I am the President of the Association of Apartmednt Owners of Sands of Kahana Vacation Club ("SOK"). I fully support SCR 76 because all landowners along the Kahana Bay are in desparate need of an erosion mitigation solution.

SOK contains a total of 196 units, consisting of 1,2, and 3 bedroom condominiums. SOK is a founding member of the Kahana Bay Sterring Committee ("KBSC"). SOK represents 25% of the residential units in the KBSC. Other condominiums inside Kahana Bay have been forced to utilize emergeny sand bags to prevent damage to their residential builings. As a consequent of other resorts adding sandbags over the years, SOK was eventually forced to do the same in front of one of its four (4) residential towers. Erosion currently jeopardized a second residential tower such that sands bags will be needed to protect it.

Sands bags are not a permenant solution!!! The eight (8) member associations in KBSC have paid in excess of \$800,000 dollars for a well-research draft Envoironmental Impact Study ("EIS"). The draft EIS was completed more than a few years ago. During and after completion of the draft EIS, the KBSC has worked tirelessly with relevant local, state and fedral agencies to forge relationships focused on defining and implimenting a workable long-term solution. And just as KBSC was starting to see some movement from Maui County (including attendance at several committee meetings on the subject of the draft EIS), the tragic wildfires in Lahaina town occurred. In fact, if memory serves me the last committee meeting KBSC attended occured the day before the wildfires broke out. It should also be noted at this point that SOK housed close to 100 families for serveral months after their homes were destroyed.

Needless to say, residental recovery from the wildfires must take priority. And yet, if DLNR combines its expertise with that of Maui County (and even the Army Core of Engineers), the resorts on Kahana Bay can receive much needed attention [and solution(s)] to the ever-increasing erosion occuring next and under their residential buildings.

I cannot overstate the urgency of this situation. This situation is so serious that one powerful set of King Tides could take out one (or more) buildings at each resort on Kahana Bay.

Dear Chair Hashem, Vice Chair Lamosao and Members of the Committee on Water and Land:

We submit this testimony on behalf of the Association of Apartment Owners of Hololani ("Hololani") in **strong support of SCR76 SD1**.

Hololani is in support of SCR 76 SD1, which urges the Office of Planning and Sustainable Development to consult with the Kahana Bay Steering Committee, County of Maui, Department of Land and Natural Resources, and United States Army Corps of Engineers regarding a path forward for the proposed Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation Project.

Kahana Bay, where Hololani is situated, has experienced catastrophic erosion issues which began in 2007 and continue to threaten the shoreline due to sea level rise and climate change impacts.

In 2017, at the urging of the Maui County Department of Planning, Hololani and eight other neighboring condominium projects and the owner of the remaining kuleana parcel along the Kahana Bay shoreline, formed the Kahana Bay Steering Committee ("KBSC"). KBSC has worked since then to develop, plan, implement and fund a regional erosion mitigation project, and in 2018, retained Oceanit to assist.

KBSC has invested significant time, effort and money in this project. However, after Oceanit published the Second Draft Environmental Impact Statement in 2021, the project stalled, in part because the County of Maui indicated that it was unwilling to

assume the liability risks of owning the proposed groins that would be required to keep the restored sand in place. Currently, many of the condominium properties along this shoreline are relying on emergency sandbags as their only protection against further erosion of the shoreline, and remain precariously exposed to further, and potentially catastrophic, erosion.

We respectfully request that the Committee adopt this resolution in its current form. We appreciate your consideration and thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in strong support of this measure.

Testimony for SCR 76 – Kahana shoreline erosion mitigation

Aloha Chair Inouye, Vice Chair Elefante, and Members of the Committee,

I am submitting this testimony in strong support of **SCR 76** because we desperately need a real, long-term solution to the severe erosion along the Kahana Bay shoreline. If we continue to wait, this will become a catastrophic problem.

My name is Virginia Keen. I am NOT a millionaire investor. The Hololani has been my only home for the past 26 years. I am 82 years old and STILL substitute teach at Lahainaluna high school on a daily basis. I've been part of this school district for 24 years. I have devoted 19 years to the afterschool tutoring program in Lahaina. I am a year-round resident whose children and grandchildren visit often, but I also cherish being part of this island family. My condominium is now less than 20 feet from the retaining wall and failing sandbags that separate my building from the ocean and this has me worried. When I first arrived, there were 50 feet of property next to my unit, as well as a substantial beach. I have seen first hand how strong the ocean's impact is.

