

#### Introduction

The Hawai'i State Department of Education (Department) is the Adult Education Family Literacy Act (AEFLA) grant recipient for the State of Hawai'i. AEFLA, administered by the Office of Career, Technical, and Adult Education (OCTAE) within the United States Department of Education, is authorized as Title II of the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA), federal legislation designed to strengthen and improve the nation's public workforce system. The grant aims to help Americans, including youth and those with significant barriers to employment, obtain high-quality jobs and careers and help employers hire and retain skilled workers.

The purpose of AEFLA is to provide educational opportunities below the postsecondary level for individuals 16 years or older who:

- are not currently enrolled in school;
- lack a high school diploma; or
- lack the basic skills to function effectively in the workplace and in their daily lives.

The local eligible providers of AEFLA adult education services are the McKinley and Waipahu Community Schools for Adults, which have a total of ten campuses across the state:

#### **Programs Being Offered**

Under AEFLA, the Basic Grants to States is the primary source of federal support for basic skills programs offered in four areas:

- 1. Adult Basic Education: Basic skills instruction below the high school level;
- 2. Adult Secondary Education: High school level instruction;
- 3. Integrated English Literacy and Civics Education: Education services provided to adult English language learners that include instruction in literacy and English language acquisition, as well as instruction on the rights and responsibilities of citizens and civic participation, which may include workforce training; and
- 4. English Language Acquisition Instruction: Educational program designed to help eligible individuals who are English language learners achieve competence in reading, writing, speaking, and comprehension of the English language, which leads to the attainment of a secondary school diploma or its recognized equivalent and transition to postsecondary education and training or employment.

Adult Basic Education and Secondary Education programs are also provided to institutionalized individuals in Hawai'i in partnership with the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation.

## Number of Individuals Placed in Employment Through Their Respective Workforce Development Programs

The information being reported is from the AEFLA Statewide Performance Report, an annual WIOA accountability report required by OCTAE. This report is available on the National Reporting System website *https://nrs.ed.gov/.* The School Year 2022-2023 information is the most recent at the time of this report. The School Year 2023-2024 information will be available in February 2025 on the National Reporting System.
