Aloha Chair DeCoite, Vice-Chair Wakai, and Members of the Committee:

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawai'i Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawai'i's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate, and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawai'i Farm Bureau supports SB 448, which appropriates funds to the Agribusiness Development Corporation (ADC) for the acquisition of a conservation easement in Central O'ahu to ensure the long-term preservation of agricultural lands for food production and sustainability.

Hawai'i's agricultural industry faces increasing challenges, including losing prime farmland to urban development, rising operational costs, and competition from imported goods. The State Constitution (Article XI, Sections 3) mandates conserving and protecting agricultural lands, promoting diversified agriculture, increasing agricultural self-sufficiency, and assuring the availability of agriculturally suitable lands. SB 448 aligns with these mandates by securing critical agricultural lands for future generations of farmers.

Moreover, the State has enacted ambitious goals to increase local food production. Act 175 (2021) requires that at least 30% of food served in Hawai'i's public schools be locally sourced by 2030, and Act 176 (2021) mandates that 50% of produce purchased by state departments be locally grown by 2050. Meeting these targets will require long-term access to agricultural lands—lands that are increasingly at risk of conversion to non-agricultural uses.

By funding a conservation easement, SB 448 will:

- Preserve farmland for active agricultural use and ensure it remains available for future food production.
- Provide stability for farmers who depend on agricultural land for their livelihoods.
- Support the State's food security goals by protecting productive land from development pressures.
- Help the local economy by sustaining agricultural jobs and local food production.

Agriculture should be a pillar of Hawai'i's economy and food security, and proactive efforts are needed to ensure its future survival and success. SB 448 represents an essential investment in Hawai'i's agricultural future.

We urge the committee to pass this measure and help safeguard Hawai'i's farmlands for future generations.