I strongly support **this bill** because it will make the shoreline in our area safer for everyone. Our sandbags were never meant to be a long-term solution; yet they have been our first line of defense for 18 years. At the beginning of their use, there was still a small strip pf beach. Now the bottom bags are submerged and deteriorating. They are overgrown with seaweed. The sea turtles are foraging on the bags, ripping holes and adding to problem. A permanent fix – replacing the sandbags with a rock revetment and stairs – will protect our community, our visitors, and our turtles.

The condominiums in this region have not been idle. The **Kahana Bay Steering Committee properties** have invested time, effort, and significant funds to complete a Draft Environmental Impact Statement, and they are willing to fund a viable solution. What we need now is for DLNR to step in and help us bring this project to completion. This project aligns with regional alternatives and will also help address the severe flooding along Honoapiilani Road. Every heavy rain and extreme high tide event threatens our community, and doing nothing is not an option.

As someone who has spent my life teaching and caring for others, I now ask you to help care for us. Please support the completion of this project for the safety of our community, our visitors, and the future of our shoreline.

Please, support SCR 76 and help us secure that future. Mahalo for your time.

I am writing to you as an owner of property at Kahana Bay for the past three years and someone who has been closely associated with this area for over a decade. The situation we face is urgent. Our community requires your support and immediate action to address the severe erosion that is displacing residents and threatening entire properties.

Full-time residents and families are losing their homes to erosion at Kahana Bay. Shoreline structures are being undermined, lanais are fenced off, and storm flooding now reaches public roads. Without intervention, the damage will accelerate, leading to more displacement.

Only the State can lead in resolving these issues.

This is a regional solution created by and for the community. It is not about one building or a single project. It concerns hundreds of local residents—seniors, families, full-time residents— who live here and are witnessing their homes and shoreline disappear. The mitigation plan includes restored beach and public access, environmentally responsible protection, and designs

I've been coming to Kahana Bay since 1993. In 2012, I deepened that connection by purchasing a home here. Since then, I've had a front-row seat to the alarming and relentless erosion of this shoreline. In front of Hololani, we have not only lost the beach — we've lost **at least 14 feet of actual land** to the ocean. And yet, we are still paying property taxes on land that no longer exists.

But this isn't just about property values. This is about public safety, regional infrastructure, and protecting the long-term viability of an entire shoreline community as well as the environment.

Our Hololani community responded responsibly. We went through an extensive, years-long permitting process and took on **\$7 million in debt** to implement emergency shoreline protections. Despite those efforts, we still have to place **hundreds of sandbags every few years**, each costing **\$1,100**, just to hold the line and keep our building — and more importantly, the **Lower Honoapi'ilani Road** — from being overtaken by the sea.

Every day of delay increases the threat to homes, lives, and vital infrastructure.

The situation now extends well beyond private property:

- Honoapi'ilani Road, a lifeline for West Maui, has already been closed for years in the past due to flooding.
- Public drainage and wastewater systems are increasingly at risk of failure.
- Emergency access and public safety are directly compromised.

At the **north end of the bay**, a public drainage easement **regularly floods**, requiring **County workers to enter hazardous conditions** to keep the road open. This is not an abstract risk it's an active crisis. **Full-time residents are being displaced.** Homes are being lost. Shoreline structures are crumbling, lanais are fenced off, and flooding now reaches public roads.

Without action, the damage will only accelerate. There is no beach left to save without this project.

Opponents argue they are "saving the beach" by blocking action. That claim is dangerously misleading. Without groins and managed beach replenishment, there is no sand to hold. The beach is disappearing — and it will not return on its own.

We have proven examples of success: the **Stable Road Groins Replacement Project on Maui** and similar efforts on **O'ahu** clearly demonstrate that **rock groins paired with managed sand replenishment** work. In those cases, sand wasn't just retained — it was *restored*. These are proven, environmentally responsible tools.

The community's **regional mitigation plan** is the only viable path to restoring and retaining a beach — for residents, for wildlife, and for the public. This is not about one property or a single structure. It's about **hundreds of local residents**, including seniors and families, who are watching their shoreline and homes vanish.

When my Wife and I purchased our wonderful Hololani condo over a decade ago, there was a moderate amount of beautiful sandy beach, and it is so sad that it has been lost to such a degree. We were told at the time of our purchase that an active plan to protect the shoreline was in place and was going to happen in the near future. Unfortunately, that was delayed to the point we are at now when the project has become somewhat urgent.

