THE SENATE THIRTY-THIRD LEGISLATURE, 2025 STATE OF HAWAII ACT 233 S.B. NO. S.D. 1 H.D. 2 C.D. 1

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE JUDICIARY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that in June 2024, the
- 2 American Probation and Parole Association published national
- 3 standards for community supervision which indicated that the
- 4 optimal caseload distribution according to risk level is:
- 5 intensive, twenty to one; moderate to high risk, fifty to one;
- 6 and low risk, two hundred to one. One study highlighted the
- 7 benefits of following these national standards, showing that
- 8 recidivism fell by thirty per cent where agencies redistributed
- 9 caseloads to ensure smaller caseloads of higher-risk
- 10 individuals. Other research has confirmed that moderate to
- 11 high-risk persons on probation on a fifty to one caseload
- 12 receive significantly more office sessions, field visits,
- 13 employer contacts, telephone check-ins, and substance use
- 14 disorder and mental health treatment, leading to significantly
- 15 better probation outcomes, including fewer drug tests and other
- 16 technical violations. Although the adult client services branch
- 17 has made efforts to align with the national standards

- 1 recommended by the American Probation and Parole Association,
- 2 these standards are unattainable with existing staffing at the
- 3 adult client services branch.
- 4 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to enable the adult
- 5 client services branch to move toward the recommended national
- 6 best practice standards for community supervision by
- 7 establishing positions and appropriating funds for the adult
- 8 client services branch of the first circuit.
- 9 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
- 10 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$739,440 or so much
- 11 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and the
- 12 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 13 2026-2027 to establish permanent positions in the adult client
- 14 services branch of the first circuit court, including:
- 15 (1) \$73,836 each for eight full-time equivalent (8.0 FTE)
- probation officer positions;
- 17 (2) \$50,880 for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) social
- worker assistant position; and
- 19 (3) \$48,936 each for two full-time equivalent (2.0 FTE)
- 20 clerk positions.

- 1 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the judiciary
- 2 for the purposes of this Act.
- 3 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$140,000 or so much
- 5 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and the
- 6 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 7 2026-2027 for operating expenses for the adult client services
- 8 branch of the first circuit court.
- 9 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the judiciary
- 10 for the purposes of this Act.
- 11 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2025.
