HHFDC <u>supports</u> HB 1406 HD1, which establishes the Intergovernmental Task Force for Permit Simplification within the House of Representatives to identify actions taken, challenges encountered, and legislative measures necessary to facilitate, expedite, and coordinate state and intergovernmental development permit processes. It also appropriates funds. HHFDC supports the measure so long as it does not adversely impact priorities identified in the Executive Budget Request for FY 2026.

The permitting process is often time-consuming due to the understaffing of resource-constrained agencies, the complexity and multiplicity of requirements, the sequential and contingent nature of reviews, and the potential for legal challenges, among other things. The entitlement and permitting process can take over five years, creating significant delays and uncertainty for housing projects, increasing carrying costs and capital market risks, and deterring investment in affordable housing.

HHFDC is named as a member of the task force and supports efforts to streamline the permitting process across various government agencies.

Aloha Chair Yamashita, Vice Chair Takenouchi, and Members of the Committee:

My name is Lyndsey Garcia, Director of Advocacy, testifying on behalf of the Hawai'i Association of REALTORS® ("HAR"), the voice of real estate in Hawaii and its over 10,000 members. HAR **supports** House Bill 1406, HD1, which establishes the Intergovernmental Task Force for Permit Simplification to identify actions taken, challenges encountered, and legislative measures necessary to facilitate, expedite, and coordinate state and intergovernmental development permit processes. Appropriates funds. Effective 7/1/3000.

Housing is impacted by numerous state-level permits, such as Special Management Area permits, Land Use Commission district boundary amendments, individual wastewater system permits from the Department of Health, State Historic Preservation Division reviews for historic properties, approvals from the Hawaii Housing Finance and Development Corporation for affordable housing projects, and permits from the Hawaii Community Development Authority.

At the county level, according to the 2024 UHERO's Hawaii Housing Factbook¹, Hawaii's permitting process takes nearly three times longer than in other states, despite efforts by counties to improve efficiency. Processing times for single-family home permits on average range from 141 days in Hawaii County to 315 days in Kauai County. For multifamily housing projects, approvals take even longer—318 days in Hawaii County and up to 427 days in Kauai County. In addition, the City & County of Honolulu faces a significant backlog, further delaying both residential and commercial projects.² These delays can significantly increase project costs, create uncertainty, and slow or disincentivizes the construction of much needed housing. As time passes, rising interest

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rates, increasing material or labor costs, and other market factors can render previously viable projects financially unfeasible.

As such, HAR supports efforts to streamline, expedite, and improve efficiency in the various permitting process to help address Hawaii's housing challenges.

Aloha Honorable Chair, Vice-Chair, and Committee Members:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in support of HB1406, HD1, which aims to streamline the state and intergovernmental development permitting process.

Hawaiian Telcom supports the intent of this measure, as Hawai'i's state and county permitting processes are more challenging, time-consuming, and costly than those in other states, causing significant delays to important projects. This bill seeks to address these onerous procedures by establishing a task force within the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism (DBEDT) to streamline permitting and propose legislative initiatives for a more efficient, transparent, and user-friendly experience, ultimately boosting economic development in our state.

Since Congress approved \$65 billion in 2021 to provide states and U.S. territories with federal grants to close the digital divide through the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) and Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) programs, the State of Hawai'i has been awarded over \$300 million in federal funding. This funding will be matched with state and private sector investments to build broadband infrastructure and deliver high-speed internet services across the state. Additionally, Hawaiian Telcom was one of 36 projects awarded a highly competitive federal Middle Mile Grant to build a new interisland broadband fiber cable connecting Kaua'i, O'ahu, Moloka'i, Mau'i, and Hawai'i. These federal projects share a highly defined timeline for delivering services, which must contend with the complexities of our state and intergovernmental permitting processes. Streamlining regulations, including permitting, will help stimulate and maximize private and public sector investments in constructing fiber-enabled broadband networks.

While these federal dollars provide a temporary infusion of funding for broadband infrastructure and services, the investments will yield significant economic and technological benefits for our state for generations to come. They will enhance the capacity and resiliency of our broadband networks and extend broadband connectivity throughout the state.

Hawaiian Telcom supports initiatives like this to improve state and intergovernmental development permitting processes. We stand ready to work with your Committee, the DBEDT, other state and county agencies, and stakeholders to find solutions to long-standing issues and enable greater economic competitiveness within the state.

My name is Sherry Menor, President and CEO of the Chamber of Commerce Hawaii ("The Chamber"). The Chamber supports House Bill 1406 House Draft 1 (HB1406 HD1), which establishes the Intergovernmental Task Force for Permit Simplification to identify actions taken, challenges encountered, and legislative measures necessary to facilitate, expedite, and coordinate state and intergovernmental development permit processes.

HB1406 HD1 aligns with our 2030 Blueprint for Hawaii: An Economic Action Plan, specifically under the policy pillar for Business Services. This bill promotes policies that drive economic growth, enhance workforce opportunities, and improve the quality of life for Hawaii's residents.

To improve efficiency in Hawaii's development permit system, the legislature is proposing to establish an Intergovernmental Task Force for Permit Simplification. This task force will assess permitting processes, identify challenges, and propose legislative measures to streamline state and intergovernmental approvals. Chaired by a House-appointed representative, its membership will include key state agencies such as the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism, the Land Use Commission, and the Public Utilities Commission. Representatives from the State's congressional delegation and county planning departments will also be invited. The task force must be formed by August 1, 2025, hold its first meeting by October 1, 2025, and conclude its work by June 30, 2027.

To support this effort, funding will be allocated for staffing and administrative costs for fiscal years 2025-2026 and 2026-2027, with expenditures overseen by the House of Representatives. By reducing bureaucratic delays and improving coordination, this initiative will facilitate business growth, housing development, and infrastructure improvements. The Chamber supports this measure as a vital step toward fostering economic development, increasing housing opportunities, and ensuring a more efficient and predictable permitting process for businesses and communities.

The Chamber of Commerce Hawaii is the state's leading business advocacy organization, dedicated to improving Hawaii's economy and securing Hawaii's future for growth and opportunity.
