



#### The Hawai'i Reef and Ocean Coalition STRONGLY SUPPORTS HB734!

Pollution from cesspools is harming the health of Hawaii's people and quality of Hawaii's waters. Hawaii has more than eighty thousand cesspools that discharge about fifty million gallons of wastewater into the State's groundwater every day. Cesspools are antiquated, substandard systems that damage public health; pollute drinking water; and lower water quality in streams, ground waters, nearshore marine areas, and the ocean. Cesspool pollution also harms public recreation and the precious coral reefs on which Hawaii's economy, shoreline, fisheries, and native species depend.

Cesspool upgrades are expensive. We need to try to find ways to make them affordable for homeowners and governments. At a time when many residents of Hawaii are struggling to make

ends meet, our State may have an excellent opportunity to **save our people money** by updating the Department of Health's rules and practices. Department rules have not been upgraded since 2015.

Aloha, Chair Lowen, Vice-Chair Peruso and Committee Members:

On behalf of the non-profit WAI: Wastewater Alternatives & Innovations, I am writing in **strong support of HB734.** This bill requires the Hawaii Department of Health to work with consultants and industry leaders to review and update its rules and regulations to make wastewater systems and cesspool upgrades more affordable and efficient.

Cesspool conversions can be costly, and we need to try to find ways to make upgrades more **affordable**. Following the examples of other states and municipalities, the DOH guidelines for wastewater treatment (HAR 11-62) need to be updated so that they can include more efficient treatment systems, technologies and practices. For instance, Hawaii has some of the highest daily flow rates in the country (200 gallons per day per bedroom), and these inflated rates dramatically increase the costs to convert cesspools.

Hawaii has more than 83,000 cesspools across the state, discharging 52 million gallons of raw sewage each day into Hawaii's waters. Along with threats to public health and drinking water resources, new research shows that polluted wastewater poses significant harm to coral reefs and the near-shore environment. The people of Hawaii need this law to make sure their wastewater systems aren't polluting the groundwater or nearby surface waters.

WAI is an environmental non-profit dedicated to protecting our water resources by reducing sewage pollution from cesspools. We support more innovative, affordable, and eco-friendly solutions to wastewater management. Better sanitation systems protect public health and valuable natural resources like groundwater, streams, coral reefs and coastal areas.

Hawaii is struggling with serious sewage pollution, and the state has a mandate to make sure all cesspools are converted in the next two decades. This bill would upgrade the rules and regulations for wastewater treatment and could lower the costs of upgrading cesspools. Mahalo for your leadership on this issue and support of this bill.

# Testimony of The Nature Conservancy Supporting HB 749, Wastewater Systems. Committee on Energy and Environmental Protection January 30, 2025, 9:00 am

Dear Chair Lowen, Vice Chair Perruso, and Members of the Committee:

The Nature Conservancy (TNC), Hawai'i and Palmyra supports HB734 which would require the Department of Health, in consultation with various agencies and professionals, to review rules and practices and propose changes that have the potential to make wastewater systems and cesspool upgrades more affordable without compromising water quality.

Science conducted by TNC and partners has shown that wastewater, particularly cesspools, are detrimental to the coral reefs which protect our coastlines and underpin our economy. Without clean coastal waters are reef ecosystems are put at even greater risk in the face of growing global stressors including climate change.

Cesspools cause harm to water quality within adjacent groundwater, anchialine, coral reef systems and fisheries by introducing elevated amounts of organic nitrogen and phosphorus, pathogens, and other contaminants. Contaminants emitted from cesspools can harm aquatic ecosystems by encouraging excess algal and bacterial growth and can also pose a threat to human health. Our research in He'eia, Maunalua, Olowalu, Hana and South Kohala has shown direct evidence of cesspool contamination in streams and coastal waters using a variety of bioindicators and chemical signatures.

HRS11-62 governs our state's wastewater systems and has not been updated in ten years. A thorough review of HRS11-62 would enable proven experts and working professionals to establish new best practices to the guidelines that control how the contaminants are removed from wastewater systems, including critical changes that can make cesspool upgrades cheaper while increasing protections to human and environmental health.

Guided by science, TNC is a non-profit organization dedicated to the preservation of the lands and waters upon which all life depends. The Conservancy has helped protect more than 200,000 acres of natural lands in Hawai'i and Palmyra Atoll. We manage 40,000 acres in 13 nature preserves and have supported over 50 coastal communities to help protect and restore the nearshore reefs and fisheries of the main Hawaiian Islands.