One of the last times I was able to visit we enjoyed a seasonal reemergence of the beach, and it was truly wonderful to walk on. In the aftermath of the devastating Lahaina fire, we entered our unit into the FEMA program to provide shelter to a displaced individual/family. It would be further devasting if we didn't protect the shoreline properties which could be utilized in this manner just for this kind of emergency.

I look forward to eventually visiting the Hololani once again in the future when the unit is no longer needed. My understanding is that Hololani means, "Gone to Heaven." I certainly feel that sentiment every time I walk through the front door and walk out to our Lanai. There is no other place on Earth that gives me such peace.

There are significant benefits for allowing us to proceed with the project. I have seen firsthand how the North end of the property has deteriorated, making the beach access point somewhat hazardous. This location is awfully close to the road and a major drainage pipe. These are impacted by the lack of protection from storms and very high tides that can result in flooding and road damage. Aloha and thank you for reading my testimony. I have been travelling to Maui since 2004, which was my first time on island...for my wedding at Napili Bay. We fell in love with the island and culture and have visited dozens of times since that day. We have owned a property on West Maui since 2016. Our current property is in Kahana. It is evident in the last several years that the beaches in Kahana are diminishing due to environmental factors, and currently the beach front is encroaching on many properties. This is of great concern as it is only a matter of time before Kahana buildings start falling into the ocean. No one who loves and cherishes Maui wants to witness this type of disaster. We know from research that t-groins are a viable solution to coastal erosion. The sand placed in proximity to the groins would remain in that area...creating a beach front for locals and visitors to enjoy, as well as preventing oceanfront buildings from falling into the ocean. How can anyone argue that this project shouldn't be approved...the Kahana Bay oceanfront will be a disaster if we don't intervene soon. I am aware that managed retreat has been proposed as a solution...how is this even possible when Lower Honoapiilani Road lies directly behind the oceanfront buildings that are at risk from coastal erosion. There is no where to go! Please save the Kahana Bay oceanfront by approving this well researched (and executed solution in other parts of the US and the world) t-groin project.

- A Growing Concern

We've seen shocking changes in beach erosion. The situation is far worse than just a few years ago and our building is now in danger. The only thing holding back the ocean is a line of sandbags, which are now deteriorating. Our resort already has replacement sandbags in storage—fully paid for by condo owners—yet Maui County refuses to issue permits for installation. Meanwhile, during storms, waves are already overtopping the failing barriers. The amount of water coming over the sandbags must be in the thousands of gallons, daily, how much more before things starting to collapse? The county won't respond to our requests, leaving us completely in the dark.

The Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation Project (KBMP) consists of nine different resorts and 862 condos in Kahana Bay, all of which are at risk. The project has already developed a well-researched plan to install T-groins, designed by experts to calm the violent waves. Condo owners are fully prepared to fund this project, yet it has been sitting on government desks for at least eight years, with no movement. Meanwhile, similar projects have been approved elsewhere in Hawaii. Another option—coral reef restoration—was recently approved in Olowalu, securing a \$10 million grant. This method could reduce wave energy by 97% while benefiting marine life. Why isn't this being seriously considered for Kahana?

I call for long-term, preventive thinking and action—before it's too late. We can't wait for another disaster to happen before leaders start taking this seriously. Just like the fires in Lahaina, where lack of preparation led to unimaginable loss, we're watching another preventable crisis unfold in slow motion. Our hope is with you now, to act now before it's too late? Who wants to see another Surfside (Florida) happening right here in beautiful Maui?

I am writing to express my strong support for SCR76.

Public Benefit and Beach Access

Opponents claim the project will benefit only condominium owners; however, these beaches are public and open to everyone. Public access is the law, and there is no request to change that. In fact, I would encourage officials to consider expanding public access as part of this project so the entire community can benefit.

Nature of the Proposed Solution

This is not a large-scale seawall hardening project. T-groins, when carefully designed and properly engineered for the specific conditions of a bay, have the potential to stabilize the shoreline with minimal risk of flanking erosion. In the case of Kahana Bay, the existing natural rock walls on either side further reduce that risk. Paired with additional methods—such as vegetative berms—T-groins can be part of a thoughtful, sustainable erosion mitigation strategy.

