### SB 498, RELATING TO AGRICULTURAL WORKFORCE HOUSING

Aloha Chair Gabbard, Vice Chair Richards, and Members of the Committee:

The Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) <u>supports</u> this bill which requires the Department of Agriculture to establish an Agricultural Workforce Housing Working Group to address the shortage and challenges of agricultural workforce housing in the State.

The Hawaiian Homes Commission Act authorizes DHHL to lease agricultural lands or lands used for aquaculture purposes. DHHL has awarded 1,105 agricultural leases as of December 31, 2024 – 60 on Oahu, 64 on Maui, 406 in East Hawaii, 111 in West Hawaii, 46 on Kauai, and 418 on Molokai. DHHL also has 19,939 applications for an agricultural lease as of January 1, 2025 – 4,220 on Oahu, 4,840 on Maui, 7,410 on Hawaii Island, 2,327 on Kauai, and 1,142 on Molokai.

DHHL's General Plan Update dated November 2022 notes the following: "The connection to 'āina and ability to cultivate it and bring forth life is central to Prince Kūhiō's vision for the rehabilitation of Hawaiians. The first homestead pilot program focused on agriculture production as evidence that the Hawaiian Homesteads work. Today, agricultural homestead lots have the longest waitlists on all islands except for O'ahu." The Plan also provides that "the majority of agricultural applicants who responded (80%) indicted that they intend to farm and live (i.e., build a home) on their agricultural lot when awarded. The agricultural activities that applicants anticipated for their lots, once awarded, were mostly subsistence and gardening activities, while 11% of waitlist respondents anticipated using their agriculture lot for commercial farming." The Plan further explains that "DHHL is developing an Agriculture Program Plan to increase beneficiary capacity in farming. Programs will range from training in beginning farming to more advanced programs for commercial agriculture."

- Enhance Productivity: By reducing commute times and ensuring workers have safe and stable living conditions, SB 498 supports a more reliable and productive workforce, benefiting farmers and the agricultural economy.
- Support Food Security Goals: A stable agricultural workforce is essential to achieving Hawaii's goal of doubling local food production by 2030, as outlined in the Hawai'i 2050 Sustainability Plan.
- 4. **Reduce Barriers for Farmworkers:** Many farmworkers face financial challenges due to Hawaii's high cost of living. Workforce housing

alleviates this burden, allowing workers to focus on their contributions to local food production.

 Create Opportunities for Rural Communities: Workforce housing projects will stimulate economic development in rural areas, support local businesses, and strengthen community ties.

#### ADC's Role in the Working Group

The inclusion of ADC on the proposed working group is a critical component of the success of this initiative. As the state's lead agency for agricultural land management and development, ADC is uniquely positioned to bring its expertise and resources to the table.

In its role on the working group, ADC will:

- Identify Suitable Sites: Work to identify lands under its management that are appropriate for workforce housing projects, ensuring proximity to active agricultural operations.
- Collaborate with Stakeholders: Partner with farmers, housing developers, local governments, and community organizations to design and implement housing solutions that are affordable, sustainable, and compatible with agricultural land use.
- Promote Sustainability: Advocate for the integration of renewable energy, water-efficient systems, and environmentally responsible practices in workforce housing developments.

- Ensure Agricultural Compatibility: Ensure that housing developments on agricultural lands do not interfere with or reduce agricultural productivity.
- Support Funding Efforts: Collaborate on securing federal, state, and private funding to support the development and maintenance of workforce housing projects.

#### Alignment with Statewide Goals

Senate Bill 498 aligns with several critical state priorities, including:

- Hawai'i 2050 Sustainability Plan: Workforce housing supports the agricultural workforce needed to increase local food production and reduce reliance on imported goods.
- Economic Development: Stable housing for farmworkers fosters economic growth in rural communities and helps sustain local farming operations.
- Social Equity: Providing affordable housing ensures that farmworkers and their families can live with dignity, stability, and access to basic services.

#### Conclusion

Pursuant to article V, section 6 of the Hawaii State Constitution, "[t]emporary commissions or agencies for special purposes may be established by law . . . ." This provision grants the Legislature, rather than the respective department, the authority to establish a commission or working group through statute. Accordingly, we recommend amending section 1(a) of the bill, on page 1, lines 1-4, as follows:

(a) [The department of agriculture shall establish] There is established within the department of agriculture for administrative purposes an agricultural workforce housing working group to address the shortage and challenges of agricultural workforce housing in the State.
