Chair Kila, Vice Chair Grandinetti, and members of the Committee:

The Department of Law Enforcement (DLE) provides comments on House Concurrent Resolution 43, requesting the Department of Transportation and Department of Law Enforcement to study the possibility of a highway patrol and speed cameras along major freeways and highways in primary areas of speeding.

This resolution seeks to address an important public safety concern by exploring technological and operational solutions to reduce speeding on major roadways. Excessive speeding is a significant contributor to traffic fatalities and serious injuries, and implementing effective countermeasures aligns with the DLE's mission to enhance public safety.

The DLE welcomes the opportunity to collaborate with the Department of Transportation on this study. By combining our expertise in law enforcement operations with the Department of Transportation's knowledge of highway infrastructure and traffic patterns, we can develop a comprehensive understanding of where and how speed enforcement

can be most effectively deployed.

Speed cameras, when implemented appropriately, have proven effective in other jurisdictions for reducing speeding violations and improving traffic safety. A thoughtful study will allow us to evaluate their potential effectiveness in our specific context, including considerations of privacy, technology reliability, and appropriate deployment locations.

Additionally, exploring the development of a dedicated highway patrol function would allow for more specialized traffic enforcement. This approach could enhance our ability to consistently monitor and enforce speed limits on major roadways, serving as both a deterrent to dangerous driving and a means to quickly respond to incidents.

The DLE is prepared to commit resources to this study and believes that the findings will provide valuable data to inform future policy decisions regarding traffic safety enforcement strategies.

Bill No. and Title: House Concurrent Resolution No. 43

Purpose: REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION AND DEPARTMENT OF LAW ENFORCEMENT TO STUDY THE POSSIBILITY OF A HIGHWAY PATROL AND SPEED CAMERAS ALONG MAJOR FREEWAYS AND HIGHWAYS IN PRIMARY AREAS OF SPEEDING.

Judiciary's Position:

The Judiciary takes no position on the merits of this resolution. The Judiciary has concerns regarding the expansion of the automated speed enforcement systems and its impact on court operations. The Department of Transportation currently has red-light detectors in 10 downtown Honolulu intersections, which generate approximately 2,000 citations per month. Recent data regarding the speed enforcement cameras produced 22,000 potential violations in one-week for vehicles exceeding the speed limit by 11 miles per hour. Currently, each citation is manually entered by court staff into the Judiciary's case-management system. An expansion of the camera systems will pose significant operational challenges for the courts without proper preparation to include identifying technological solutions and other resources needed to

streamline the manual process. The Judiciary welcomes the opportunity to discuss and work with partner agencies in the expansion plans of the camera systems.

As such, the Judiciary requests that this study include the impact a highway patrol and use of speed cameras along major highways would have on the district courts.

Dear Chair Kila, Vice Chair Grandinetti, and Committee Members,

The Oahu Metropolitan Planning Organization (OahuMPO) supports HCR43 requesting the Department of Transportation and Department of Law Enforcement to study the possibility of a highway patrol and speed cameras along major freeways and highways in primary areas of speeding.

This bill supports our goal of reducing traffic related deaths and serious injuries to zero by 2045. Traffic fatalities increased ten percent between 2023 and 2024 in Hawaii. In 2024, the State of Hawaii Department of Transportation conducted an annual behavioral study, and nearly one-quarter of respondents admitted to exceeding the speed limit by more than 20 miles per hour, and over half exceeded the speed limit by 10-20 miles per hour in the last six months.

The OahuMPO is the federally designated Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) on the island of Oahu responsible for carrying out a multimodal transportation planning process, including the development of a long-range (25-year horizon) metropolitan transportation plan, referred to as the Oahu Regional Transportation Plan (ORTP), which encourages and promotes a safe, efficient, and resilient transportation system that serves the mobility needs of all people and freight (including walkways, bicycles, and transit), fosters economic growth and development, while minimizing fuel consumption and air pollution (23 CFR 450.300).

Aloha Committee members of the Senate Committee on Transportation,

I am testifying to offer comments on this resolution, and to share concerns with the Committee on the use of cameras for speed enforcement.

While I understand that speeding is a challenge in Hawaii, it often is a factor in accidents, creates an unsafe environment for others on the road, and there is a lack of capacity to enforce speeding on our roadways, the use of cameras should be done with caution.

Often times while driving, drivers find themselves in situations where increasing speed is warranted, such as to avoid dangerous drivers who are near or behind you, or to go around someone who is driving extremely slow - which is also dangerous for other vehicles.

Cameras are not able to consider various factors, as it only captures an image of the conditions and cannot put into context the situations on the road. Because of this, if speed cameras are to be used, it should be only used for excessive speeding. Currently the red light speed cameras are allowing for 5 mph over the speed limit, which depending on the location, could be insufficient.

Please consider only using speed cameras for enforcing excessive speeding as it doesn't consider context/situations at all.