Protection of Economic and Housing Resources

Although many of these units are vacation rentals, there are also full-time residents. The number of residential occupants has grown since the Lahaina fire, making these properties an increasingly important housing resource. Furthermore, some of these properties are on the "Minatoya list" and are being considered for conversion back to long-term housing to address Maui's critical housing shortage. Rather than losing this potential solution, we should protect these buildings and keep our options open.

If changes occur with the Minatoya list, the Kahana area may remain one of the last relatively affordable vacation rental zones on Maui compared to higher-priced areas like Kāʻanapali and Kapalua. Preserving this mix of housing stock and more accessible accommodations helps maintain balance in our local economy.

Conclusion

SCR76 presents a reasonable path forward by urging collaboration among state, county, and federal agencies. Restoring and protecting the shoreline benefits everyone, and with the right approach, it can be done responsibly and sustainably.

Dear Chair, Vice Chair and members of the committee:

As a West Maui visitor for over 35 years and a condominium owner in the Kahana Bay area for the past 8 years, I have witnessed firsthand the extent of the beach erosion issue and fully support the approval and action to provide beach nourishment to the full extent possible including dune restoration. However, I do not support the establishment of linear groins because they are not a long term cost effective solution and do not promote the ecological health of the ocean environment. As an alternative, I believe SCR 76 should be amended to authorize and fund the creation of a Kahana bay based organization which would include local community's interests and be responsible for creating and implementing an integrated coastal restoration involving coral reefs, water quality and overall ecological improvement. Because of the urgent need for the beach nourishment, this should operate as per the Kahana Bay Steering Committee (KBSC) and Oceanlit engineering report. The bill should be amended to create this second organization for Kahana Bay coastal stewardship with a much longer time frame for action. The organization should be formed in a timely manner, with goals consistent with the concept of Mālama 'āina and specific goals of long term shore protection and restored ocean health as I more fully discuss below.

Reasons for a dedicated organization focusing on near shore restoration should result in a lower cost solution for the Kahana Bay residents, while creating an opportunity to establish Maui as a leader in coastal protection in challenging times. Instead of trapping sand through the use of groins, the focus would be on establishment of healthy coral reef barriers which can accomplish the following:

- Reduce ocean energy which is uplifting and transporting the sand away from shore. In some cases, the ocean energy can be reduced by up to 90%, significantly reducing the erosion rate.

- Coral Reefs are a natural self repairing structure which can impede sand flow both laterally to the beach, but also out to deeper parts of the ocean when blocked by fringing reefs.

- Healthy coral reefs promote improved fish populations. A key species is the parrotfish who create sand free of charge. Up to 70% of the sand on Maui beaches is attributed to reef fish, and restoration of the fish populations will:

- 1. Benefit fishermen through increased biomass up to 20 fold of commercially valuable fish and other aquatic life.
- 2. Mitigate future need for sand, by creating new sand from seawater via a natural process. Per the Nature Conservancy, a single parrot fish can produce up to 1 ton of sand per year.

- Coral reefs tend to be viewed as a more attractive solution and would enhance the value of the residents' properties in the taxing district.

On a technical basis, the Kahana Bay near shore coastal stewardship organization should have a known funding level for setting up a base of operation in the Kahana area, with goals of repairing coral reefs damaged by storms, and creating new reefs either naturally or with environmentally acceptable material. The specific goals would include:

1.

- 1. Reducing wave energy reaching to the shoreline by 50% to 90%
- 2. Enhancing the biomass of 10 to 20 times current levels
- 3. Incorporate islanders' knowledge and integrate them with modern computing tools for modeling the dynamics of the near ocean environment for purposes of optimizing the stewardship of the ocean locally, but also creating a resource of value to outside parties.
- 4. Develop a knowledge base and best practices for merging warm water coral into reef restoration activities to enhance the long term resilience of the coastal environment.

The organization contemplated in the amendment should have an initial budget for seeking outside expertise as needed for developing an integrated plan. The organization should be authorized to seek outside grants, research funds and other sources of funding to expedite achievement of the organization's goals.

In summary, I believe the SCR76 should pass with regard to beach nourishment and dune creation to address a critical issue in the Kahana Bay area, but recommend adding an amendment to replace the proposed groins with the creation of an organization which will look to long term use of nature for solutions to erosion problems. This organization should be composed of members identified in SCR76, but be expanded to include local fishing interests, parties interested in coral reef restoration and community members and organizations with local knowledge of desired and best practices for near shore ocean health. I hope this becomes an opportunity for the community to come together and recognize there is path benefiting a majority of people of Maui and perhaps become a showcase for others in the world with similar situations.
