and feel positive about the place we all share and most of us call home. From my experience, museums are places of interest when filled with people (life!) who get to meet artists and get involved with the arts, including events after hours - a platform for conversation.

The arts cannot exist in a space that lacks an outlet to give it expression. It is an important landscape providing enriching experiences with the arts.

Arts and culture are essential to Hawai'i's identity and economy. Therefore, I urge you to oppose HB 1378-HD2 to protect the Works of Art Special Fund. This is not the time to dismantle the very foundation that sustains our creative and cultural communities.

While it does create a Performing Arts Grants Program and Performing Arts Grants Special Fund, it replaces the allocated 1% with general revenue and federal funding. In today's national political climate, there is little expectation that federal funds will be funding the arts of any kind for quite a while or if awarded, abruptly pulled because someone of note in Hawai'i made some public comment that offended someone in a position of power outside of the State.

By placing the funding exclusively on federal funds and general revenue, this bill essentially reneges on nearly 40 years of the State's commitment to "...promote, perpetuate, preserve, and encourage culture and the arts as central to the quality of life and people of the State." There was a great deal of wisdom in funding the arts in the present way, as those legislators who proposed and adopted that model no doubt knew well, that the support of the arts are easily swept away by either a temporary need that could have been handled in other ways or by a very persuasive speaker with his or hers own agenda that may not have served the majority of our citizens.
