Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawai'i's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

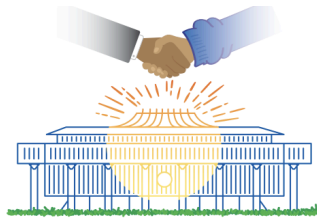
**The Hawai'i Farm Bureau supports HCR 104 / HR 100**, which urges the Department of Education to strengthen farm-to-school initiatives.

HFB strongly supports the increased use of locally grown agricultural products, fruits, vegetables, meats, dairy, poultry, and value-added products in our schools and state facilities. We support the State's Farm-to-School goal of 30% by 2030, in accordance with Act 175, SLH 2021 as well as the Farm-to-State goals established in Act 176, SLH 2021.

Increased purchasing by DOE and other state departments will help address food security and food sustainability by creating demand for local farm products, which will result in farmers and ranchers growing more. It will also help provide more of Hawai'i's fresh and nutritious foods to our students and residents.

HFB is committed to working with the Department of Education and the other state entities to implement a procurement program that will allow Hawai'i farmers and ranchers to source more local products for Hawai'i's Farm to School and Farm to State programs.

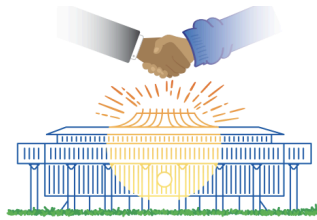
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Dear Chair Kahaloe, Vice Chair Kusch, and Members of the House Committee on Agriculture,

The Climate Future Forum's Regenerative Food Systems Working Group **strongly supports** HCR104, which urges the Department of Education to strengthen farm-to-school initiatives. Our purpose is to advance policies that build a resilient, equitable, and regenerative food system for Hawaii's future. Expanding farm-to-school programs is a key tool in addressing both climate change and food security while supporting local farmers, improving student nutrition, and building up our economy.

Hawaii currently imports nearly 90% of its food, making us highly vulnerable to external disruptions. Farm-to-school programs decrease our dependence on imported foods while simultaneously supporting local agriculture. However, significant barriers, such as complex procurement policies, inconsistent farm-to-school partnerships, and limited infrastructure—prevent schools from purchasing locally sourced foods at scale. Investing in farm-to-school initiatives is an investment in Hawaii's food sovereignty, economic resilience, and climate future. By strengthening these programs, we can provide nutritious meals to our keiki, reduce our carbon footprint, and support a thriving local agricultural economy. Hawaii has already committed to sourcing 30% of school meal ingredients locally by 2030, a goal that demonstrates our state's dedication to food security and agricultural sustainability. However, reaching this target will require removing barriers that make it difficult for schools to buy local—including streamlining procurement policies, strengthening farmer-school connections, and increasing funding for farm-to-school programs.

The Climate Future Forum empowers youth (ages 14–26) to actively engage in shaping and advocating for climate policy and legislation. By bringing together youth, educators, policymakers, and nonprofits, the forum fosters meaningful dialogue on climate action priorities and provides actionable steps to address climate change in Hawaii. Through discussions involving over 100 youth, the forum has identified key high-priority areas, including regenerative food systems,

climate and the economy, clean energy and transportation, climate justice and equity, and sustainable infrastructure.

Thank you very much for your support of youth engagement in climate policy. We urge you to pass HCR104 and take bold action to secure a sustainable, just, and resilient food system for Hawai'i.

The Hawaii Cattlemen's Council is in **support of HC 100/HCR 104**, which advocates for the expansion and support of farm-to-school programs in Hawaii.
